Welcome from the Headmaster

In December 2022, *The Sunday Times* named Shrewsbury School in a list of the Top 10 Most Generous Independent Schools. This welcome recognition of our culture of philanthropy was based on the School's spending on bursaries and financial support to allow a vibrant variety of children to join the Salopian community. It is important that we widen access to a Shrewsbury education. We are deeply grateful to all those who support our efforts so generously.

As well as the pursuit of 'serious fun', we believe strongly in the 'survival of the kindest' – a culture that runs deep in the Salopian DNA. Not only do we want to provide a diversely challenging whole person education for all the 840 or so teenage Salopians, but we also want to foster future leaders who go out into the world with confidence to deliver change for the better. Social responsibility and public benefit are at the heart of what we do. Our mission is to educate and empower the children in our care to flourish in life and contribute positively to the world around them.

The academic year 2022 — 2023 has seen the School continue to adapt and meet the challenges of a fast-moving world. In the year that our boys' football team reached the final of the England Schools' FA Cup, our academic and Futures programme saw 30% of our leavers move on to World Top 50 universities, as well as a range of other excellent destinations and fields of work. We have continued to invest in the infrastructure of our wonderful site, with the completion of our fifth girls' house as the overall number of girls in the school went beyond 320. There has been parallel investment in boys' accommodation, with work on all houses and major refurbishments and extensions to Churchill's Hall and Ingram's Hall. Port Hill and Radrook celebrated a strong final year as we moved to a fully integrated house system. The two new all-weather pitches are named after these day boys' houses that formed such a key part of the school for a 38 year chapter in our long history. The growing group of Shrewsbury International Schools expanded further with the announcement of the latest project, Shrewsbury International India, a full boarding school to be situated in the heart of Madhya Pradesh, in central India.

With the economic and political headwinds blowing increasingly strongly on all institutions, not least independent boarding and day schools such as ours, we continue to value greatly the philanthropic giving which forms such a key element in allowing us to provide excellence in the pupil experience and pursue our ongoing commitment to widening access through transformative bursaries. We want to reach the point where a visitor could pop into any classroom of 20 pupils and know that there was a least one pupil in the room on a transformative bursary. We are well on the way to that target.

The more diverse our community, the fuller the experience for all our pupils. Investment in the site and facilities benefits our pupils and staff, and is shared with almost 50 different state school partners, through our nationally-recognised Partnership and Community Engagement programme, as well as our ongoing support of The Shewsy, our youth and community club in Liverpool. As a Champion School of the School Partnerships Alliance, we are in the centre of national efforts to drive school improvement across the education system. We are part of the solution, rather than part of the problem, as some may suggest.

In this spirit, we go forwards, and we are profoundly thankful for the wonderful support of our donors and friends of the School.

That was why when the School approached me to become Chair of the Shrewsbury School Foundation in 2019, and subsequently to become Chair of the Governing Body in 2023, I was delighted not only to step forward, but also to make a commitment to the School's future by joining The Leadership Circle, and making a gift to Campaign 2020 – 2030.

It is my privilege to share the opportunity to join our global community of donors; if your name already features on the Donor Roll in the following pages, recognising your commitment to Campaign 2020 – 2030, I extend my sincere thanks to you for your support. My colleagues in the Development Office, whose details are listed, will be delighted to assist you in taking the next steps on your pathway to becoming part of the Campaign 2020 – 2030 success story.

The Shrewsbury Development Office has continued to be very active worldwide this year, connecting with thousands of members of our community through individual meetings, events and engagement activities. The results speak for themselves, producing in excess of £1 million of in-year cash donations for the Shrewsbury School Foundation and more than £3 million in onward pledge commitments to the current campaign. In total, the Campaign 2020 – 2030 has now raised over £10 million in committed funds in direct support of the School.

This year's Fundraising Telephone Campaign reached over 1,000 members of our global community of alumni, parents, friends and supporters, and secured more than £300,000 of new and additional gifts, 94% of which are regular gifts, providing predictable and recurring philanthropic income. All of these gifts are directed to The Means Tested Bursary Fund, which remains our through-focus for Campaign 2020 – 2030, enabling a Shrewsbury education for qualified children who might not otherwise be able to attend the School. If you were amongst those who took the call for support, the Impact Report in the following pages shows how these gifts are used and highlights just how much every gift counts.

