


Shrewsbury School's Huntsman to set off the World's Elite

On Saturday 30th March 2019, the world's top runners will take to the start line of the IAAF World Cross-Country Championships in Aarhus, Denmark. They will be set off by Shrewsbury School's Huntsman: Charlie Ockleston (O U6).

As the sport looks to move into an exciting new era - spearheaded by IAAF President Seb Coe - the race organisers have been keen to reconnect with the sport's origins. Their focus has therefore turned to Shrewsbury School whose cross-country running club - known as The Hunt - lays claim to being the oldest in the world, having been established in 1831.



A chance conversation with the race organisers led to the exciting proposal to include the Huntsman (Captain of Cross-Country) in the World Championship races, a proposal that was approved by the IAAF and will see Charlie setting the races off dressed in full regalia and with the traditional Huntsman's rallying cry and bugle call. The event will be broadcast live around the world, so Charlie is busy getting some much-needed lessons on the bugle!

With evidence of organised cross-country running having taken place at Shrewsbury School as early as 1819, this year's event marks a significant milestone in the evolution of the sport as it celebrates its bicentenary, and we are thrilled to take such a central role in those celebrations.

Congratulations to the Hunt, who have been in top form this week: three team trophies and several individual podium positions in the Shropshire Schools Cross-Country Championships on 2nd February; and 4th place for the boys team and 13th for the girls in the Coventry Relays on Wednesday 6th.



Bright and cold, the conditions in Oswestry for the Shropshire Schools Championships were ideal for fast times, and our 43 runners did not disappoint.

Francesca Harris (EDH) won the Intermediate age category to become County Champion. There were very strong performances by Lillian Wilcox (EDH), Alessandra Ardissino (M), Sophia Dixon (MSH) and Anna Cowan (MSH) in the senior age category, alongside several debut Hunt performances, including Karina Ho (G), Sophia Bureau (G), Laura Elliott (G) and Morgan Smith (MSH). The seniors managed a team bronze.

Among the boys, we retained the team trophies in all three age groups, thanks to some superb performances. In the juniors, Ben W (R) placed 2nd, Will S (R) placed 3rd and Archie C (Rb) came 4th.



In the Intermediates, Tom Jackson (R) managed a fantastic second place, ahead of Oscar Hamilton-Russell (R) in 3rd and Harrison Cutler in 6th, while we were well supported further back by the likes of Jonny Price (I), Ed Forde-Johnston (O) and Charlie Huntley (PH), among many others.

In the Seniors, Charlie Ockleston (O) ran extremely well to come 2nd, ahead of Sam Western (S) in 3rd, while Rider Hartley (Ch) and Sam Watts (Ch) managed 6th and 7th respectively. There was huge strength in depth again here, with several RSSH runners placing well right through the field.

Headmaster's Letter to The Times

In a letter to 'The Times', published on 4th February, Mr Winkley addressed the issue of smartphone use in schools.

Mobiles in schools

Sir, Excessive smartphone use in schools has become the "golden moan" of parents and educators ("Ban mobile phone use in schools", front page, Feb 2). The good news is that schools are on to the issue. As with most things, teaching moderation and self-control are part of helping youngsters manage their use of mobiles. Parents and educators need to model this in their own use of technology. We need to practise what we preach. The Greek philosopher Aristotle was smart way before the smartphone. His teaching of the golden mean suggests that we need to chart a course between extremes. In the case of mobile phones, the mean lies between the virtuous explosion of educational possibility that flows from these devices and the perils of addiction, distraction, inertia and worse. Bastille Society Lecture: Imaginations of the British Empire

Libby Hedges reports on a thought-provoking lecture to the Bastille Society given on Friday 8th February by Dr Russell Foster.



Dr Foster began by explaining to us that he had originally been placed in a role at King's College London in April 2016 analysing ways to strengthen Britain's position as part of the European Union...and just seven weeks later they had to reconsider his role, which moved him to European Studies.

For the predominantly Sixth Form audience, it was a great open discussion on how

current affairs have been affected by the way in which we built our Empire and also saw it decline – or as Dr Foster convincingly proposed, simply got louder and quieter.

The amalgamation of philosophy of history, philology, geography and more in a seminar-style lecture was a fantastic insight for those wanting to study history or sociology at university. It was good to have some thought-provoking questions, and it was clear Dr Foster had really stimulated a crowd of pre-university historians.

