

South Africa Cricket Tour Report 2008

Sunday 4 January 2009

Day 1 Thursday 11th December

Our flight arrived on time and with little disruption. Having checked into the Breakwater Lodge we had a 2 hour training session with both squads on a club ground with the 2010 World Cup final stadium (taking shape slowly!) as a back drop. It was great to be in temperatures in the mid 20s having left England in the freezing conditions. This was followed by a nice meal on the Waterfront and an early night.

Match One v Bishops @ Bishops, Cape Town 12th December 50 overs 1st XI Report

Our first game on tour saw us take on Bishops, one of the top cricketing schools in South Africa. We had previously beaten the same XI at Eton in July. Having decided to bat second, we proceeded to bowl poorly throughout the Bishop's innings, resulting in a big total to chase; 325-8; Dion Holden (10-1-47-1) & David Lloyd (10-0-42-2) managed respectable figures and saved us conceding even more runs. In reply, we lost early wickets, with only David Lloyd (40), Dion Holden (36), and Alex Sale (28), troubling the scorers. Rupert Salmon contributed a useful 16 but failed to find a partner to 'tough it out' and we eventually closed the innings well over a hundred and twenty short. It was always going to be a difficult game so early in the tour, and so it proved to be.

Again we lost the toss and the opposition decided to bat. We generally bowled with better discipline but all too often bowled the 'four ball'. The opposition totalled a very respectable 167 after we tailed off towards the end of our bowling. **George Curtis** produced a much-improved bowling performance and together with the very consistent **Alex Blofield** bowled well picking up a number of wickets. The fielding was generally crisp with **George Thomason** again outstanding but a one handed overhead diving catch from **Sebastian Shukla** took the prizes for the most spectacular effort. **Stephen Leach** was promoted to open the innings with **David Lloyd** and took full advantage of his opportunity. Both were circumspect to start with but as the partnership developed both played with greater confidence. **David** played the dominant role and after running well in the initial part of his innings after drinks he played a number of excellent attacking strokes that deflated the opposition. **Stephen** supported him well by rotating the strike and placing his back foot shots carefully into gaps. David (103no) became only the **fourth** boy at Shrewsbury School to score a hundred on an overseas tour (previously **Tom Cox** (Sri Lanka 2002), **Peter Bailey & James Gale** (South Africa 2004). Stephen also passed 50 to finish on 52no and thereby engineer an excellent 10-wicket victory.

Despite this are fielding was again of a high standard but the combination of the heat and the stroke play took New Orleans to a formidable total. In reply a number of batsman got starts but failed to turn them into significant scores(**Ben Williams 30,Dion Holden 30,Goerge Thomason 25,Tom Shaw 15)** and we were eventually bowled out well short. Perhaps disappointing but the conditions were the most testing on tour to date. More worrying at this point was our lack of penetration and consistency with the ball.

We were back in the game with 2 quick wickets from **Jack Hudson Williams**, but were unable to wrest the initiative from the township side. Their star batsman was a class act and scored 50 (in temperatures in the high 30s he batted in a jumper!)

Match Seven v Paarl Boys High, Paarl 19th & 20th December 2 Day Match

A familiar story with the toss almost cost Joe his job. Once again the team trooped into the field and for the first five overs looked anything but a 1stXI outfit. All this changed quickly as the first wicket fell and spirits were lifted. Paarl BH who we had beaten on our previous visit to Paarl in 2004 were out for revenge but the quality of our bowling on day one ensured that they could not build a significant total on what proved to be another slow and difficult surface. Alex Sale (6-1-19-2) & Joe Leach (6-0-11-2) combined to build pressure on the opposition middle order and **Tom Welti** applied the finishing touches by claiming the best figures on tour 7-4-15-5. Paarl had subsided to 109 all out and Shrewsbury set out in their quest to build a first innings leads. In the end a significant lead was achieved after a number of false dawns and a telling contribution from the tail. Ben Williams (24), Ben Price (28), Rupert Salmon (16), Dion Holden (14), Joe Leach (21) all made good contributions but then fell to carelessness. The most important contribution came from Tom Shaw (11) who with solid technique, maturity and patience ensured that the innings progressed to a point at which their bowling options were reduced and then with the aid of some fine stroke play by Alex Sale (20no) they took the final score onto 166. In the circumstances a telling lead. There was still time left in the day and Shrewsbury used it to the advantage in taking a couple of late wickets and end the session well on top. The team had played their best cricket to date.

Day two dawned eventually and we found the team severely depleted by an overnight tummy bug and many drained by sleeplessness. The outfield look more like a field hospital than a cricket ground. **Jack Hudson Williams** was drafted in from the U15's to field when **Joe Leach** took the first over. Joe (14-3-35-4) then reeled off a ten over spell of the highest quality thus ensuring that our grip on the match remained firm. **Alex Sale** again supported with his best bowling on tour (8-0-26-2) and **Alex Blofield** bowled a mean spell (16-3-27-4). Paarl had totalled just 109 leaving us with the tricky task of scoring 58 to ensure victory, this we did and claimed our best victory on tour.

Paarl batted again and we were delighted to have them 4 down at the close. In the morning we bowled and fielded superbly to dismiss Paarl for 90. **Stephen Leach** ended up with figures of 5 – 28 and **James Aston** and **Harry Croft** took fine catches.

We were left a minimum of 70 overs in the day to score the 151 needed for victory. The innings started well with the openers looking in control and settled. Another farcical run out involving **Mark Prescott** caused unnecessary panic and there ensued a collapse of woeful proportions as we were dismissed for 59. What was disappointing was the lack of application from the Shrewsbury batsman on a difficult but not impossible wicket. Of the 20 dismissals in the 2 innings, only 3 could be attributed to the pitch as batsmen got themselves in, looked comfortable and then threw their wickets away. Hopefully lessons will have been learned from this match.

Astronomy Society working on an experiment that, if successful, could be launched in a satellite

The POISE team are working closely with scientists and engineers at SSTL (Surrey Satellite Technology) to develop instrumentation that will measure ionospheric scintillation from a satellite that will be launched into a polar orbit in 2010. The image shows three of the POISE team at a meeting with the business development manager, Stuart Eves, at SSTL in January. This meeting provided training on the use of a software package that will help the team to predict when their instruments should be turned on during each orbit. Later in the term instruments on another satellite will be used to test some of our ideas. Members of the team will be invited to the launch party at SSTL.

Professor Cathryn Mitchell at Bath University is a world expert on mapping the ionosphere and she has taken a close interest in our work on POISE. In fact the POISE experiment was metioned as part of a grant application by Bath, Nottingham and Leeds Universities for a world-wide network of GPS based ionospheric scintillation detectors and two PhD students at Bath will spend some of their time on our project. She has also suggested that we locate two of these detectors at Shrewsbury School and at Shrewsbury School in Bangkok in order to gather data that will complement that received from the POISE mission. This will give students at both schools an opportunity to liaise with one another and with research scientists on a real geophysical project which could have significant importance for the future of navigation systems.

The first stage of the BIO is a three-hour exam, taken at school, in which students solve problems with the aid of a computer. These are marked by a teacher and submitted for moderation. Based on the results of this exam, the top 15 competitors are invited to the BIO final in Cambridge during the Easter holidays. The best four make up the team to represent Britain at the IOI in Bulgaria.

The Michaelmas Term of 2008 will remain a pivotal term for music making at Shrewsbury. With the introduction of girls into the Sixth Form, the music department took on a new lease of life, and their impact has been tangible and of huge benefit to everything we do, from the Chapel Choir to some of the new girl entrants bravely joining the cast of Harry! at the Royal College of Music and performing to a wonderful standard on precious little rehearsal.

The New Entrants Concert had to manage without the Director of Music, who was away with the Registrar auditioning talented musicians in Hong Kong, and guess what, it was none the worse for that. Indeed it was a splendid evening of great talent given by our new 13+ musicians, showing just how well they had been nurtured by their respective prep schools.

To coincide with the opening of Mary Sidney Hall, there was a morning concert given by some of our new Sixth Form entrants, both male and female, and this was also a delight with some outstanding performances.

The term was literally full of performances. Concerts for the wider community at Cound Parish Church, a glorious evensong in Worcester Cathedral directed by our brilliant new Director of Chapel Choir, Kathryn Burningham, and many performances in morning chapel of consistently high quality by so many young performers.

The two big occasions in the term are always the **House Singing Competition** and the St Cecilia Weekend concerts. The former was an absolute 'tour de force' this year, possibly the very best on record in terms of quality, breadth and sheer innovation and pupil-led performances of real merit, attended as ever by a hugely enthusiastic audience of parents, friends and staff. The Ashton Theatre overflow was even bigger than usual, and out technical team under the watchful eye of our Theatre Technician, James Lyons, gave everyone both in the Alington Hall and the Ashton an evening to remember. The House Singing Competition has become an event that represents all that is best about Shrewsbury: teamwork, originality and quality, with the individual right at the heart of the enterprise.

The St Cecilia Concerts were also very successful, with Maria Eglington's terrific direction of the Wind Orchestra, Nigel Gibbon's brave and polished account of fearsomely difficult music for brass ensemble, the Symphony Orchestra in the sonorous landscape of Brahms' 2nd Symphony, the Chamber Choir, Strings and, to finish, John Rutter's Magnificat with a beautiful solo contribution by Edwina Coward.

