Match Report - Saracens v School 2nd XI

Wednesday 3 August 2016

The annual Old Salopian fixture against the school took place on the 1st July. In contrast with the previous few years, the teams were welcomed with blue skies. A stronger 2nd XI team than previous years meant the game was sure to be highly competitive.

As is tradition, the Saracens batted first on flat looking pitch. They started well, with both Jamie Bird (G 06-11) and Will Mason (S 07-12) taking advantage of excellent batting conditions.

However, the School boys soon started making inroads and it wasn't long before the wicket of Bird fell, followed swiftly by Mason. The Saracens middle order failed to make any significant contribution to the scoreboard and the game was finely poised at 120-5. However a few dropped catches saw the Saracens build up some momentum. Notable efforts with the bat were made by Henry Blofield (PH 09-14), with 64, and Steve Barnard (Rb 09-11), with 26 not out, batting at 8 and 10 respectively.

A score of 237 was made and we had a good game on our hands.

Charlie White (G 09-14) and Paddy Lynch-Staunton (R 07-12) opened the bowling, consistently achieving good line and length and leaving the School boys struggling to get the runs ticking over. Things were looking ominous. However, it was the spells of Blofield and Matthew Gregson (Rb 08-13) where the real damage was dealt and the game was put beyond reach for the School boys, with Gregson taking 3 for 14. An honourable mention must also go here to James Barlow (R 09-11) and James Aston (R 07-12), who bowled consistently.

The School boys were all out for 131, however the game was tighter than the score suggests. All in all the game was played in excellent spirits, with both sides enjoying a few beers after the game. We look forward to next year's rematch.

The news this week 100 years ago: 5th -11th August 1916

Thursday 4 August 2016

This week we remember:

Driver Richard Francis Gillett, M2/101326, 33rd Casualty Clearing Station. Army Service Corps.

Moser's, House Monitor, 1st VIII, left in 1907 to study law. Prevented from gaining a commission by weak eyesight, he enlisted as a Private (and became a Driver!), along with his brother Basil. In *The Salopian*, Basil recalls that "Frank's lorry was hit by a direct shell from a 15" gun and he and his comrade were blown to pieces."

Killed in France, 7th August 1916, aged 28.

Buried at Bethune Town Cemetery, France. Grave V. H. 8.

Lieutenant Gerald Learoyd Hammond-Fisher, 1st/8th Bn. The King's (Liverpool Regiment) attd. Machine Gun Corps (Infantry).

Moser's, left in 1912.

Killed in action in France, 8th August 1916.

Remembered on Thiepval Memorial, France. Pier and Face 1 D 8 B and 8 C.

Lieutenant Colonel John Plunkett Verney Hawksley DSO, Royal Field Artillery.

School House, left in 1894. He went up to Woolwich, received his first commission in 1897, and saw service in the South African War, 1899-1902, taking part in the defence of Ladysmith and various operations in Natal, the Transvaal, the Orange River Colony, and Cape Colony.

He was mentioned in dispatches, and received the Queen's Medal with five clasps, and the King's Medal with two clasps. For seven years from 1905 he was attached to the Egyptian Army, and for his services during the operations in Southern Kordofan in 1910 he received the Soudan Medal with clasp and the Order of Osmanieh (4th Class). For his services in WW1 he had been mentioned in dispatches and made a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order.

"His good nature and good temper gained him a host of friends, and even more admirable were the qualities of patience and fortitude which he showed in a severe and painful illness. He died as he lived, a good soldier and a good man, and few of us would ask for a better epitaph." – *The Salopian*

Killed in action in France, 8th August 1916, aged 38.

Buried at Becourt Military Cemetery, Becordel-Becourt, France. Grave I. V. 28.

Captain George McConnan, 10th Bn. The King's (Liverpool Regiment).

Haydon's (now Rigg's), left in 1901 for business. He enlisted as a Private but was promoted 2nd Lt. in 1915 after having served several months in the ranks. Invalided home in 1916, he was made Temp. Capt. in February 1916 and went out to the Front again July 1916. He was "a very loyal Salopian and always took an interest in everything" – *The Salopian*.