• As headmaster of one of the independent boarding schools mentioned in your article (Critics take aim at subsidies given to private schools, 5 February), I welcome the critical focus on how much schools like mine are doing to merit the subsidies we receive. These subsidies are to support children to have continuity in their education, not to fatten our coffers. The article also fails to mention the numerous community engagement projects in which schools like mine are willingly engaged: free of charge.

We are currently supporting a local academy with maths teaching, providing a modern languages teacher for a local primary school and continuing our 110-year-plus partnership with a youth club in Everton. These, and many similar activities, are part of the DNA of charitable independent schools. We are committed to benefiting our local communities and widening access to our schools through growing bursary schemes. We have a long way to go and it is right that we are held to account. Any income we receive goes into improving opportunities in line with our charitable purposes, rather than swelling the bank accounts of shareholders.

McEachran Prize 2019

Wednesday 13 February 2019

Tom Allen (Ch 5) was the winner and Jonathan Snell (Ch L6) and Sophia Bureau (G L6) the runners-up in this year's McEachran Prize, named in honour of the legendary former Shrewsbury School teacher.



Frank McEachran, known to his pupils as 'Kek', and his 'spells' entranced his pupils for the 40 years he taught at Shrewsbury from 1935 until his death in 1976. His memory lives on in this wackiest of competitions, each entrant choosing their own 'spell', reciting and talking about it for up to four minutes, a task demanding not only of a buccaneering intellect but also considerable courage. A record number of entrants put themselves forward this year, resulting in one of the strongest ever fields.

Our youthful judge, herself a sometime winner of the McEachran Prize, was Esmé O'Keeffe, Shrewsbury School's first Head Girl, currently reading Politics at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. Her daunting task required her to make a selection from a series of stimulating and eclectic talks on a wide variety of 'spells' ranging from Milton via Marx to the singer/songwriter Kanye West.

RSSH: King Henry VIII Relays 2019

Wednesday 13 February 2019

Wednesday 6th February saw the Royal Shrewsbury School Hunt travel to the War Memorial Park, Coventry for the King Henry VIII Relays. This fixture, along with the Knole Run, marks the real high-point of competitive running for the Club.

The boys were looking to build on the success of the Knole Run back in January, where we won bronze, but knew that this race always provides a really stiff test to any team. Last year we placed eighth, after a few injuries led to a somewhat makeshift team, but this year we were at full strength and we approached the race with real confidence. The girls achieved 11th place last year, and having lost only one runner from last year's line-up, they were well placed to earn a strong position.

Tom Jackson (R) led our A team boys' line-up and was attempting to change his usual tactics by setting off rather more sedately, allowing the field to get away in the opening stages and then working through them as they started to struggle in the second half. This seemed to suit him remarkably well, as he finished very strongly indeed with a time of 12:10, placing us 12th in the field of 52 teams at the change-over. Paddy Barlow (R) led the B team for the first leg, and having worked hard this year to recover from a serious leg injury last year, wasn't far off Tom as he crossed the line, finishing in 12:41.

Oscar Hamilton-Russell (R) took over for the A team, showing an impressive maturity for someone still in the Fifth Form. He ran superbly, a full 44 seconds faster than he'd managed last



year, completing the 3.7km course in just 12.19. In the B team, Ben W (R) – you may have noted a predominance of Rigg's runners so far – was on the second leg, making the team in spite of his tender years. The Third Former fully justified his selection, however, running 12:39 and making up key positions in what was a truly impressive performance.



For the third leg, Rider Hartley (Ch) took the baton for the A team. Rider is in a real purple patch of form currently, having run very strongly at the Knole for his 33rd position, before placing 6th at Saturday's County Championships. He made up key ground as other schools faded away (many schools tend to place their strongest runners in the first couple of legs). He powered through the second half of the course and finished in 12:29, before handing over to fellow Churchillian Sam Watts.

Sam has struggled with calf problems recently, but was able to overcome this to set a strong pace going into the wooded section. We were coming through the field nicely, by this point up to 7th position and bearing down on those in front, eventually finishing in 12:25.

Meanwhile, the B team were engaged in a fantastic battle around 15th, with many schools' A teams, such as Harrow, RGS Guildford, and Millfield. Harrison Cutler (R) was in excellent form here and managed to take a couple of places by the end, handing over to Orlando Williams (Rt) for the fourth leg. Orlando is mainly a rower, but is still pretty swift in a pair of running shoes



(especially when they're extra-light ones borrowed from his coach). He ran the fastest B team leg, in fact, in just 12:31.