The three Carol Services took these annual events to new heights of musical perfection and were a triumph for Kathryn Burningham and her Chapel Choir. The plaudits flowed in and deservedly so.

Meanwhile in October, Sam Wilson's GCSE composition 'Chernobyl' was broadcast to Ukraine and Russia on the BBC's World Service. Written for the new Sarcophagus which is to be built over the dangerous nuclear reactors, it was inspired by the Ukrainian musicians and affected children Sam met while they were in Britain.

The final assembly of term gave a chance for one of our brightest new stars to shine. Iliana Grosse-Buening is a young pianist of exceptional quality, with an already impressive track record behind her before coming to Shrewsbury. Her performance of Ravel's Jeax d'Eau was



captivating, as were all her many appearances in concert last term. She also got through to the first round of the newly established James Mottram International Piano Competition at the Royal Northern College of Music.

The term ended in fine style with a marvellous Christmas Concert organised by two of last year's leavers, Henry Southern and Ben Edmunds, who put together a quite wonderful evening of jazz, magic, musicals and much more in aid of their respective gap year projects. Henry is, as I write, now teaching at our partner school in Bangkok, where I had the pleasure of conducting last term a Last Night of the Proms Concert. We hope very much to do so again this year, with possibly some of our students going to be part of the wonderful music-making that is also happening in Bangkok, where the performances are led by Old Salopian Jonathan Ling, who has just joined the music staff there.

So much to report, and so much left unsaid about the music making of the Michaelmas Term 2008. Congratulations to Stephen Craigen and Sam Grainger who have been offered places to read music at Cambridge. Congratulations also to Gessica Howarth for gaining a place in the National Youth Choir, and to Alex Collins in gaining a distinction aged only 15 in his Trinity Guildhall ATCL Diploma recital on clarinet.

During the holidays, we enjoyed providing a feast of music for Sophie Heber-Percy's wedding, daughter of one of our Governors. This term we have already celebrated an extremely successful performance of **Harry!** in London and we look forward to our concert in St John's Smith Square on 1st March and the realisation of the **Darwin Cantata 'Evolution'** at the end of this term. A term of challenges but also of glorious opportunity, as ever.

Shrewsbury and Darwin on BBC

Last week a camera crew from BBC Midlands Today visited the School as part of the coverage of the Darwin Bicentenary celebrations. News presenter, **Nick Owen** met two students, **Nigel Fullerton** and **Dom Evans** in the Biology Buildings, where they discussed the importance of Darwin in their studies. The crew then visited the Moser Library where Nick Owen read on camera the famous letter in which Darwin laments his own lack of direction, prior to departing on the Voyage of the Beagle.

"I am as idle as idle can be: one of the causes you have hit on, viz irresolution the other is being made fully aware that my noddle is not capacious enough to retain or comprehend Mathematics. Beetle hunting & such things I grieve to say is my proper sphere ...".

Following their visit to the School, the TV crew filmed at Darwin's birthplace on the Mount and at the Old School, now the Town Library. The news item was screened on Midlands Today at 6.30 p.m. on Wednesday 11th February 2009.

Nick Owen is an Old Salopian and boarded in Riggs Hall from 1961-1966 where he studied Classics under the guidance of Richard Raven, Mark Mortimer and Stacey Coleman. Spanish Trip to La Coruña: February 14th -19th 2009

Seventeen fourth and fifth formers, accompanied by Mr. Wright and Mr. Hamm stepped out into the mild night of La Coruña and were met by Ben Smith of Atlantik English, who organised the trip along with the Head of the Spanish.

We spent six days staying individually with Spanish families, of various sizes and in various abodes across the city. That day, a coach trip to the infamous pilgrimage site and traditional city of Santiago de Compostela was enthusiastically undertaken by the group, café con leche in the sunshine during our free time was only surpassed by a guided tour of both the cathedral and local university, the first of which took us to the cathedral roof and a panoramic view of the city.

Galicia is a region known for its rich surfing history and on Tuesday we attended lessons from a qualified instructor including safety issues and its origins in Hawaii. In the afternoon we put the theory into practice and spent several hours riding the waves, falling over and generally having a great time. We left confident and with certificates of achievements for our efforts. The next day was focused on typical Spanish food and all the relevant vocabulary and phrases. We witnessed a step-by-step demonstration from a local chef making a tortilla española in a practical and interactive class. The afternoon was followed by a walk to La Torre de Hercules - the world's oldest functioning lighthouse, and we played beach football overlooking the sea, Mr. Wright particularly keen to get involved! Chemistry Olympiad 2009

Sunday 15 February 2009

Once again eight students took part in Round 1 of the International Chemistry Olympiad in February. This year, the students were all members of the Upper Sixth. The paper itself is based on the core of the chemistry A-level specifications, so that students taking any of the different exam board A-levels can compete fairly. The exam lasts two hours and is composed of a series of structured questions designed to stretch able students by making them apply the principles they have learnt to new and often more complex situations than they would meet in their A-level course. Thus, in order to score marks, it is essential to have a very sound base of knowledge and understanding, but also have the ability to think and reason - often "outside the box" - at a high level.

The students concerned had worked at this with a weekly session going back to the previous June. Initially taking the on-line LVI Chemistry Olympiad, and then beginning intensive preparation for the more demanding Olympiad itself.

The results were once again very pleasing, and the students can be very proud of their efforts and achievements. Chao Yin Lim (SH) - heading for University College, Oxford to read Biochemistry - obtained a Gold Medal (following up the full marks he obtained in the on-line Olympiad, and Bronze Medal in the 2008 Olympiad). Chris Tham (Ch), who is going to read Medicine at St.John's College, Cambridge, obtained a Silver Medal, whilst Bronze Medals were awarded to Oliver Oak (SH), Oscar Tso (M), and Mubin Yusof (S).

It is worth bearing in mind that only 197 out of 2165 candidates were awarded Gold Medals!



Rugby: 1st XV Dublin Tour February 2009

25 boys and 4 staff headed to Hollyhead on Saturday 14th Feb to catch the fast ferry to Dublin for a 4-day tour.

Over 900 schools had previously entered the regional heats.



Jeremy Goulding to retire in August 2010

Thursday 5 March 2009

Shrewsbury School, one of the leading independent schools in the country, is seeking to appoint a new Head, following the decision by the current Headmaster, Jeremy Goulding, to retire at the age of 60 in the summer of 2010.

The appointment of a new Head comes at an important time for Shrewsbury School, which has recently undertaken a £14 million investment programme in new facilities. This unprecedented development programme could not have been achieved without the support of the alumni and the wider Salopian community.

Chairman of Governors, Richard Burbidge OBE, commented:

"Under Jeremy Goulding's stewardship Shrewsbury has flourished and evolved. The academic life of the school has been strongly developed; examination results have been ever more impressive; the arts, drama and music continue at the highest quality; and sporting achievements abound.

Jeremy Goulding is a very hard act to follow. In his 8 years as Head, indeed throughout his 30 years' involvement with the School, he has made a lasting and important contribution to Shrewsbury's ability to thrive and flourish.

In my view Jeremy's singular contribution has been to implement the Governors' 2005 decision to welcome girls to Shrewsbury for the first time in our history. The first 36 Sixth Form girls arrived in September 2008 and the 2009 entry is over-subscribed. These new Salopians have already contributed hugely to the school. The Governors will be seeking a successor who has the vision, leadership and credentials to take the School forward. We are looking for experienced candidates from a wide background and expect to have made an appointment later this year, so that there is a well-planned handover.

A first-class education in a thriving school is one of the best gifts parents can offer their children and the Governors are determined that Shrewsbury School will continue to provide exactly that under the direction of a new Head, building on Jeremy Goulding's legacy."

Founded in 1552, Shrewsbury School is one of the great scholarly Foundations in England. The School provides boarding and day pupil education for over 700 pupils aged 13-18, with 36 girls currently in the first year of the Sixth Form. The School occupies a beautiful 105 acre site, bordering the River Severn in the heart of the historic county town of Shrewsbury.

Shrewsbury through to final in chamber music competition

Six musicians from Shrewsbury School have reached the final of a major national music competition. The competition is part of the Pro Corda Chamber Music Festival, which aims to encourage and celebrate the performance of chamber music among young instrumentalists of both primary and secondary ages. The group is coached weekly by Maria Eglinton, who is a member of staff at the School and a graduate of the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama.

The sextet from Shrewsbury School achieved a distinction in the first round, and have just heard that they have won a place in the finals after competing in the semi-finals at Wycombe Abbey School in Buckinghamshire last week.

The finalists are drawn from fifteen schools amongst which are Charterhouse in Surrey and Millfield in Somerset. The final will take place on Sunday at Westminster School in London and the group will be performing the Sextet by the French composer, Poulenc.

The winning ensemble will give a concert performance at the prestigious Wigmore Hall in London.



St. John's, Smith Square - Sunday 1st March 2009

Tuesday 10 March 2009

Shrewsbury School musicians returned to the beautiful venue of St. John's, Smith Square in London for an evening concert on Sunday 1st March. The concert was given by Shrewsbury School Symphony and String Orchestras, Chamber Choir and Brass Ensemble.