Killed in action in France, 9th August 1916, aged 30.

Remembered on Thiepval Memorial, France. Pier and Face 1 D 8 B and 8 C.

Lieutenant Colonel Joseph Leonard Swainson DSO, 6th Bn. Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry.

Moser's, Preapostor, left in 1896 for King's College, Cambridge. He obtained a commission in the Lancashire Fusiliers in 1899 and served throughout the South African War (medal with four clasps). When his battalion was broken up under the reorganisation scheme, he was transferred



in 1908 to the Duke of Cornwall's L.I., then stationed in South Africa. From there they were sent to Hong Kong.

In May 1914, he came home on leave, and on the outbreak of war was sent to Aldershot to train men of the Duke of Cornwall's L.I. In May 1915, he went with the battalion to the Front. He was in the attack on Hooge in August 1915, and commanded the battalion from September 1915 until the following March. He then had charge of a Military School of Instruction behind the lines until June, when he was given the command of a battalion of the Royal Lancaster Regt. Col.

Swainson was twice mentioned in dispatches and awarded a D.S.O. for his services in WW1. He died inspecting wire while gallantly organising a second attack on Guillemont, France 9th August 1916, aged 39. His Brigadier General wrote to his wife, "He was the best and kindest officer that I have seen out here: every one out of the old Regiment liked him and was sorry to lose him: he made soldiering easy."

Buried at Corbie Communal Cemetery Extension, France. Plot 2. Row A. Grave 72.

Second Lieutenant Oliver Vaughton Arnold, Worcestershire Regiment.

Haydon's (now Rigg's), rowed in his House Boat which went Head of River, 2nd VIII and 2nd XI football; he left in 1905. A solicitor in Birmingham, he enlisted in the Public Schools Bn. in 1915, with whom he served in Gallipoli. Invalided home, he was on recovery attached to the 2nd Bn. and sent to France, where he was seriously wounded in High Wood on 11th July and died a month later of wounds in the United Kingdom, 11th August 1916, aged 28 *Buried at Sutton Coldfield Cemetery, England. Grave A. "C." 375.*



The news this week 100 years ago: 12th - 18th August 1916

Thursday 11 August 2016

This week we remember:

Second Lieutenant Donald Charles Goolden, 6th Bn. attd. 4th Bn. Royal Fusiliers. Haydon's (now Rigg's), Praepostor, Head of House, he left in 1914. He enlisted at a Private in the Public Schools Bn. of the Royal Fusiliers, being gazetted to a commission in the 6th Bn., 14th April 1915.

He was killed by a shell while going up to the trenches near Guillemont, France, 14th August 1916 aged 21. He had won the respect of all ranks and "he lived a good and happy life" – *The Salopian*.

Buried at Peronne Road Cemetery, Maricourt, France. Grave IV. G. 7.

Second Lieutenant John Lyndon Knowles, 5th Bn. attd. 7th Bn. Rifle Brigade.

School House, House rowing and Junior Whip, he left in 1915 and obtained a commission in the Rifle Brigade on 15th September 1915.

Killed in action in France, 18th August 1916, aged 19.

Remembered on Thiepval Memorial, France. Pier and Face 16 B and 16 C.

The Salopian writes, "It seemed to those who knew him best that he had it in him to do much good in the world, for he was brave and honest and had learnt to care for others and to try and help them."

Captain Hugh Stewart Smith, 2nd Bn. Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.

Churchill's, Head of House, Huntsman for two years, he left in 1908 and went to Corpus Christi College, Oxford, whence he took his degree in Modern History in 1911. In 1912 he joined the Colonial Civil Service and went to Northern Nigeria. He was District Officer in "one of the wildest districts" when war broke out, and at once volunteered for service in the Cameroons. He was not needed there, and coming home on furlough resigned his appointment under the mission in the Special Reserve of Officers, and was gazetted to the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He went to France in September 1915 and was promoted Capt. in March 1916. He was killed at the head of his company in France, 18th August 1916, aged 27.

