Amazing efforts from pupils for Junior School Essay Prize

The winner of this year's Junior School Essay Prize has been announced as Luke W (SH, IV).

Head of Academic Enrichment, Harry Mackridge, said: "The 2021 Junior Essay Prize witnessed a slightly changed format to reflect the unusual circumstances of the year! Pupils were provided a range of questions covering core syllabus and super-curricular concepts and challenged to respond in no more than 500 words.

"The prize was open to all Third and Fourth Form pupils with an encouraging turnout reflecting significant academic engagement in the school community. Enjoy Luke's winning entry."



One day humans will have to leave earth in order to survive. What physical barriers will need to be overcome to make this a success?

"There is a hesitant acceptance that the human race has left an irreparable footprint on this planet and its delicate ecosystem. The population is exponentially expanding, and recently, rapid industrialisation, pollution, and deforestation to name a few have been asphyxiating the finely balanced climate. Physicists have been mulling over a resolution, and colonising another planet has become a tenable consideration.

Deciding on a suitable planet would be the first confrontation; we could either select a rocky planet which lies within the solar system, or pinpoint an earth-like exoplanet. The latter inevitably involves a formidable distance, with the nearest star being over four light years away, but if analysis is correct, it could harbour water, and guarantee a pivotally manageable framework for the continuity of humanity. Travelling to a more proximal planet provides a more plausible distance, but would introduce a problematic environment.

Considering the barriers for mars to begin with, although the gravity may be not too dissimilar, the terrain is arid, the weather is unpredictable, and the atmosphere composition is fatal to humans. Installing pressurised buildings would promise regular ventilation, but transporting parts would be cumbersome, and reaching escape velocity from earth would prove onerous. Liquid water must also be created through chemical reactions, either purified for drinking or redistributed to vegetation. To conserve the scarcity of water, a synthetic water cycle would have to be established.

As for the obstacle of power and nourishment, a transparent roof could exploit the sun's oppressive heat, to aid the growth of renewable sustenance. Our star could also be used to generate solar power; the cumulative force of a dust storm could additionally be trapped through a network of robust turbines either exposed directly above ground, or manipulating the gusts to a more protected alignment of turbines underground.

If instead physicists decided to locate a world that twins earth, light years dissociate humanity from this pedestalised proposal. Modern day rocket propulsion would take thousands of years to even cover one light year, concluding that chemical fuel is insufficient. There are two alternatives: either the power source is ground-based, or situated onboard. The craft could use nuclear propulsion, preferably fusion, which yields profoundly more, but has not been tamed yet. Contrarily, ground-based lasers could precisely point at a reflective sail on the vessel, spurring it through the vacuum of space, but the accuracy and potency is yet to be surmounted.

In conclusion, not only is radical advancement required in the preparation, and in the adaption following colonisation, but a discernment must be made. Do we naively wander through the vacuum of space, to acquaint ourselves with a distant sibling of earth, or do we engineer our neighbour? Mother nature is knocking on death's door, and we are holding tightly onto her hand. Mountainous advancements loom above humanity, but incessant progress will unshackle us, and humanity may live on."

First foray onto the stage for Third Form in The Crucible

Thursday 10 June 2021

The Crucible, first performed in 1953, is widely acknowledged as one of the greatest plays of the twentieth century.

The play is both a scrupulously researched historical exploration of the Salem witch trials and a powerful allegory of the anti-communist movement of the McCarthy era. Its author, Arthur Miller, like many other writers and actors, was investigated for 'un-American activities' and experienced first-hand the hysteria and paranoia surrounding the perceived threat of 'reds under the bed'. The play draws chilling parallels between Miller's own situation and that of the early American settlers.



It tells the story of Abigail Williams, a vindictive small-town girl who seduces a flawed but honourable farmer, John Proctor. When his wife Elizabeth discovers the affair, Abigail launches a vengeful plan to usurp her by having her condemned as a witch. As the village is swept by rumours of witchcraft, more and more people turn on their neighbours. Miller was always clear that the witchcraft at the centre of the play was invented and imagined, saying that, 'the tragedy of *The Crucible* is the everlasting conflict between people so fanatically wedded to this orthodoxy that they could not cope with the evidence of their senses.'