St. John's, Smith Square - situated in the heart of Westminster - is regarded not only as one of the masterpieces of the English Baroque, but also as one of London's finest concert venues, attracting artists and performers of international renown.

The programme included Brahms – Symphony No. 2, Violin Concerto no 1 by Bruch, played by Chris Cox (Moser's Hall), and Britten – Serenade for Tenor, Horn and Strings, with the tenor role being sung by Dan Norman O.S.

Martin Knox wrote the following review:

"In the absence of a performance in Shrewsbury, there was only one opportunity to hear this varied and challenging programme, an added incentive to make the trip to London. In any case, there is always something special about the annual pilgrimage which brings out the best in the School's musicians.

Old Salopians are often to be seen in the audience, but this year we welcomed **Daniel Norman** (Ingram's 1984-1988) to the platform, as a soloist in Britten's serenade for tenor, horn, and strings. Fulfilling the promise he showed in his schooldays, Daniel is flourishing in his career as a singer and it was good to see him giving his time to the School's music-making. A busy man, he had already been on stage at Covent Garden that afternoon! From the start, his clarity of diction and subtle use of gesture held our attention, and he was always comfortable with the fearsomely wide range required. Sharing the solo work was a current Ingramite, **Stephen Craigen** (Upper VI), who has already demonstrated his virtuosity at this venue. Here, he showed himself equal to the task of performing music originally written for Dennis Brain, the leading horn player of his time. In acclaiming the formidable standard set in the opening item, the polished contribution of the String Orchestra under **David Joyce** should not be overlooked.

There followed four songs from the repertoire of Dympna Nightingale's chamber choir, a select ensemble of talented individuals blending into a finely disciplined whole. Their tonal balance, whether singing softly or at full power, is a treat to hear.

In a break with tradition, **Nigel Gibbon** and the Wind Band had to wait until the third slot before raising the roof of the venerable building. When their turn eventually came, the violence of the opening attack seemed to be making a point. "Dreams" might suggest tranquillity, but Moren's title for the first movement, "Nightmares", gives the game away. This is music designed to shock and by the end, I felt battered by it all. That in no way suggests that the performance was out of control; on the contrary, it is hugely to the credit of all concerned that so many musicians could handle such complex material, and with such verve.

From what was described in the programme as "visions of insanity", the scene shifted to one of the most serene landscapes in all music, Bruch's Violin Concerto No 1, given by **Christopher Cox**, with the orchestra which he regularly leads. Initially reticent, he grew in confidence, sensing as he must have done the rapt response of his listeners and I suspect that further public airings will add panache to sensitivity. The standing ovation should surely have convinced him how much his performance had been appreciated. It is always a telling sign when the staff of the concert hall applaud as vigorously as they did on this occasion.



Yes, it was nine o'clock, and, yes, there was the interval and a symphony to come! John Moore believes in giving his pilgrims value for their pains, and I for one wouldn't have it any other way.

Brahms' 2nd Symphony, written in Alpine retreat and sometimes referred to as his 'Pastoral', was paradoxically described by the composer as "the music of melancholy". It was the sunny side which came out on top in this version, and while there were awkward moments in bridge passages, the themes were securely and sympathetically rendered. Particularly successful were the wistful second movement and the final allegro con spirito, the latter taken at a tempo reminiscent of Klemperer, allowing every detail to emerge. The principal trumpet shone through with special brilliance in the uplifting conclusion of the work — and of a memorable evening. Parents and friends crowded round to offer congratulations and, late though it was, nobody was in a hurry to leave. Yet again, St John's had cast its spell.



J15 triumph and Top Squad buoyant

Tuesday 10 March 2009

An account of RSSBC at the Schools' Head of River Race.

Tuesday 10 March 2009 saw the annual battle on the Tideway, down four and a half miles of the Thames from Mortlake to Putney. On a day with a very full tide on a fast ebb, plenty of river water flowing and a good tail wind the conditions were fast and flat, allowing crews with good technique and fitness to maximise their potential.

The J15 squad rose magnificently to the task. Confident, determined rowing and some brave coxing gave the A boat the Championship J15 event by 1 second over Hampton in a strong field, coming in the process a creditable 52nd overall. A similar performance from the B boat gave them the J15B event by 5s, again over Hampton, beating in the process 15 crews at J15A level as well. This huge and dominant result has been a long time in the making, and bodes very well for the coming years. Many congratulations to both crews and to Dr Pattenden and Mr Manser for their input in generating this success.

After three years of complete domination in this event, Top Squad boats were (as usual) under the microscope. Both 1st VIII and 2nd VIII came second. Not third, not fifth, not top ten, not top half. Second. Let none be despondent. In any 'normal' year, and in any school in the country, Tuesday's results are extremely good.

The 1st VIII broke the course record, beating fistfuls of other ambitious school crews, some carrying very expensive marques, and holding the eventual winners, Eton, to 5 seconds after nearly 17 minutes. Strong, determined, consistent rowing that moved the boat very fast. The 2nd VIII were only a second or two away from the course record at their level, rowed like pros and attracted a very positive commentary from many observers in terms of 'dynamic rowing'. As well as beating all other 2nd VIIIs bar one (again, Eton, whom they held to 4s), they also beat more than 20 other schools' First VIIIs, and were placed 19th overall of all entrants in the entire country (and two from overseas) on the day.

Together with the outstanding J15 achievements, Shrewsbury's name is still written very big in the waters of the Thames. OK, there's the reaction of the consummate pro within the squad: 'we didn't win'. But the look on the faces of some other coaches after the race said it all - what do we have to do to beat Shrewsbury? In the context of a small squad that some outsiders (doubting Thomases, all!) wrote off in October because of the large U6 leave last year and the relative youth of those training this year (and my goodness, how hard they have trained), Tuesday's results keep the Maltese cross on a navy flag not just nailed but glued and screwed firmly to the mast of Sabrina's ambition. This relatively inexperienced squad has performed brilliantly well. And what a five year set of results this forms.

The Old Salopians have won the Arthur Dunn Cup on many occasions, including the first, fiftieth and centenary finals.



Maths: Record number of certificates won in the UK Intermediate Mathematical Challenge

The results of the first round of the UK Intermediate Mathematical Challenge have arrived, with a record number of certificates awarded to Lower School boys this year: 33 gold, 30 silver and 42 bronze. Chemistry: Schools' Analyst Competition 2009

Friday 3 April 2009

Following on the heels of last year's fine showing in the National Schools' Analyst Competition, Shrewsbury once again entered a strong team of L6 chemists for the Midlands event, held at Nottingham Trent University during the Easter holiday.

The competition involved pupils competing against twelve other schools, conducting team based research using sophisticated analytical techniques used by university research scientists. This year saw students analysing sports drinks, cheap cola and malt vinegar. Flame photometry and high performance liquid chromatography techniques were used, together with more traditional titrations. Max Emmerich (Rt), Ieuan Fenton (Rb) and Gessica Howarth (MSH) made up a confident and talented team, and we felt that this could be our year, given that we have finished 2nd and 3rd in this competition over the last couple of years. The lurking presence of Loughborough Grammar School (winners for the last 2 years) was enough to keep us on our mettle.

Once again, the Salopian entry finished in time; an impressive achievement given the sheer volume of work that was expected of the pupils. In committee awaiting the final results the pupils felt that barring a couple of slips, it had gone well. All three had worked hard and were confident that their calculations were accurate; the calculations of standard deviation had taken up quite a lot of time, and though confident that they had got them correct, they were disappointed to hear that these would not be counted, as so few of the teams could understand them! When the result was announced that Loughborough Grammar had been beaten into second place, it looked as though our chance had come, but in the end it was Camphill School for boys that took the honours; this team contained the pupils who had been placed 1st and 2nd in the recent RSC '5 decade challenge', so it was indeed poor luck to come up against a School containing pupils of this calibre (and making their debut in the competition). Though we were also edged out of 3rd place too by a very strong side from Nottingham, this should not detract from a successful day, and one from which the pupils enjoyed themselves, and learned a great deal. They should be proud of their efforts.

After the presentation, POISE was declared the winning entry, and they were given funding of £100,000 to take their work into production. Much of this funding will go towards making the software modifications required, but the School also hope to have the full Mission Control Workstation in place before Speech Day on Friday 3rd July.

Tom Burgess (Rb), Josh Richards (Rb) and OS Charlie Jones were interviewed by www.space.co.uk after they were declared to have won the £100,000. Space.co.uk wrote "In this short interview we learn about the SSTL Space Cometition and the team that were the winners. This was a major achievement for this team from Shrewsbury School who are among the growing number of young people taking inspiration from space and the opportunity to work with industry leaders such as SSTL." Physicists currently in the Lower VI will be joining the POISE team at the end of April, while some of the founder members will be leaving School at the end of the summer term. As the project is expected to continue to gather and process data from the satellite 'Deep Sea II' for a futher four years, many team members will continue to be involved in the project long after they have left Shrewsbury. A group of them will be spending time at Bath University later this term to carry out more testing.

Team members have also been invited to the opening of the new European Space Agency Centre in Harwell, Oxfordshire in July, where they will meet Lord Drayson, the UK Science Minister (and racing driver).