Heading into the last two legs, the first two teams had built up an impressive lead – the Judd School and Ermysted's Grammar were battling away fiercely at the front, with Loughborough Grammar over a minute behind, and then another significant gap before a group of teams much closer together.

Sam Western (S) took the baton for the fifth leg and set off determined to establish a good lead over the rest of this pack. His pace was electric, and as he crossed the halfway point it was clear he would set an extremely quick time. Handing the baton to our Huntsman Charlie Ockleston (O), Shrewsbury were in 4th place, with 3rd-placed Loughborough around 30 seconds ahead, and Sam had managed to complete the course in 11.42 – the 10th-fastest run of the day.

In the end, Charlie had rather a lonely leg. There was no challenge from other teams behind who were too far back to worry him, and Loughborough had left their fastest runner for the last leg, so he barely saw him. Having clocked a very impressive 12:04 last year, Charlie managed to post exactly the same time, claiming 4th place and completing a team time of 73:12. This is the fastest time that Shrewsbury School have ever managed around this course, which goes to show what a tremendously competitive field it was.

Our B team placed 15th, with Milo Herbert (R) and Matthew Thevathasan (PH) running very strongly in legs five and six respectively. Matthew's final leg left the B team with the fastest time our B team has ever managed. They also placed as the highest B team of all the schools – quite an achievement!

In the girls, Alessandra Ardissino (M) led the four-person A team and set off at a good pace. She held out strongly to earn us 13th place in a time of 14:27. Anna Cowan (MSH) led the B team and also ran well, placing around 24th out of 38 teams, with a time of 15:42.

In the second leg, Sophia Dixon took the baton for the A team, developing a bit of a lead over the nearest rival behind her. She handed over to leg three runner Lillian Wilcox (MSH) with a time of 16:01. Lillian struggled a little in the latter part of the leg, and it was with a mixture of determination and pain that she dug in for her finish sprint up to the middle of the park. She was a little disappointed with her time of 15:34, and her form suggests she is quicker than this, but sometimes things just don't go to plan!

Lillian nevertheless kept us in with a good shout of a commendable position as we handed over to Francesca Harris (EDH) for the final leg. She sped up the incline towards the edge of the park and the wooded section, and hunted down those in front of her. Her time of 13:45 saw her claim four positions ahead of her, allowing the team to take 13th across the line with a team time of 59:49. It was a wonderful run and she certainly paid the price, suffering at the end.

The B team also did well, claiming 31st position in the end, after strong runs from Felicity Hayward (EDH) with a time of 16.26, Laura Elliott (G) with 16:55, and Karina Ho (G) – on her birthday! – running 17:55.

RSSH: Shropshire Schools County Cross-Country Championships 2019

Thursday 14 February 2019

The RSSH took their largest team for many years to the Shropshire Schools County Cross-Country Championships, with over 40 runners competing across five separate categories.

The boys were looking to defend their run of clean sweeps at this event going back for the last four years, in which we've won all three age categories of Junior (Third Form), Intermediate (Fourth and Fifth Form) and Senior (Sixth Form). This is a considerable achievement, as the standard of running is always high here.

The girls were able to field many more senior runners this year – nine, in fact – though were certainly light lower down, with only Francesca Harris (EDH) running in the Intermediate age group and no Junior runners at all.

In the Junior Boys, we had three runners up near the front who have had a tremendous season so far. Ben W (R), Will S (R) and Archie C (Rb) set a terrific pace at the head of the field and managed to sustain it over the 4km course to place 2nd (14:05), 3rd (14:13) and 4th (14:22) respectively.

There was a bit of an anxious wait after that to see where our fourth counter would place to complete the team. William Yao (I) gained that honour in 33rd position (17:50), ahead of Damian Jelev (R) who placed 45th (19:06) and James Cropper (Ch) in 52nd (19:55). This was enough to secure the team trophy for a fifth year in a row, by over 30 points ahead of nearest rivals Haberdasher's Adams.

In the Intermediate Girls, Francesca Harris (EDH) ran wonderfully well to claim the win over the same course distance in 14:58, well ahead of the nearest competitor. It was great to see her running so well again after a period of absence through injury. She seems to be returning to close to her best.

In the Intermediate Boys, we had greater strength in numbers, with 13 competing around their 5km course. Tom Jackson (R) set off brightly behind the favourite, Liam Rawlings of The Corbett School (who would go on to win his age group race for the fifth year in a row). Tom sensibly concentrated on his own pace and was able to claim the silver medal in a very quick time of 17:04.