From the Director of Development

There is diversity of thought and convention on the number and model of continents in our world, much as with the number and stages of economic cycles.

No attempt is made to anchor your view on these here, but they are examples of unresolved and diverse theoretical discourse, co-existing in the constant 'contact-reality' of time. In much the same way, our duty to educate, empower, and enable young people at Shrewsbury School is illuminative of diverse theory, but necessarily present, and immediate. Life demands that our pupils need a foothold on the world – and its continents; and the economy – and its cycles, both in theory, and in practice, and now.

Connecting this immediacy of duty is the privilege of our work at Shrewsbury School, where young people provide us with daily evidence that there is connection and opportunity to be found in diversity of thought: in the demand it places on us to question and explore intellectually, rhetorically, and practically; and its demand that we test, analyse, criticise, and consider difference distinctly from both change, and consistency.

In much the same way, the work of the Development Office cannot hibernate at the first mention of a headwind, and we must work in the 'now'. So this year we have taken a leaf out of our pupils' books; finding, thinking and working in diverse and innovative ways: counting connections and opportunities, rather than continents and contractions.

Development Offices are always a good barometer of the economy, and recently we have needed to pivot our activity through our established global network in response to market. The result of this, powered by the incredible generosity of our donors, is that we have again raised in excess of £1 million of in-year cash donations for the Shrewsbury School Foundation. Moreover, this success is coupled to our securing a further and additional £3 million in pledge commitments during the year, meaning that now, as a whole campaign, we carry in excess of £10 million in gifts and pledges – an incredible milestone to have passed on Campaign 2020 – 2030. I offer my unreserved thanks to all those donors in our global community of alumni, parents, friends and supporters who share in their authorship of this success for Shrewsbury School.

To remain at the front as a global leader of excellence in education, Shrewsbury must constantly move forward. Fees only cover the School's recurring expenditure, so Shrewsbury has always relied on the generosity of donors to sustain, enhance and optimise the School's environment for our pupils today and tomorrow.

You will find my own family listed on the Donor Roll in the Gold Sponsors' Giving Club later in this publication. We are donors to The Family Development Fund and are proud to support the School in this way with a regular gift, as Shrewsbury

numbers amongst our philanthropic priorities as a family. We appreciate the value and importance that fundraising continues to play as a vital part of the School's capacity to deliver its mission. If you wish to add your own family's name to the Donor Roll and join our global community of donors, may I be prompt in saying both 'thank you' and 'welcome'.

The School's commitment to widening access remains our current focus in the Development Office, and is realised through The Means Tested Bursary Fund. This enables a Shrewsbury School education for qualified, bright and capable young people whose financial circumstances would otherwise preclude them from attending.

Planned gifts continue to be an important component of our income year on year, and we are humbled by the ever-increasing number of donors who choose to make gifts both during their lifetime, and a further commitment to the Shrewsbury School Foundation in their Will. In so doing, they become members of The 1552 Legacy Society, and we honour and recognise those very special donors later in this publication.

Shrewsbury School's ethos, aims and educational philosophy are encapsulated in our approach, to create global citizens of a borderless mindset, who not only see and sense, but live and share their lifelong link to *Shrewsbury: For Life* from the moment they become Salopians. Our approach to learning, teaching, and life is embodied in *The Salopian Spirit*, and our *Six Salopian Virtues*: Kindness, Courage, Spirit, Self-Mastery, Integrity, and Wisdom.

Shrewsbury is a School that is keen to share where it has protected the past, and where we have moved to the future. All great institutions see themselves in the mirror of youth – and that regular reckoning makes them consider change, and makes them consider consistency – a healthy creative tension – which we are proud to uphold.

We remain motivated by your unwavering support, engagement, and generosity which enables Shrewsbury to remain strong as a community united in purpose, and with clarity of vision for its future.