The Charles Darwin Cantata

Friday 10 April 2009

As part of the commemoration of the 200th anniversrary of the birth of Shrewsbury's most famous pupil, a group of four boys in the Upper Sixth - Chris Cox, Stephen Craigen, Sam Grainger and Philipp Legner - have composed the *Darwin Cantata*. Scored for full orchestra and choir, the Cantata celebrates Darwin's life and work and his theory of evolution.

The Cantata was performed first at the End of Term Concerts on 21st and 22nd March 2009. The following is an extract from the End of Term Programme:

- 1. Orchestral Prelude: Dawn of Nature
- 2. Chorus: Organic Life
- 3. Orchestral Interlude: The Voyage on the Beagle
- 4. Chorus: Immortal Love
- 5. Chorus: Man's derived Supremacy

Two centuries ago, Charles Darwin went to school in Shrewsbury. Today pupils of Shrewsbury School have composed a cantata to celebrate the birthday of this most famous old-Salopian.

When we were asked to write this cantata, we had no plan or structure so that everything we wanted to compose was limited only by our imagination. After having studied Darwin's life and his theory in a lot of detail, we decided to address three different topics in our composition.

Firstly we tried to "translate" evolution into music — starting with a simple theme, which then started evolving gradually becoming more complex for us. The note E soon became the metaphor for evolution. In the cantata you will hear many different themes and motives evolving out of this note E.

We also wanted to depict Darwin's voyage on the Beagle – the sea, the sounds of the South American rainforest and the Galapagos Islands. The voyage on the Beagle was a turning point in Darwin's life and was the initiation for his later theory.

Finally we also wanted to refer to the big argument about Darwin's revolutionary theory — and Darwin's glorious Triumph. We used the 1860 Oxford Evolution Debate as a base, where Thomas Henry Huxley and Samuel Wilberforce, Bishop of Oxford, argued about Darwin's Theory.

At present, Evolution is still "evolving" itself and is not yet finished; however we are going to present to you five movements which have already been composed.

The text of **Organic Life** – as well as **Immortal Love** – is taken from The Temple of Nature, a poem by Erasmus Darwin, Charles Darwin's grandfather. Although he didn't know the principle of natural selection, Erasmus Darwin writes about immutable immortal laws, the great first cause and the development of species. It was certainly some of those ideas, that inspired Charles Darwin to write about natural selection.

The orchestral interlude **The Voyage on the Beagle** was composed to emulate some of the experiences Darwin might have had during travels. Try and imagine bird song from the rainforest, the roaring sea and howling wind.

Man's derived Supremacy is a very dramatic chorus describing how the theory of evolution was regarded by the rest of the world. Many people were outraged about the theory of evolution, shouting in anger. But there were others in favour, supporting Darwin's argument. In the end it is clear that Darwin was right, and the canatata ends with grand, triumphant finale.

Old Salopian provides medical support to cricket teams playing half way up Everest

Tuesday 21 April 2009

Old Salopian **Breck Lord** (1999, M) is providing medical support to 'The Everest Test' - a competitive Twenty20 cricket match played today more than half way up Mt. Everest, at an altitude of 5165m.

The two teams played the match on the plateau of Gorak Shep, after a gruelling 9-day trek. At this level, they would only have had 66% of the oxygen found at sea level, but their success sets an official world record for the highest altitude for field sport.

Breck came to Shrewsbury from The King's School, Paramatta in Australia (from which establishment, we've also had several fine Gappers) and he settled into Salopian life very quickly indeed, as a result of which he ended up as a School Praepostor, Secretary of Boats (1997/8) and Captain of Boats (1998/9). He is particularly well remembered by his old rowing coach, Steve Fox (now Housemaster at Moser's), for winning a gold medal at the National Schools' Regatta in a coxless four in 1999, setting a record which - to the best of his knowledge - still stands. With a lively sense of humour and a real interest in many facets of life, Breck even taught himself to play the bagpipes whilst at Shrewsbury and, having got straight As at GCSE (four of which were starred) and straight As at A level, he was able to gain entry to St. Catharine's College, Cambridge to read Medicine so is now a fully-qualified doctor.

The Everest Test world record attempt hopes to raise £250,000 for charity across Britain, the Himalayas and developing world. The playing kit will also be donated to the local Khumjung School.

D of E Gold: Sea Kayaking Training Expedition to Anglesey

Friday 1 May 2009

After weeks of rigorous safety training in the pool, until rolling was instinctive and our bodies were finely tuned to respond to anything mother nature could throw at us, the Shrewsbury School Duke of Edinburgh Sea Kayaking team departed belatedly from school, following some minor drama as one group member had forgotten to put their clock forward an hour, for a five day training excursion.

After an hour and a half in a minibus we arrived at Llyn Padarn(a lake near Llanberis). The day way focused around fitting our boats correctly, and practising very basic manoeuvring. That evening we found our way to the youth hostel on Holy Island off Anglesey where we met Oswestry School's Scotland Sea Kayaking team who were also training in the area.

On day two we met up with Pat our instructor and his glittery kayak. We began with some races (Pat's team being affectionately nicknamed the 'Glitter Boys') and then spent the afternoon surfing in on the waves. The dry suits were tested to their full and found wanting as everyone finished up wet following much capsizing and sand rolling. But there were certainly less of these towards the end as we all improved. Dr Case tried to spark some Eskimo rolls in the bay but few were mad enough to follow his example whilst the wind whipped up the white water and the waves rose higher.





Day three was undoubtedly the enchanting highlight of the trip as we kayaked against the tide from Penmon on the East of Anglesey around Puffin Island and back. Having passed the lighthouse we slowly circumnavigated the island in awe of the ecology. There were myriad birds



including Oystercatchers, Puffins and Guillemots. The most momentous sight was that of the Grey seals on the rocks and in the water. But on the return we were a little late and a few members of the group were almost dragged into an overfall – where the risen seabed constricted the flow of the tide causing standing waves and rough water. At first it seemed that it was coming towards us but in reality the tide was dragging us into it. Thanks to some contagious calm and instruction from the coaches and some hard paddling all round we all emerged safely. Having landed Harry and Dan opted to go for a swim in the sea; they lasted for an admirable twenty-five seconds. After this we all recovered with a café stop on the way home.

Following an unexpectedly early get-up on day four due to a fire alarm at 5:45 we cracked on with planning for the trip to a camp site. We departed in fully laden boats at 12:00 bound for Borthwen Bay. We paddled and rock-hopped our way up the coast. We arrived at camp in the late afternoon, loaded the boats and set up camp. From then we washed and ate until it became dark and then we went to bed.

Day five was a clear up before we drove back to Shrewsbury through blazing sunshine arriving back at school at 12:30. The remainder of the day followed with washing equipment and some preparation and planning for our assessment expedition in Croatia. It was an excellent few days and the team are murmering about an extra practice in the summer holidays just to enjoy the sea.

OS James Taylor (R 2008 leaver) scored his maiden century for Leicestershire in a match against Middlesex, earning the county and English coach Tim Boon a hard-earned draw.

Last summer, he scored 898 runs in schools cricket at an average of 179.60. His record while in the Shrewsbury first XI is worth recording. Between 2004-2008, he scored 4,017 runs at an average of 65.7, and, in the Lord's Taverners competition won by the School at under-15 level, he amassed 541 runs in six innings, including four centuries, without losing his wicket. He finished the final, at Lord's, with a six.

Jimmy has also been named as the Young Wisden Schools Cricketer of the Year.

James Taylor, the batsman who blossomed in Shropshire, has enhanced his reputation as one of the golden cricketing talents of his generation by winning the top junior accolade in the sport.

The 19-year-old, who spent five years at Shrewsbury School, was today announced as the **Young Wisden Schools Cricketer of the Year**.

Taylor is due to receive his prize at a special awards dinner in London tonight, but faces a race against time to reach the capital because he was today playing a pre-season friendly for current county Leicestershire against his former club Worcestershire.

And the talented right-handed batsman has paid tribute to his coaches at Shrewsbury School, where he arrived as a 14-year-old before leaving last summer.

"I'm very honoured to win this award and I'm really hoping I can get to the dinner tonight," said Taylor.

"It's a great start to the year for me and a lot of it is down to my coaches at Shrewsbury School.

"The likes of Andy Barnard, Paul Pridgeon, Steve Gale and Will Hughes were all amazing and they just allowed me to play as much as I could - I can't thank them enough."

Taylor's award is no surprise after he scored 898 runs in schools cricket last year, averaging an astounding 179.60.



In a little over four years at Shrewsbury School, he scored 3,164 - excluding tour and knockout games.

His record has also been noticed on the first class and international scene.

Taylor - who also spent one season playing Birmingham League cricket for Shrewsbury - was signed by Leicestershire last year, breaking into both the championship and one-day teams at the end of the season and earning a three-year contract.

And he has just returned from a tour of South Africa with England under 19, where he played nine times.

Andy Barnard, master in charge of cricket at Shrewsbury School, admitted Taylor's talents were clear for all to see after he made his first team debut at just 14.

"His record for Shrewsbury School has been fantastic and I think only Alistair Cook has scored more runs in schools cricket than him," he added.