Further back, Harrison Cutler (R) suggested he is returning to form again with a strong run in 18:28, while still at the lower end of this age-group's range. An excellent run from Jonny Price (I) earned him 11th place (19:19), completing the team score of 22, winning the event by over sixty points.

Our Senior Boys team looked very strong indeed as they lined up on the start line of their 6km course. Many of them had formed the backbone of our bronze medal-winning Knole Cup team in mid-January, and were looking ahead to the King Henry VIII Relays on Wednesday, using this as a final speed session in preparation.

The competition was stiff though, and the early pace was set by Jack Pickett of North Shropshire College, with Sam Western (S) and Charlie Ockleston (O) sitting behind. After the first couple of



kilometres, Jack managed to extend a lead ahead of our leading pair, and in the last lap Charlie made a move to which Sam didn't respond. A fine run from Charlie saw him claim the silver medal in a time of 20:03, with Sam looking comfortable back in third, running 20:13.

A little further back, Rider Hartley (Ch) showed what good form he's found recently with an excellent run for 6th place in 21:04, just ahead of Sam Watts (Ch) in 7th, in a time of 21:15. Paddy Barlow (R) was next in 8th (19:42), then Milo Herbert (R) and Matthew Thevathasan (PH) in 13th and 14th respectively. There were also strong runs for Jonny Snell (Ch – 16th), Ted Williams (R – 17th), Artur Sarsenov (SH – 19th), Will Cowper (Rb – 22nd), Scott Nicholson (I – 26th), Will Fallon (PH – 27th) and Dragon Dararattanarojna (S) in 29th. The team score of 18 meant we comfortably claimed the title again.

It's interesting to note that in the three boys' races, while we didn't get any individual wins, we were able to place 2nd and 3rd. A real show of strength, then, across several categories.

Well done to everyone who represented the Hunt. They did themselves, and us, very proud indeed.

What's the Buzz? – review of 'Jesus Christ Superstar'

Friday 15 February 2019

Queues of eager theatre-goers waited expectantly, a-buzz at the prospect of the hottest ticket in town; others arrived in the vain hope of securing a much-coveted return...



The show had sold out weeks in advance such was the anticipation and such the reputation of the show's directors. You may be forgiven for thinking the scene described is one from London's West End, but the show in question was, quite remarkably, a school production: the eagerly-anticipated rock opera Jesus Christ Superstar.

From the very outset, the audience encountered a show with considerable impact. The 'greatest story ever told' was transported into the contemporary setting of modern-day Palestine, a full-size tank thrust on stage as a reminder of the conflict and religious tension that continues to this day. As we have come to expect in recent years, the set was not only striking, but brilliantly conceived.





On stage, the band kicked proceedings off with the toe-tapping overture with John Moore as Musical Director leading a stellar line-up with Alex Mason on keys, Dalton Foster (Ch U6) on guitar, Peter Chan (R L6) on drums, and the inimitable John Dover on bass. Superstar was, of course, a poignant moment as John Moore's final production after 30 years as Director of Music, a time in which Shrewsbury School has developed a national – and indeed international – reputation for the performing arts. Working alongside our dynamic Director of Drama Helen Brown, this has been a vintage period for musical theatre. I for one am in awe of their work!


Back to the show...

The chorus burst on stage from the multiple entry points filling the stage with their vibrant attire and their swelling voices. This was a truly exceptional cast – not just the leads but the entire chorus – and early numbers 'What's the Buzz?' and 'Everything's Alright' conveyed the feverish activity of the disciples and followers of Jesus. Amongst their number were Simon Zealotes (one of many roles given a gender swap) played by Mary Lees (EDH L6) whose soaring voice and energy filled the Ashton Theatre from front row to back.





At the periphery – very much the outsider – the inner conflict tearing at Judas Iscariot was conveyed with expertise by seasoned performer Phoebe Morris (EDH, V) whose vocal range and expertise were perfectly suited to the role, undoubtedly one of the most challenging in the show. The fact that Phoebe had that week been struck down with tonsillitis and was dosed up with antibiotics made her performance all the more remarkable – what a superstar!





The vocal undulations required of Judas were in stark contrast to the softer – but no less striking – melodies of Mary Magdalene, with Saffron Milner (M L6) providing real poise and sensitivity to her portrayal of this role: 'I Don't Know how to Love Him' was a particularly beautiful moment in the show.