A Vision for Shrewsbury's Future

The Means Tested Bursary Fund

With its auspicious founding by Royal Charter in 1552, and subsequent identification as one of the 'Great' Public Schools by the Clarendon Commission in 1868, it should come as no surprise that the foresight of the School brought about the establishment, in 1965, of the Shrewsbury School Foundation. It is thought to be the first such charitable foundation associated with a British Independent School, and to this day, the Foundation exists to create, support and enhance the provisions of Shrewsbury School, including its commitment to the provision of Means Tested Bursaries.

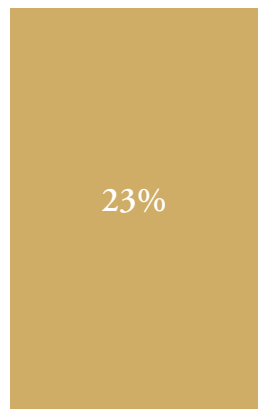
Following the success of last year, we were humbled by the generosity of our donors, enabling us to raise even more this year, and serving the aspiration to increase the number of young people attending the School who would be able to take full advantage of the unique opportunity a Shrewsbury education can provide, were it not for their financial circumstances. Moreover, with a strengthened focus on social responsibility, we are seeking to increase the number of Transformative Means Tested Bursaries the Shrewsbury School Foundation is able to offer.

Our definition of 'Transformative Means Tested Bursaries' is those which enable young people requiring 75% – 110% remission of fees to attend the School.

Fundraising continues to form a vital part of the School's capacity to deliver its mission, influencing positively a number of the School's strategic objectives to 2030. Our Ten Year Global Advancement Strategy: Campaign 2020 — 2030, is ambitious, with a focus of supporting Means Tested Bursaries, whilst also welcoming some new projects alongside each year. We are progressing with confidence toward the School's commitment to meet its strategic objective of increasing the number of Transformative Means Tested Bursary recipients to a target of 40 pupils annually by 2030.

2022 – 2023 Overview

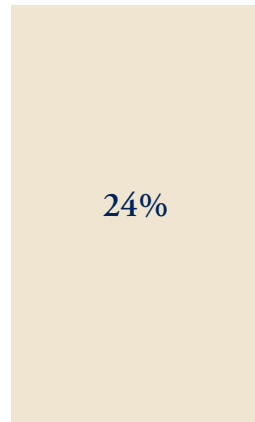
The School awarded Scholarships and Bursaries worth £4,544,147 to 385 recipients during the year.



46 pupils received up to 24% fee remission



83 pupils received 25% — 49% fee remission



49 pupils received 50% — 74% fee remission



198 (51%) of these were Means Tested recipients who received 70% of the funds (£3,188,752) distributed in the form of fee remission awards.



9 pupils received 75% — 99% fee remission*



11 pupils received 100% — 110% fee remission*

* these awards meet our definition of Transformative Means Tested Bursaries





The 1552 Legacy Society

Making a planned gift in your Will, large or small, establishes a living legacy and a benefit to young people and the life of Shrewsbury School reaching beyond your lifetime – a bond which lives in perpetuity.

We will work in partnership with you to direct your support in precisely the manner you wish, and provide you with the opportunity to connect with the life of the School today joining our global community of alumni, parents, friends and supporters.

The Shrewsbury School Foundation is a charity registered in England and Wales (number 528415). All legacy gifts made to the Shrewsbury School Foundation are exempt from UK Inheritance and Capital Gains Taxes.

Your Estate can also pay inheritance tax at a reduced rate of 36% on some assets if you leave 10% or more of its 'net value' to the Shrewsbury School Foundation in your Will (the net value is the Estate's total value minus any debts).

We recognise legators during their lifetime through membership of The 1552 Legacy Society, so called in recognition of the School's year of foundation by Royal Charter.

Impact Report

A Shrewsbury education does not simply or solely provide impact to its recipient.

Here, we place a spotlight on the first-hand account and experience of Lenka Hozzova, Alumna, Class of 2021, who was a recipient of a Transformative Means Tested Bursary (75% — 110% remission of fees).

As you would expect, Lenka writes and speaks *The Salopian Spirit*, but beyond that, it is overwhelmingly apparent how Shrewsbury has moved its spirit into her life, and into the lives of those around her, today and forever.