"Coaches all over the country in schools cricket said James was as good a young player as they have seen for a very, very long time.

"We all think he will go on and have a very good career in First Class cricket and hopefully beyond.

"I was trying four years ago to put a bet on Joe Hart to play for England at football and James Taylor to play for England at cricket and I still think that will be the case."



Wallingford Regatta May 2009

Tuesday 5 May 2009

The Shrewsbury School first VIII has continued its winning traditions at the Wallingford Regatta. This event, run on May 3rd, is one of the largest one-day schoolboy regattas in the country. With stiff opposition from Eton, Radley, St. Pauls, Hampton and others, many schools regard the Wallingford Regatta as the final 'tune-up' before the National Schools Regatta and as such come prepared to race hard.

Racing in the south rarely favours Shrewsbury - travel requires a commitment of human resources: time and energy - but on Sunday, Shrewsbury made the trip worth the effort, as they finished second in their first race and emerged the victor from their second. In the IM1 race, Shrewsbury and the rest of the field were surprised by the power and speed of Eton's starting minute - after 500 meters it became clear that the race was on for second place. At this point, Shrewsbury was rowing in fifth place, behind all the other schools: but not for long. Slowly, with the power and poise that has become their hallmark, the Shrewsbury School first VIII rowed through St. Pauls, Hampton and Latymer, relying on the length of the stroke and access to the water in windy conditions to win the day. On Sunday, it was a victory for the fundamentals of technique and racing intelligence over brute power.

In the afternoon, Shrewsbury School dispatched all crews with relative ease, winning the IM2 event by the healthy margin of six seconds. In the final, they wrestled with a University of London eight for 600 meters, before breaking open water and rowing away with the win. For their efforts, they retain the Lorcha Challenge Cup for another year.

A young crew - with only three men in the Upper-Sixth - Shrewsbury's results at Wallingford augur well for the reaminder of the season and years to come.

Wednesday 27 May 2009

During a weekend in which the suncream was more appropriate than an umbrella, the wind still blew. Not, true, as strong as last year, nor from the same direction, but still enough to cause the lags to mutter about lane differentials and gearing ratios. A south westerly cross-head wind which lasted all weekend greeted and bade farewell to all comers at the National Schools Regatta 2009. Friday saw the J14 squad in vigorous action; Sunday saw the senior small boats, and the most successful action was on the Saturday.

Undaunted by the prevailing conditions, there were scenes of absolute triumph for Shrewsbury.

The J15A crew, unbeaten this season in their age group, victors on the Tideway in the Championship event, victors at Wallingford Head, at Reading Head, and at Wallingford Regatta, romped home to a glorious 4 second victory over Hampton in the Championship U15 event.

In any way one cares to measure it this crew is the fastest in its age group in the country this year. In the regattas they have rarely been led at any stage of any race, though that conceals the fact that they race responsively; as the season has progressed they have learned more properly how to race maturely, absorbing the impetus of another crew and responding with their own well-timed burst of sustainable speed, sometimes several times in one race. Their arsenal of race winning factors has grown large; its combination has worked well, and it bodes very well for the future.

A bronze medal for the J15 B illustrates the depth of talent in that particular squad. In a heat they demonstrated the potential to gain a medal, and in the final they did not disappoint, except possibly themselves.

Mastering the conditions well they raced a fast second half after a slow start (that left them last by 2 lengths from the leaders at the 500m point in a 2000m race); it was enough to overhaul three other crews with a magnificent burst towards the end of the race and claim their medal.

Both of the coaches, Paul Pattenden and Paul Manser, have worked hard and with skill to produce these results from the J15 squad, and our congratulations go to them. Others have contributed a ha'p'worth here and there too, not least from a historical perspective: it is a fitting post-script to note that the previous occasion on which Shrewsbury won the Championship J15A event (The Founder's Cup) was in 1981. Shrewsbury 's name is on the cup, but absent is the name of the coach, a certain J Goulding, Esq.

The 2nd VIII raced in their customary fashion: aggressively, and in doing so gained a highly creditable silver medal. There are some very gritty light racers, some also quite young, in that crew. Having come second on the Tideway in March it is immensely satisfying for this unit to have repeated the success on the same national scale a second time, and indeed to have come so close to being first. After a blistering start, the eventual winners, Eton, were lying in second place to Shrewsbury until the final 400m, having been kept there through the gruelling middle 1000m, but their size (and presumably their hours of training, like ours) eventually paid off.



Both crews were well clear of the following pack, Abingdon trailing third over the line by more than two lengths.

The silver medal came in part from the right mental approach in difficult circumstances; the difficulty arose while watching the first VIII in its repechage. Every fibre in the 2nd VIII's corporate body screamed "that's wrong" when the immediate opponents knocked the first VIII out, and the resulting anger at the perceived injustice in the face of this abberation gave them additional fuel in the final. Without attempting to sugar-coat a uniquely disappointing result for the first VIII, for nothing can replace an absent medal, success from within the same squad can at least mitigate the result, and the first VIII successes earlier this season against all other schools but one speak for themselves. Shrewsbury's new Headmaster is appointed

Thursday 18 June 2009

Mark Turner, Headmaster of Abingdon School, will be the next Headmaster of Shrewsbury School

On 18th June it was announced that Mark Turner, currently Headmaster of Abingdon School, will succeed Jeremy Goulding as Headmaster of Shrewsbury in September 2010.

While the news has doubtless been received at Abingdon with very mixed feelings – for Mr Turner has led, and continues to lead, the school with great distinction – the Salopian community takes much pleasure in such a fine appointment.

Interestingly, the path between Abingdon and Shrewsbury has been travelled before. In 1975, Sir Eric Anderson KT moved from the Headmastership of Abingdon to that of Shrewsbury, from which he proceeded, after five years, to be Headmaster, and later Provost, of Eton. Jeremy Goulding also began his teaching career at Abingdon before moving to teach at Shrewsbury, and returning later as Headmaster.

It is a cause of real delight at Shrewsbury that the historic link between these two great schools now continues with the appointment of Mark Turner, who is widely recognised as one of the outstanding Headmasters of his generation.

The International Young Physicists Tournament (IYPT) 2008/2009

Monday 6 July 2009

The Young Physicists Tournament came into being in 1979 as a competition for secondary schools in Moscow, and was originally orgainsed by Moscow State University Physics Faculty. Since 1988, the competition has become international, and has more recently attracted teams from all five continents.

The competition itself consists of teams of five students from each country challenging each other to present their solutions to a selection from seventeen very challenging physics problems. The problems are set prior to the competition by an international panel of professional physicists and teachers. Perhaps the most interesting aspect of IYPT is that a student from another team then attempts to tear holes in the presenter's solution in an ensuing 'Physics Fight'. The latter can become very heated indeed, with reputations at stake! Winning teams in recent years have come from Slovakia, Germany and Poland where, in common with many other countries, the competition is taken very seriously indeed.

Shrewsbury School's first involvement with IYPT was also the UK's. Sue Fryer, Business and Industry Manager of the Institute of Physics, had been a juror at IYPT for a couple of years before taking the plunge, and seeking out a team of students to represent the UK. In 2003, Shrewsbury School won through to become the first UK school to compete at the IYPT competition, in that year in Uppsala, Sweden. After a tentative start to the competition, and having had to climb a steep 'learning curve', the team went from strength to strength, eventually coming joint third. A truly remarkable achievement.

In 2004 the competition moved to Brisbane, Australia, but unfortunately the dates clashed with public examinations, preventing any UK school from entering. By this time however, Mr John Balcombe of Shrewsbury School Physics Department had become the UK representative on the International Organising Committee and Independent Juror. He also took on the task of finding UK teams for 2005 and thereafter.

On Wednesday, 3rd December 2008, a team of five students from Shrewsbury School competed in the UK final to determine who would represent the UK at the International Young Physicists Tournament at Nankai University, TianJin, China in July 2009. Phillip Legner (Captain), Charlie Jones, Ben Powell Davies, Gessica Howarth, and David Kell took on teams from Brentwood School and John Leggott College, and proved to be the best young physicists on the day. Presenting reports on 'The Oscillations of Magnetically Coupled Compass Needles', and 'The Motion of a Spinning Cup on a Wet Surface', they combined excellence in physics, mathematics and presentational skills. They also proved very capable of defending their solutions to the problems against fierce opposition from the other teams.

They will now go on to solve a total of seventeen similarly obscure problems in readiness for the international competition.

Shrewsbury through to the International Final in China

Just before Christmas a team of 5 sixth formers won the UK Final and are now preparing to represent the UK at the 22nd IYPT to be held at Nankai University in Tianjin, a couple of hours



from Beijing in China, from 21st-28th July. The team is a mixture of upper and lower sixth formers:

Philipp Legner (O, U6) (captain) Ben Powell-Davies (PH, U6) Charlie Jones (PH, U6) Gessica Howarth (MSH, L6) David Kell (SH, L6)

This year we have the bonus of a Harvard Fellow, Max Chalfin, who is also a physicist and who is happy to spend long hours in the laboratory with the team as they tackle difficult problems involving research, theory and creative experimentation. Steve Adams and John Balcombe are also working closely with the team and can share the experience gained from previous tournaments in Sweden, Switzerland, Slovakia, Australia, Korea and Croatia. The UK has never reached the grand final (top three teams) but with a strong team and able support that is our goal this time.