This was a challenging play for the Third Form in their first foray onto the stage of the Barnes theatre, but a challenge that they carried off with aplomb. Meadow P (MSH) was compelling as Abigail, capturing both her petulance and her vulnerability. The object of her unrequited affections was played with brooding intensity by Daniel O (Rt), whilst Clara G (G) gave a mature and nuanced performance as the wronged wife, Elizabeth. William H (Rb) was splendidly dislikeable as the petty and tyrannical Reverend Parris, and Loic D-B (Ch) brought both gravitas and rare flashes of humour to the role of Danforth, the pompous governor of the province who finds himself tasked with investigating the allegations of witchcraft.



Abigail's cronies can often merge into an ill-defined mass of screaming girls, but Maddi L (G), Clemmy S (G), Nyah W (M) and Maggie C (M) created distinct personalities for the children who find themselves in a heady position of power. Isla B (M), in particular, was superb as Mary Warren, the one girl who attempts – albeit ineffectively – to stand up for the truth. The scene in the courtroom, where she confronts Abigail about her lies only to fall prey to them herself, was extremely powerful.



Particular thanks must go to Luke W (SH, IV), who stood in at the last minute to take on the role of Francis Nurse from Oliver C (R); his unflappable calm and good humour were a huge asset to the cast. We wish Oliver the very best for his recovery.

Organised by Head of Futures, Chris Wain, our Fifth Form groups presented ideas on how to increase tourism across towns in Shropshire. Among the judging panel were members from ShrewsburyBID, Marches LEP and the School's own Director of Marketing and Communications, Glyn Ferriday, alongside the High Sherriff of Shropshire, Tony Morris-Eyton.



Sapna C (G, V), a member of the winning team, has reflected on the competition:

"Early this week we took part in an enterprise challenge that was set by the High sheriff of Shropshire. Each team was allocated a town within the county and the overall task was to present to a panel of judges our ideas on how to increase tourism in that particular town.

"My team was allocated the idyllic town of Oswestry and we had to attempt to show the judges how we would go about increasing tourism there. We first had to research the area and try to find a selling point. We decided to target city dwellers and tried to advertise Oswestry as this hidden gem. We also focused on the fact that it was a convenient stopover for those traveling to Wales. On the next day we had to design a poster and leaflet, write a blog, create a social media campaign and film an advert as well as coming up with a five-minute presentation. All the groups were then pitted against each other in the semi-finals where we had to show our ideas to the allocated judges. The winners of the semi- finals, (Oswestry, Craven Arms and Market Drayton), then when through to the finals to show their presentations to all the judges, where we as Oswestry won.

"I found this experience to be rather constructive and beneficial as it required us to work in small groups and it enabled us to improve our entrepreneurial skills as we had to carry out a lot of research and pinpoint the best-selling points of the town. Furthermore, this challenge also improved our time management skills as we were only given a certain amount of time to complete each task. This taught us how to be concise and how to clearly get our points across. Moreover, it was also very useful in enhancing our public speaking skills and we were able to learn how to best present an idea. It is something that I would definitely enjoy doing again in the future as it was an amusing way to develop new skills."


STEM Potential - One Year In!

Thursday 17 June 2021

Saturday 12th June marked the final session of the inaugural academic year for Shrewsbury School STEM Potential, with sessions on scientific research into mosquito-borne diseases and the technology and biochemistry behind vaccines discussed.

Working with state schools across Shropshire, the aims of the programme include widening access to top universities in the STEM subjects and raising aspiration amongst talented young people to pursue qualifications and careers in technical fields, through a bespoke programme of science and maths masterclasses and workshops.

Working with Oundle School and Imperial College London to inspire a new generation of scientists and mathematicians, this year has seen the first Year 10 cohort complete a course in remote. STEM Potential sessions have and will continue to extend the opportunities these students may experience during their formative GCSE years, as well as offering advice in areas such as careers and university applications thereafter.