Lenka Hozzova (The Grove, 2019 — 2021)

Being awarded a Transformative Means Tested Bursary at Shrewsbury School was a life-changing experience.

I am extremely grateful for the opportunities I was given, and I believe it has made me into a well-rounded person.

Shrewsbury always made me feel welcome and encouraged me to try new activities. In particular, my time in the Combined Cadet Force (Royal Air Force Cadets) was memorable, with many thought-provoking team challenges and opportunities to work on my leadership and teamwork, I gained lots of important skills. There were abundant flying opportunities including a gliding camp, where I was able to learn the basic principles of flight and even try some aerobatics!

I have many fond memories of my time at Shrewsbury, and it really equipped me with valuable skills for my time at The University of Oxford.

Shrewsbury helped to push me outside my comfort zone, and introduced me to public speaking through my membership of the Model United Nations. Some memorable moments from this were taking part in external conferences as well as hosting our own conference at the School. I remember my time doing this with great fondness and again, it equipped me with valuable skills which I have called on many times since leaving School.

After having whetted my appetite for trying new things, I attempted rowing. I've been able to build on this skill at Oxford and am now rowing for my college club.

When not flying, rowing, or making speeches, I would be focusing on my A-levels. All the teachers were amazing and were always present to help. For my A-levels, I studied Maths, Physics, Geography, and Economics. Each subject enriched my knowledge and I found them all very interesting. When I hit stumbling blocks, the teachers were always very supportive and would help me work through challenges, even throughout the pandemic.

I am now studying Earth Sciences at The University of Oxford (University College), and that is due to the excellent teaching and support I received at Shrewsbury.

After a long day at school, it was always a pleasure to return to my House (The Grove) with its comforting atmosphere where I felt at home, with something to always look forward to in the evening, be that a movie night, time with friends, or a meal.

Having the opportunity to go to The University of Oxford has been an amazing experience. Studying Earth Sciences is exciting and diverse; one day I could be learning about meteorites, and the next I could be examining fossils under a microscope. I have also been on some remarkable field trips: studying rocks close by in the Malverns, and further afield in Spain.

In my spare time, there are lots of societies and clubs which I participate in. Recently, I have been enjoying playing ice hockey and attending events with the Czech and Slovak society.

Shrewsbury School taught me to always aim high. The Transformative Means Tested Bursary helped me to get to where I am today, and also to create lifelong experiences and friends which I will be forever grateful for.