Henley Royal Regatta 2009

Friday 3 July 2009

The 1st VIII raced, and lost, against Pangbourne College at 2.40pm today, partly due to an electrical error in the cox box that led to a communications breakdown. Philip Lapage's summary follows:

I wish I could remember what Nick Henderson said to the crew in the boat tent after the race. Though deeply bitten by the emotion of the moment himself he maintained that iron grip over himself and - yes - us all as he let the crew down gently, with honor (I'll go with that spelling out of respect for the interpretation he has imbued it with) and with a sense of pride in their season. What follows is a pastiche of impressions which blur in the emotion of the moment, but let them represent it.

"You are a Friday crew. Not a Thursday crew or a Wednesday crew. OK it might have been a Saturday crew but hey - stuff happens, and that's racing. You should be proud of your achievements this week. Compare yourselves to where you were a month ago, and see how far you have come. Even to a fortnight ago. To the seniors in the sqaud, this may be your last race for Shrewsbury but it sure is not the last race you will do. Move on with determination. To the younger members, look forward with anticipation to great things at school. See what a season you have had and relate that to what some were saying about the squad in the early days. Cox/Blake - pairs head winners. Schools Head - 2nd. Wallingford winners. Fiennes - awesome. Lambie - powerhouse. To our youngest guest member - look forward with eagerness and aggression. I am proud of you all." He omitted Wallingford Head and Reading Head - winners. Those whom he did not mention by name or by implication were included with a sense of achievement as a unit - none were left out.

For the record, on todays' race - Pangbourne opened out a third of a length by the barrier and 2/3 length at Fawley. By Upper Thames the lead was down to half a length and entering the enclosures it was about 3 feet. Electrical problems with the cox box led to a communications breakdown at a fairly crucial part of the race, but hey, stuff happens. That's racing.

Thursday 2nd July

5.05pm Shrewsbury 1st VIII vs. Westminster:

At 5.01 Thursday the crew were firmly in place on the stake boat - and just as well, as the same umpire (a certain Richard Stanhope) who had given me the helpful advice yesterday about getting there in time was in charge of today's race. Calm - and I mean that - pervaded the Shrewsbury crew as they squared up against a Westminster crew dressed in their characteristic shocking pink all-in-ones.

"When I see that you are both straight and ready I will start you like this....attention - Go!"

For perhaps 10 strokes the crews were level as every sinew in both boats strained to accelerate up to race pace. As the start routine came to an end and the serious business of high speed sustainable racing came in to play it became very apparent that the Shrewsbury boat was, simply, a lot faster, and nothing Westminster could do would be able to change that. One length at the barrier, two at Fawley, three at the enclosures and three and a half by the end, with Shrewsbury coming in at a relaxed rating of 30 to some very encouraging applause. There is a wonderful level



of support from many many friends all along the regatta course, and our thanks go out to all of them.

Wednesday 1st July

A late-night summary of the exciting day's races from Philip Lapage:

Hot! So much so that for the second (third?) recorded time EVER the members in the Stewards Enclosure were allowed to Take Off Their Jackets. In an atmosphere where the dress length for ladies has to be just so below the knee, and 'bulldogs' patrol seeking to evict any without an entry badge, this relaxation on the part of the organisers was a salute to the really extraordinary and difficult weather conditions facing the oarsmen.

The first Eight drew Bedford Modern School at 2.40 pm, in the thick of the atmospheric treacle; BMS being winners of the Childe Beale Cup at the National Schools Regatta (one level below the Championship Eights). Basing their expectations, not unreasonably, on Shrewsbury's performance in the last month, BMS reckoned that they were in with a chance. Feisty? Yes. Tenacious? Certainly. Perhaps they really were in with a chance, but they had reckoned without that grip, that absence of 'quit' injected by Nick Henderson, that technical advantage fostered over the long weeks by Todd Jesdale, and above all that desire to win, that slow burning anger within the crew to lay the ghosts of the past and show their colours. Nervous they certainly were, even allowing for James Lambie's laid back approach to the start timing: "You'd better advise them to get to the start a bit earlier next time" said the helpful ex-Olympian umpire to me as I watched, in silence (compulsory, even with a Jacket Off) from the launch (an extension of the Stewards Enclosure), "as they were within a whisker of being awarded a Penalty for Being Late". Reminds me of the occasion that James took the second eight off at high speed on a practise start into the sunset while Sir M. Pinsent and five other crews were waiting, fuming, for them. But in the end it was a one horse race, apart from a slight tussle between the start and the barrier (the first one-sixth or so of the race), and though the margin was not huge the result was not in much doubt after the first two minutes or so. So: electrolyte and recuperation and ready for a race at 5.05 Thursday against Westmister.

The second Eight faced giants at 7.05 pm in the form of University College, Dublin, B. The suffix 'B' was deceptive: in our race these hefty college crewmen beat their 'A' crew's race time (a short time earlier) by several seconds, recording a fast time of 6min 41. The second eight flew off the blocks in a valiant attempt to neutralise the weight differential, and led for the first quarter, even third, of the race. However with the relentlessness of a drum-driven slave ship the onslaught from the Emerald Isle proved to be too great; rating 2 pips or so below Shrewsbury they ground their way through the half length lead won early and strongly defended, never breaking free but ending up a length ahead as they crossed the line. This small and relatively insignificant-looking Shrewsbury crew delivers fireworks, though the sparkle was extinguished somewhat earlier than they would wish by a torrent of Irish musclepower. They have held their heads high in the company of rowing giants; what a fitting end to a season crowned with 2 silver medals at National level from a unit little expected by some to signify on the scale of accomplishment last September. Big hearts pulsing in small frames. But more, despite the disappointment of going out early there is immediate satisfaction of knowing that the only other second eight in the country to qualify (Eton) lost to Univ. Coll. Dublin 'A' by a bigger margin in a slower time. Great stuff, Shrewsbury!



It will be a fascinating race to watch tomorrow between these two Dublin crews proceeding through day 1: such are the vagaries of the draw that they face each other this early in the regatta. Hey ho - that's Henley.

Tuesday 30th Jun 2009 07:38 - an update on the 2nd VIII:

Last Friday the 2nd VIII rowed very fast at Henley. Unofficial timing has them as one of the faster (top three or four, subject to timing errors) qualifying crews. They are on very good form at present. Curiously, one of their assets is that they look puny! Sort of lulls the opposition, but they don't half go. They also won the schools event at Reading Regatta on Saturday - beating, among others, Shiplake College First VIII - twice.

Qualifying races are necessary because the Henley is an International Regatta which attracts huge numbers of hopefuls, and events like the Temple Cup are heavily oversubscribed. 8 college crews known to be fast this season are preselected into the draw (mere school crews are never preselected) and the rest have to race a Head Race competition to eliminate the slowest and provide the Stewards with the names of crews for the remainder of the draw - this, then, is the Qualifying Race. 14 crews qualified. 23 did not, among them all other school 2nd VIIIs bar one (Eton, which was marginally slower). Try www.hrr.co.uk/, then select 'qualifying races' for more info.

The Temple Cup also contains Ivy League crews from the USA (5 USA crews), 2 from the Netherlands, 2 from Ireland and this year a crew from Australia. Shrewsbury School 2nd VIII can hold its head very high just to be in such company.

The crew has drawn University College Dublin 'B' tomorrow - who also had to qualify and are not slow. The race time is scheduled (to be confirmed officially) for soon after 7pm. It should have some fireworks about it, either way.

The first VIII have drawn Bedford Modern School, winners of the Childe Beale Cup at National Schools (an event one level below the Championship event). No pushovers, therefore - BMS are a feisty crew. It will be a good race, though seeing the crews in preparation my money is firmly on Shrewsbury. 2.40 pm (tbc) is the race time. More anon.

7th September 2009

On 7th July 18 Shrewsbury pupils departed on a World Challenge expedition to Venezuela. After a short stop in Madrid, the group finally arrived in Caracas to find that the vast majority of their bags had not. So began a waiting game that ended two days later when a man in a truck turned up at our hotel with 19 shrinkwrapped parcels.

Amazingly this only put us about 4 hours off schedule and we set off for the Henri Pittier National Park for our acclimitaisation trek. The first "day" was a 2 hour walk in darkness uphill to our first campsite (which turned out to be no more than a slightly wider section of the path). Day 2 was almost all uphill for another 5 hours, but brought us out to a fantastic campsite with views of the city of Maracay. Day 3 was by far the hardest, 25 hours through the jungle on rough terrain. The guidance notes said that it would take at least 10 hours, we did it in 10.5, a credit to the resiliance of the team that everyone made it to the end. Day 4 was mostly downhill through Cocoa plantations bringing us to the end of the trail at a town called Chauo where the team gorged themselves on coca cola and chocolate cake (made from the local beans).

A day on Chuao beach was a welcome reward after such a challenging trek, and the prevalence of insects that feast on your legs did nothing to dampen everyone's spirits.

We are now in the city of Cuidad Bolivar ready to head to a remote Indian village where we will be painting a medical outpost and entertaining the children.

RMW 14th July 2009

We have just returned from the village of Boca de Nichare on the Rio Caura where we carried out the project phase of our expedition.