Buried at Caterpillar Valley Cemetery, Longueval, France. Grave XII. J. 29.

He is described in The Salopian as "a most loyal Salopian, a faithful friend to all who gained his friendship: two of those who knew him best here, A.T. Vardy and G.E. Burney, had fallen shortly before him." (ATV 4 July 1916, GEB 27 Sept 1915)



Lily Freeman-Attwood is National U16 Showjumping Champion

Many congratulations to 14-year-old Lily Freeman-Attwood (EDH IV), who won the U16 Championship title at the British Showjumping National Championships in August, riding Banana D'Ive.

Lily and Banana D'Ive had also won the Ashbourne Equestrian Fashion National U14 Championship the day before.






Shrewsbury School celebrates another excellent year for A Level results

The news this week 100 years ago: 19th - 25th August 1916

Thursday 18 August 2016

This week we remember:

Lieutenant Frederick William Sprott, Indian Army Reserve of Officers and 92nd Punjabis.

Moser's, left in 1906 and was admitted solicitor in Oct. 1912. From *The Salopian:* "The son of famous Salopian, Sir F. W. Sprott, Chairman of the Bombay Port Trust, he was a 'promising athlete' but he left too early really to define his skill. For a short time he served in Shrewsbury as a Solicitor with his Uncle, before joining his father in India. He was known for his charming personality, his imperturbable cheerfulness and good humour which, in his schooldays, earned him for him the soubriquet of Sunny Jim."

Died at Amarra in Mesopotamia, 25th August 1916, aged 27.

Buried at Amara War Cemetery, Iraq. Grave IX. J. 23.

Second Lieutenant Arthur Stafford Wilson, 2nd Bn. Rifle Brigade.

Chance's (now Severn Hill), "a gentle, modest, unassuming fellow" – *The Salopian*, and a Gentleman of the Runs. Stroke of the 1st VIII in his last year. He left in 1910 for the Agricultural College, Cirencester, then went out to British Columbia with the intention of dairy farming in Chilliwack; he was on his way home for a holiday when war was declared.

He enlisted 10th September 1914 with the other Old Salopians in the 5th K.S.L.I., becoming later one of the C.O.'s orderlies. The Batallion went to Flanders in May 1915 and remained near Ypres for several months. In the Battle of Hooge (23rd - 25th September 1915), Wilson was mentioned for his services as orderly. Returning to England on 11th November 1915 with the two remaining OSs., J.S. Corser and L.F. Forbes, he received a commission in the 4th Bn. Rifle Brigade, 29th November 1915. Going to the front again on 21st June 1916, he was posted to the 2nd Bn.

He was killed on the night of 24th - 25th August 1916 while looking after his platoon in the front trench near Vermelles, aged 24. *Buried at Vermelles British Cemetery, France. Grave III. P. 21.*

Married to Sam, who is currently a teacher at Millfield Prep School, Chris has also managed to combine his teaching and pastoral responsibilities with a distinguished sporting career. In 1997, when he was Head of PE and Boys' Games at Woodbridge School, he joined Suffolk CCC. He continued to play Minor Counties Cricket for Suffolk until 2005, by which time he was a Housemaster at Trent College Nottingham and father of two young daughters. Molly (14) and Amy (12) will both be joining Shrewsbury International School as senior school students in 2017.

Chris has been a frequent visitor to South East Asia over many years, including working there as an educational consultant. He is looking forward to taking up permanent residence in Bangkok with his family and beginning his new role. "I am honoured to be appointed to succeed Stephen Holroyd as Principal of Shrewsbury International School Bangkok and build upon the outstanding period of growth and development experienced by the school in the past 13 years. It will be a privilege to lead the Riverside community in what will be another exciting chapter for this excellent school. I look forward to working with talented and committed staff, supportive and aspirational parents, and especially shaping the futures of bright and engaging young people."

In this coming year before he takes up his appointment, Chris will be spending time both at Shrewsbury International School Bangkok and at Shrewsbury School UK, absorbing the Shrewsbury ethos and spirit, meeting staff and students and visiting boarding houses. We look forward to welcoming him.