Campaign 2020 – 2030 Donor Roll

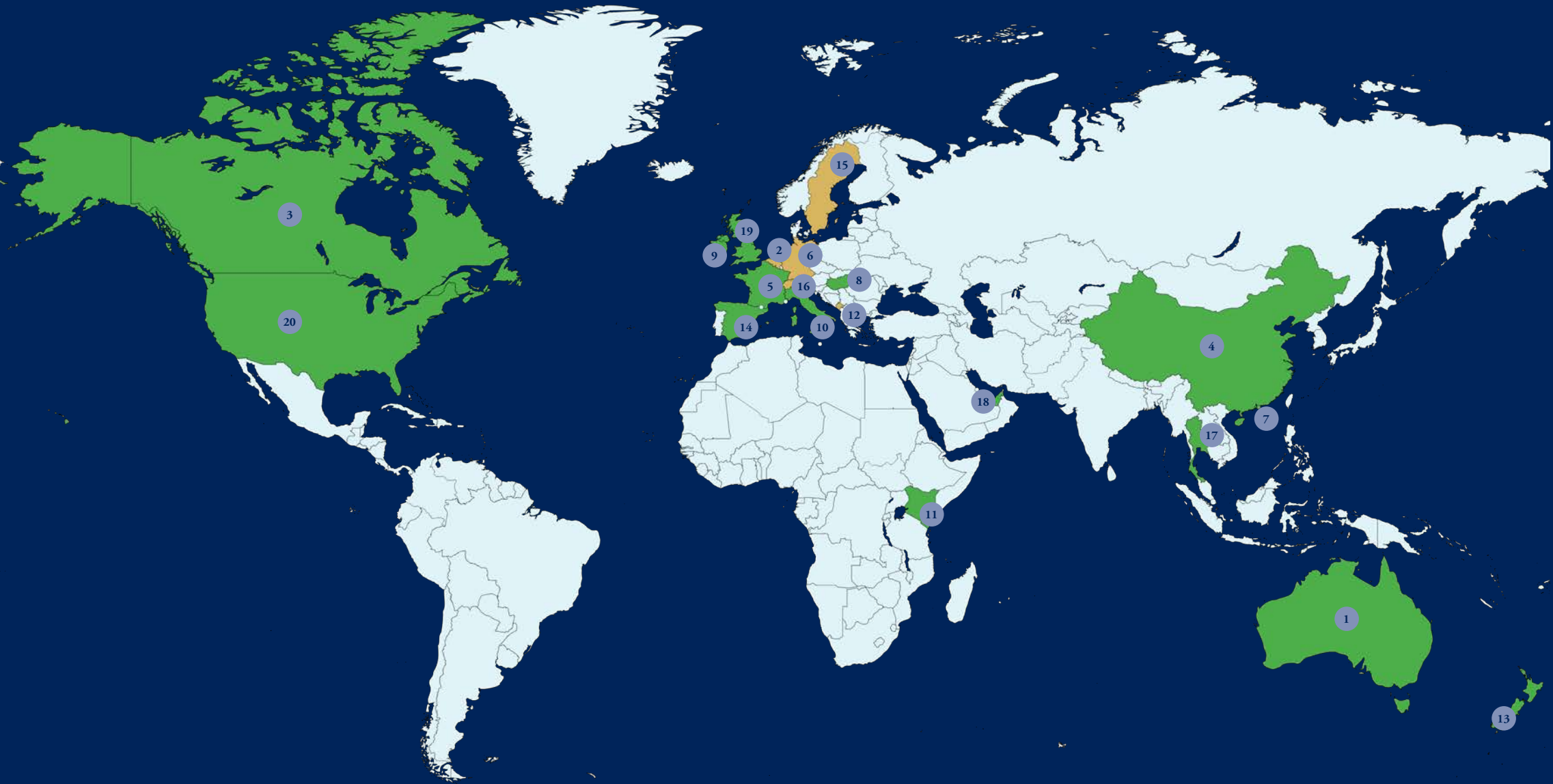

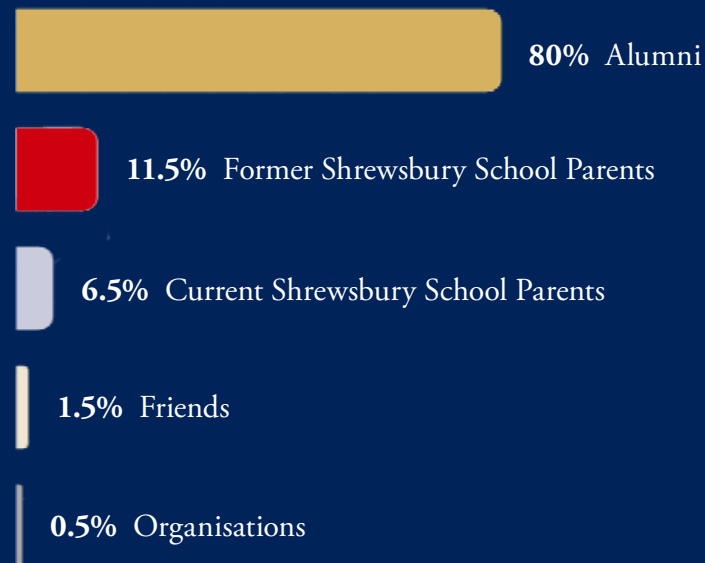

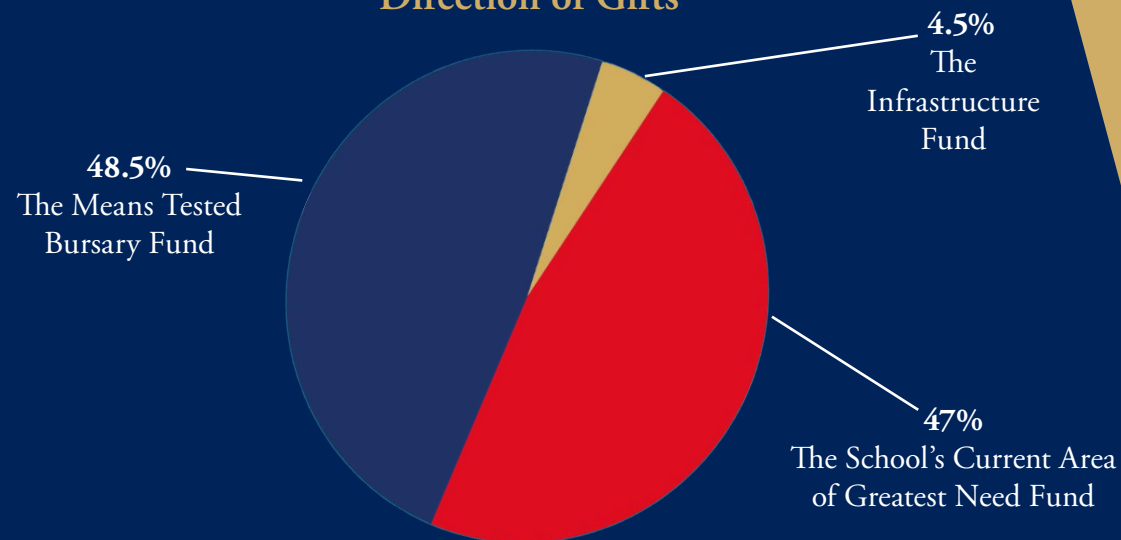

Our programme is building year on year...

This year the Shrewsbury School Foundation has maintained the number of Means Tested Bursary recipients it has supported at 27.

Overall, we have also increased Scholarship and Bursary awards and increased the funding of Means Tested Bursaries.