It was a bit of a mission to reach the village. We left our accommodation in Cuidad Bolivar at 5am for a 4 hour bus ride, but this was just the start. What followed was a 7 hour boat ride along the Rio Caura to reach the village - a total journey time that matched our flight from London to Caracas! I must mention the boat, it was nothing more than a hollowed out tree in which the team sat on planks. Luckily there was an engine, I don't think we would have been able to paddle the whole way. After so long speeding through jungle that all looked the same we felt the remoteness of the village that we would call home for the next 5 days.

Our task whilst in the village was to repaint their medical centre, and to teach and entertain the local children. The latter of these tasks was certainly a problem as we found out that we had arrived during the village's 'summer vacation' and there were only 2 or 3 children around. No matter, we set about painting the medical centre, but were instantly worried when we opened the paint that our Venezualan helper had selected was an interesting shade of off-white resembling sand rather than the brilliant white that we had expected. Luckily it dried as a much more pleasant shade by the time we left, and with the edges picked out in blue the medical centre looked much better than when we arrived.

Tonight is an overnight bus to Santa Elena for our trek to the top of Mount Roraima, the inspiration for Arthur Conan-Doyle's 'The Lost World'.

RMW 20th July 2009

I am pleased to report that our ascent of Mount Roraima went without major incident and that the team are all in high spirits as I write this at the prospect of a celebratory pizza this evening - although I'm not too sure about the "ant and termite" flavour that some of the team will be dining on!

Our 6 day adventure up (and down) Mount Roraima began with 2 days walking across the Gran Sabana (a large area of open grassland) towards the highest of the tepuis (Table Top mountains). On our second night we camped at base camp with the vertical edge of the mountain looming above us. No-one seemed particularly nervous about the prospect of what was to come the following day, but I'm sure there were a few butterflies. Our ascent of "the Ramp" the next day was difficult, 4 hours of constanst ascent, including passing directly under two waterfalls. When we reached the top the atmosphere of elation could be felt in the air, a real achievement for a team of mixed ability. The top of Roraima really is like nowhere else on Earth. There are frogs which crawl rather than hop, and when they get scared, blow themselves up into a ball and roll away! There are a number of caves on the summit to camp in, known on the mountain as "Hotels"! The next day was spent exploring the summit including ice cold plunge pools and looking though "The Window", a hole in the rock which allows you to see 600m staight down to the forest below - not something for the faint-hearted! The descent of the Ramp the following day filled me with fear as the rocks were slippery and hard to negotiate, but all credit to the team as they helped each other through.

Next up for us is the once-in-a-lifetime chance to see Angel Falls, I for one cannot wait.

RMW 28th July 2009



We have just returned from spending 3 days visiting Angel Falls, the highest single drop waterfall in the world (I think that's the right definition!). We are now in the town of Puerto Columbia on the Caribbean coast enjoying a couple of days of rest and relaxation. On Wednesday we will leave for Caracas for our return flight, and by Thursday evening we should be back in Shrewsbury.

Consistently one of the freshest amateur companies at the Edinburgh Fringe – and with a Fringe First reputation – since 1993 Shrewsbury School/Severn Opera, with composer and musical director, John Moore and director Peter Fanning, have brought student productions to the Fringe and to London theatres, including the Linbury Studio Theatre, ROH, Covent Garden and the Royal College of Music. The company aims to present new writing of quality, carefully framed for the voices and talents of a youthful cast.

For one night only, on 13th August 2009, the cast performed 'The Bubble' in The Ashton Theatre. They then went on to the Edinburgh Fringe where they put on six performances, and received a hat trick of 5-star reviews.

Thanks to an anonymous donor who saw the show in Edinburgh, the show is also now going to London on 9th January 2010.

The Bubble at Edinburgh - report

Wednesday 9 September 2009

17-22 August at 1720

C VENUES - Chambers Street

The Bubble 2009 was an unusual venture in that the company included a number of old boys – and girls – from former companies; and the show was rehearsed virtually from a standing start in July and August.

Having performed the show in 2001-2, we felt that the echoes of the South Sea Bubble disaster to the current Credit Crunch were too strong to ignore.

Peter Hankin, who co-authored the libretto had written new songs for John Moore's music and cut the piece down to ninety minutes, making it tighter and more coherent. As previously Sara Hankin recreated – and improved on - much of the original choreography.

Rehearsals took place in Shrewsbury and lasted for eleven days of intense activity before a oneoff performance in the Ashton Theatre to a crowded house.

The technical crew travelled to Edinburgh on Friday 14th and the 'get-in' took place at 0230 in the morning. John Harvey had generously offered to transport our equipment and staging in a 'sprinter' van and Rendez-vous-ed at the venue in the dark small hours. The remainder of the company travelled up in minibuses on the Saturday.

Accommodation was in the customary flats on the Meadows at Warrender Park Crescent, where the company could live, cook and sleep a comfortable distance form the main hub of events – from where they could easily walk into town.

The Venue

Sunday 15th August was devoted to a technical get-in for the company, balancing sound and running a full dress rehearsal. As usual, the –'get-in' for such a complex show was a tightly timetabled operation. Ten minutes were allocated for getting the stage set and the band and mikes in; five minutes to allow the audience in – and ten minutes for the 'get-out'.

'C venues' is one of the largest operators on the Fringe – hosting roughly a hundred shows. They are fastidious with more than a hint of 'control' in their approach to their customers, particularly in their approach towards uniformity of publicity and the press. However, they are professional, friendly and, during our time Edinburgh, proved helpful and encouraging on all occasions.

'C-1' is a small theatre – one of the few on the Edinburgh Fringe – with a real sense of intimacy. We performed there in 1993 and 1995 before our shows became too large for comfort. It was an ideal space for 'The Bubble' – seating up to 150. After the continuous technical difficulties which we encountered over the last three visits, the absence of such hiatuses was a great relief and performing in this space was real pleasure to all concerned.

Unlike the previous five visits to Edinburgh, restrictions in finance meant that our run lasted a week and not two, with the inevitable loss of some critical attention. However, the week's run,



with its traditional flyering on the Royal Mile (often in driving rain), its warm-ups, its get-ins and outs – and the warm camaraderie of the company – was as intense as ever.

The Company and the Show

After some inevitable hiccoughs in the Dress Rehearsal, the first night went surprisingly well – as indeed did the shows for the rest of the week. The quality of singing, acting and dancing was very high indeed. We received two reviews, both five-star, from the Edinburgh Guide (Edinburgh equivalent of Time Out) and from Broadway Baby (a popular online website). Nothing at all from The Scotsman this year, which increasingly limits itself to new work.

A small and experienced company (17 Cast 3 technicians 7 Band) made the whole tour so much more manageable than many previous years. The maturity of those taking part made for a highly self-disciplined team – and reduced any worries about discipline and the risks of living in Edinburgh to a minimum. The age range of 25 down to 17, the fact that several boys and girls were now on their third or fourth Edinburgh trip; the sheer high quality of performance and the commitment of the troupe both on and off stage made this one of the happiest tours – and the best in terms of artistic achievement.

Joint Darwin Society/Cambridge Society Lecture 2009

This was the fifth annual lecture and previous speakers have included such eminent scientists as Lord Rees (OS) and Sir John Polkinghorne. This year's speaker was Professor Robert Foley, Director of the Leverhulme Centre for Human Evolutionary Studies at Cambridge University and a Fellow of Kings College. He was accompanied by his wife, Dr Marta Mirazon who is a Reader in Evolutionary Biology at Clare.

Their passionate interest in the mysteries surrounding human origins was apparent from first meeting them, and it was a real pleasure to see how they both responded with delight to see and handle some of the original Darwin letters and books in our own ancient library before the lecture. It was also particularly appropriate that a Darwinian anthropologist should address us at Darwin's old School in Darwin Year.

Professor Foley's lecture began with Darwin's Origin of Species and ended with the work of the Institute he and his wife co-founded, tracing the history of research into human origins and evolution from early wild (and biased) speculations, through the fossil record to genetic mapping. He emphasised the multidisciplinary nature of the work, the essential role of fieldwork and the amazing potential of modern genetics, and managed to take us all with him. He and Marta also found time to chat to a small number of upper sixth formers about preparation for Cambridge entrance.

It was a memorable event.

Astronomy Society: Visit to Jodrell Bank

Tuesday 6 October 2009

Visit to Jodrell Bank and to meet Sir Bernard Lovell September 2009

On 21st September I took some Sixth Form physicists and 5th Form GCSE astronomers to Jodrell Bank radio telescope in Cheshire. We had been invited to meet Sir Bernard Lovell who had heard of the POISE (polar orbiting ionospheric scintillation experiment). This began when we won a UK competition to design an experiment to go into space. The experiment was launched in late July and is now on borad the DMC2 satellite. We expect to start receiving data at our ground station in Shrewsbury School in the months ahead and the experiment will continue for several years. The image below shows Simon Clayton-Jones presenting a copy of our original proposal to Sir Bernard Lovell. Simon has been the project leader for POISE, coordinating links with various research groups and managing an evolving team of students here at School.

Sir Bernard Lovell (96) was the founder and first director of the Jodrell Bank Observatory 1945-80. He led the team that developed H2S radar during WWII and was knighted in 1961 for his pioneering work in radio astronomy at Manchester University.