Whilst the stage floor was awash with the energy and excitement of the followers of Jesus, looking down upon them from their elevated platform above the band were the Priests and the Romans, darkly dressed and darkly conniving. The sonorous bass of Ben Lloyd (Rb, UVI) provided real menace and malevolence to the Jewish High Priest Caiaphas as he and his fellow priests plotted to kill Jesus. Ed Hart (PH U6) was equally sinister as Annas, impressing on his musical theatre debut, proving it's never too late to have a go!

Also making her debut on the Ashton stage was Grace Anderson (MSH L6) bringing dazzle and pizzazz to the pompously regal King Herod, whose song in the style of a 1920s jazz number was accompanied by a chorus line of dancers and a glitter-burst finale, a moment of lightness amidst the darkness of the plot. Further talent was unearthed with Olivia Moir (MSH L6) in fine voice as Peter, whose denial of Christ was skilfully portrayed.



As the gathering plot to arrest Jesus accelerates, Pontius Pilate wrestles with the huge weight of responsibility upon him. Stephanie Worthington (MSH L6) executed the role quite masterfully, her voice providing a haunting portrayal of Pilate's inner turmoil.



The title role of Jesus was carried off with aplomb by Dom Sullivan (I U6) who managed to find time out from his role in the 1st VIII rowing crew to take to the stage. Swapping his World Rowing Championship gold medal for a quite dazzling gold jacket, not only were his dance moves something to behold, but likewise his superstar singing was utterly stellar. The vocal range required for the part makes this role perhaps one of the most challenging in all musical theatre, seen most clearly in the astonishingly moving song 'Gethsemane'. As Christ is left alone in the garden to ponder and pray, the agony and anxiety of a man confronting his prophesised death is wrought with deep anguish and emotion. With a staggering three-octave range required, Dom's rendition of the song was astonishing and a deeply poignant moment in the show.



Equally memorable – and an ingenious moment of choreography from Sian Archer – was the scene of the 39 lashes. As Pilate metronomically administered the back-splitting punishment one whip-strike at a time, a quintet of dancers (Anya Tonks (MSH L6); Charlie Tonks (MSH U6), UVI; Daisy David (EDH 5); Georgina Cooper (G 4); Kate W (M 3)) delivered the stinging blows with a succession of kicks, spins and thrusts, the choreography a moment of real invention and one of significant dramatic potency.

The dramatic denouement of the show – Christ's crucifixion and resurrection – was sensitively handled, the poignancy of the scene enhanced with the dramatic lighting design. As ever, whilst the quality and expertise on stage was evident to see, equally impressive were the efforts of those behind the scenes. Theatre technicians Adam Wall and Bradley Fenton's task of building a full-size tank (including rotating turret) was a gargantuan task, though one they pulled off with remarkable skill. With the Ashton having previously seen a near-full-scale B-52 bomber built for *All My Sons*, we can no doubt look forward to further large items of transport featuring in future productions (Titanic: The Musical, anyone?). They were ably assisted by a number of pupils from Jake Ludlam (R 4) who was tasked with lighting, stationing himself within the tank (in khaki and army helmet of course), to James Kenyon (Ch 4) and Eustacia Feng (M 4) on the sound desks. Theatre tech is in safe hands for many years to come with this impressive trio.





The final number – 'Superstar' – was a jubilant, thrilling finish with Dom Sullivan and Phoebe Morris descending down the steps of the audience and getting the clapping going as we watched the cast deliver their final, euphoric number.



Standing ovations followed – not often seen at school productions – and quite rightly so; this was a quite remarkable production. To answer the question in the song, 'Can we start again please?' Well, let me think. Yes please!

This term Marcus Young, Charlie Tyler-Westwood and Will Stanford-Davis have been delivering a sports programme for a local primary school, running very popular rugby and football after-school clubs each week. "We love going out to the local schools," says Will. "It's clear to see that all of the children really enjoy it, which makes it worthwhile and a rewarding experience." They are delighted to have received a cheque for £250 from Morris & Co, which they have used to buy equipment.



In the meantime, Bridgit Merison and Georgie Nicholas ran a very successful after-school craft club in Shrewsbury Cathedral School last term for a group of year 4 pupils, having successfully fundraised for the materials they needed.

Lots more is planned for the future, including another Tag Rugby Competition for local primary schools in the winter term.