Our definition of 'Transformative Means Tested Bursaries' is those which enable young people requiring 75% — 110% remission of fees to attend the School.

It costs £1 million to endow a Transformative Means Tested Bursary, providing the opportunity of Shrewsbury: For Life, in perpetuity.

We are progressing with confidence toward the School's commitment to meet its strategic objective of increasing the number of Transformative Means Tested Bursary recipients to a target of 40 pupils annually by 2030.

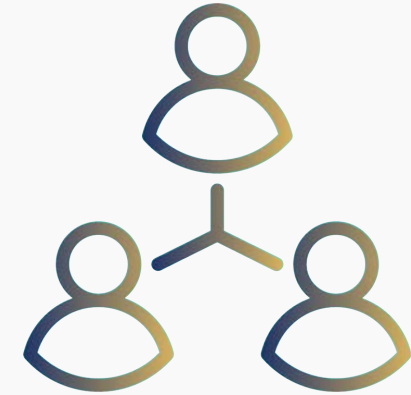

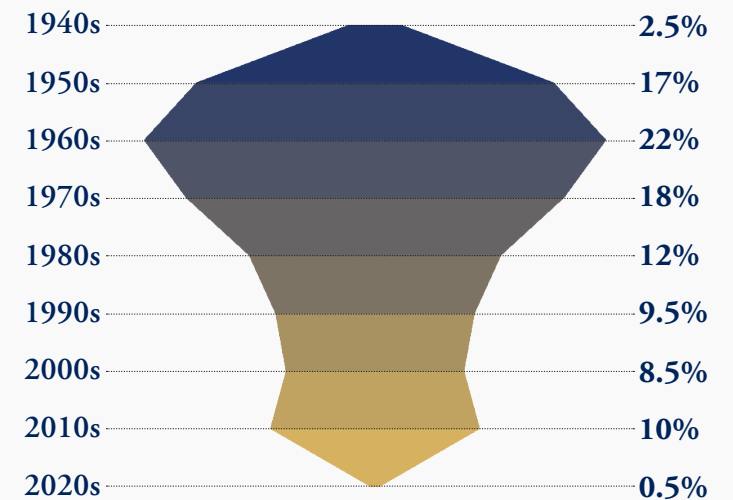