Sir Bernard reminisced about the early days at Jodrell Bank, the design and construction for the telescope and its continuing importance to radio astronomy after over half a century.

Shrewsbury School has a reputation for successfully staging ambitious, new musicals at the Fringe. This year's production of The Bubble, although wholly appropriate for the current economic climate, is not entirely new, having been previously brought to Edinburgh in 2002.

The musical is based upon the true story of the South Sea Bubble of 1720. The South Sea Company had been given a monopoly of all trade to the south seas. Shares in the company immediately began to rise, and false stories were put about by the company's directors to encourage more and more people to buy, believing that they would make huge fortunes with no risk attached. In five months the shares went from f_1 175 to over f_1 1,000. Then the bubble burst.

The hero of this story is Martin, a lad from Shropshire who is in prison facing execution for undermining the country's financial system by causing the collapse of the South Sea Company. He tells us his story, beginning with his arrival in London to seek his fortune. During his time in London, Martin meets Polly, a country girl from Runcorn, whom he tries to help. He also gets to know the playwrights John Gay and John Rich, who are trying, unsuccessfully, to write a play and are hoping to raise the money for it by buying South Sea shares.

As ever with Shrewsbury School, this is a slick and professional production with a very large cast. The music is complex and inventive and the standard of singing is high, particularly in the ensemble works. The costumes are colourful and authentic, and even include several changes for the leading characters. This is another excellent, well-chosen musical.

Michael Palin (OS) lecture - "From Shrewsbury to the World: A Debt to Darwin"

Saturday 10 October 2009

"From Shrewsbury to the World: A Debt to Darwin"

On October 1st 2009, Shrewsbury School welcomed Michael Palin (Old Salopian) back to the school, at the joint invitation of the Old Salopian Club and the Shropshire Branch of the Geographical Association.

In his talk 'From Shrewsbury to the World – a Debt to Darwin', Michael entertained an Alington Hall packed to the rafters (and, by video link, an overflow audience in the Ashton Theatre) with magnificent and comical accounts of experiences and encounters on his extensive travels as well reminiscing about his days at Shrewsbury in the late 1950's and early 1960's. He spoke about his trepidation of once again stepping on to the stage in the Alington Hall, where possibly his finest moment at Shrewsbury School took place in winning the Bentley Elocution prize in 1961. He amused the audience by also describing his various walk-on parts in school plays that were invariably Shakespeare in those days.

He spoke about the seven BBC TV series he has made with largely the same production crew, describing how it was more of a team effort rather than down to him as an individual. From his first journey started in 1988 that followed the fictional journey around the world by Phileas Fogg, the archetypal English gentleman created by a Frenchman, Michael told the audience he was, in fact, fourth choice for the programme after Alan Whicker, Miles Kington and Noel Edmonds had all turned the BBC's offer down.

He described his perilous journey by dhow from Dubai to Mumbai and how, in his last journey, he had recently tracked down the crew of that boat to Gujurat in North West India. Michael regaled the audience with anecdotes about landing on the ice at the North Pole, travelling through the USSR in the last throes of communism and visiting such diverse places as Mogadan in the Kamchatka Peninsula of Russia, Peshawar on the North West frontier of Pakistan and the South Pole. Along the way he spoke of the people he met; Inuits in Alaska who recognised him from the 'Monty Python and the Holy Grail' film, Kalashnikov-toting Pathans from the tribal areas of Pakistan offering him recently taken videos of Osama bin Laden for \$20 and former Burmese head-hunters singing 'Onward Christian Soldiers' in their own language.

One of the most amusing stories was how having been greeted by Maori chiefs with a Haka in the South Island of New Zealand, Michael replied with the first verse of the Shrewsbury School song sung in Latin! Behind the humour lay a deep, personal feeling for, and appreciation of, the astonishing beauty and variety in places and people in the world which hold a fascination for him, as for that other great Old Salopian, Darwin, before him. The talk was well received by the audience who were



charmed by Michael's style that was part eccentric, part raconteur with some Pythonesque overtones thrown in for good measure.

The proceeds for the evening went to the Field Studies Council Darwin Scholarship (www.fieldstudies-council.org), an award to teachers of biology, ecology and geography from overseas to come to Preston Montford to learn how to teach aspects of Field Studies and take this knowledge back to their own countries. Shrewsbury pupil selected for elite equestrian squad

Monday 12 October 2009

Alice Walker (MSH) has become one of the youngest members of the regional foundation squad supported by the British Equestrian Foundation.

A talented event rider, Alice, of High Ercall, will now train with the six-strong West Midlands squad on a monthly basis for the next two years.

The regional squads include the four Olympic disciplines and one Paralympic discipline of dressage, eventing, show jumping and para-equestrian dressage, with riders aged between 16 and 24 having access to top equestrian specialists including coaches, physiotherapists, psychologists, vets and nutritionists via a series of clinics.

"I was quite shocked to be chosen as I was one of the youngest riders at a selection day at Leicestershire recently but it is a brilliant opportunity," commented Alice, who currently competes on Talking Bishop and Thin Ice and already represents Wales and the Borders.

She has also ridden for Britain twice in international pony trials and is a successful point-to-point racer, having two victories under her belt so far this season.

"My mentor in the new squad will be Janette Brakewell, a double Olympic medalist, whose horse Over to You is an eventing legend, having won more medals than any horse other in history so that will be amazing.

"It is my aim to get in the British youth team and selection for this squad is certainly a step in the right direction," Alice added.

She recently represented the region in the Weston Park International CCIJ one star competition and came seventh in her event at Necarne's international horse trials in Northern Ireland.



Community Service: Shrewsbury School in Partnership with Woodfield Infants

Tuesday 13 October 2009

Shrewsbury School and Woodfield Infants' School have recently formed an alliance that offers the students from both establishments a fantastic opportunity.

Sixth formers from Shrewsbury, under the supervision of their teachers, have devised a scheme to offer Music and Science clubs to all Year Two pupils from Woodfield School. Fifteen seven year olds come to Shrewsbury after school every Thursday afternoon and spend an hour in either the Maidment Building (Shrewsbury School's Music Facility) or in the Biology Laboratories. These students act as classroom assistants in the school, helping with reading, art, PE and even filmmaking! Whilst this gives extra pairs of hands at Woodfield, it also offers invaluable experience for the sixth formers, some of whom have ambitions to become teachers themselves.

Mrs. Dunkerley, Headmistress of Woodfield, has been extremely positive about the scheme, which she and her staff have worked hard to introduce. This truly is a partnership that benefits all involved.

Spanish Faculty: Argentinan Exchange 2009

Tuesday 10 November 2009

Although Spanish students at Shrewsbury have had the opportunity to go on Spanish trips with the School in the past, in 2009 we undertook our first-ever exchange, and our first-ever School trip to South America.

Seventeen pupils from San Bartolomé in Agentina came to visit us in June (see report below), and seven pupils from our Sixth Form returned over Michaelmas half term. San Bartolomé is an independent, bi-lingual school, and our pupils spent 8 days staying with families in Rosario, attending lessons and playing sport, and 3 days in Buenos Aries.

Spanish Faculty trip to Argentina: 22 October - 5 November 2009

As most Salopians went home to hibernate over half term to avoid catching 'flu, seven adventurous sixth form pupils of Spanish switched from northern to southern hemisphere for a fortnight in Buenos Aires and Rosario during spring time. What an experience!

The weekend in Buenos Aires offered the pupils a flavour of Latin panache and style as we went to one of the finest restaurants and tango shows in the capital. Our whistle-stop city tour with expert historical guide took us to the cemetery of Eva Perón in the sophisticated Recoleta district, via the Boca Juniors stadium and the government buildings in the Plaza de Mayo. The smart, modern apartment blocks in the city sat side by side with shanty towns and desperate poverty which reminded the group they had travelled to a different continent a long way from Europe. Within 48 hours the group agreed that they had experienced the best steak, pizza and dancing in their lives in a city that feels so alive.

In Rosario we were reunited with our exchange partner school, Colegio San Bartolomé, whose pupils and teachers stayed with us in Shrewsbury last June. The famously hospitable Argentinians were perfect hosts as they catered for our every need. Indeed, our pupils have formed friendships that will be maintained for years and shared experiences with their exchange partners that they will never forget.

Our Salopian group attended chemistry, maths and art lessons in Spanish. They made presentations in Spanish about life in an English boarding school. During practical cooking sessions they made and ate Argentinian empanadas and learnt to dance the tango. School activities were complemented with sport, Anglo-Argentine social interaction, a classical music concert and an excursion to an Argentinian ranch where we rode horses, cooled off in the river and drank mate tea with alfajores chocolate in the afternoon.

Towards the end of the trip we saw Rosario Central beat Boca Juniors 2-1. As the heavens opened and a tropical storm began in the open-top stadium, even the raindrops were heavy, warm and refreshing. It's difficult to describe the addictive X factor that Argentina offers the English visitor. Suffice to say our pupils' eyes have been opened and their sense of adventure and cultural awareness has been stretched. They are already talking about GAP year plans to return and for some this will no doubt be the start of a serious interest in Latin American exploration.