Building upon the excellent teaching at their respective schools, STEM Potential facilitates students from different areas and backgrounds meeting and working together and enables them to access additional coordinated support from experts in a wide range of fields at Shrewsbury School, Oundle and Imperial. The range of the offering in remote this year has been remarkably broad, with teachers from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Astronomy and Maths all contributing either GCSE, extension or research-based content for students to engage with on Saturdays throughout the year.

With 'covid gains' in mind, working in remote has also enabled the Shrewsbury cohort to join Imperial-led sessions, including a home-made theremin tutorial, with practical physics and chemistry material posted to individuals' houses beforehand. There have also been evening tutoring sessions online with the Imperial College London STEM ambassadors – invaluable opportunities to have questions answered, not just about GCSEs but also about university life and course, with current 2nd and 3rd Year undergraduates at Imperial.



While September should see the in-person programme resume, this remote-working and close-knit collaboration between the three centres is set to continue in order to keep raising the bar within the programme. Applications are already being received for joining STEM Potential in Year 10 next year (deadline 28th June), while our current group will continue in Year 11. Eligible students attend state schools in the local region and in particular this programme has facilitated deepening partnership with the Marches Academy Trust, while new schools are also coming on board next year.

It's been a week full of serious fun for our Third and Fourth formers as they enjoyed all the activities that this year's Outdoor Week had to offer.

Outdoor Week is a major part of the Salopian calendar and takes both these year groups out of the classroom on a combined expedition and multi-activity programme. Pupils spend half the week in the Shropshire countryside undertaking an independent walking expedition and three varied days of group work, such as community projects, a conservation day and an activity competition day.



This year has seen our pupils travel across the county, with two-day, 35km expeditions starting in Habberley in South Shropshire, assault courses being conquered at Condover Activity Centre and creative bush craft enjoyed in Crickheath with Shropshire Wildlife Trust members, where they added to a stone wall that has been constructed by generations of Salopians.



Back at the school site, our Eco-Committee created a Pollinators Garden to provide an environment for bees, pupils enjoyed willow weaving and spent time preparing for their expedition, ensuring their tents were in-tact and routes were organised.



Our Salopians also assisted Shropshire Council with installing a user-friendly gate for the community along a footpath in the town, students visited the Barnabus Community Centre to help spruce it up prior to the Bell Vue Arts Festival Open Day and a number of pupils visited The Shewsy as part of the Outdoor Week programme.



Stuart Cowper, Head of Partnership and Community Engagement, said: "We've seen our pupils actively engaged in a range of worthy volunteering projects, both on site and in the community more widely this week.

"Students have been working hard down at the Barnabas Centre and Food Bank+, where we tend to help annually as part of Outdoor Week with this or similar work – it's just one of many threads in the work we do together in partnership.

With some of the top seeded pairs in both competitions unavailable on those dates, the competitions were to be qualifying for a later finals day, the date of which remains to be confirmed. Our top senior pairs had been on court whenever time and other sports training allowed, so were ready, and Peter Clark (Rb, 2019)had been coaching for us last term and on court fairly frequently so was well set to nurse Arthur Garrett (Ch, 2019) back into form over the Tuesday.



On both days there was a relatively small but high-quality field: on Monday 9 pairs competed in two groups. No match would allow the players to relax and, after a cool wet May, temperatures suddenly shot to almost Mediterranean levels; this in combination with a glass roof made for a physically pretty tough day. Our pairs though, are nothing if not fine athletes and the day was going to be equally difficult for the opposition.

Both pairs made it out of their groups to knock-out stages, in which the first place from one group played fourth place from the other, and second played third. Shrewsbury's second pair - Nick A (SH, LVI) and Jago A (SH, LVI) - met the St Olave's 1 pair, who had gone through second after losing to Shrewsbury 1 - Rory M-O (PH, LVI) and Digby T-W (I, LVI). This was just too great a challenge as Nick's cold (on the hottest day of the year?) kicked in – though they battled honourably it was not to be. Rory and Digby, meanwhile, had relished the testing group games and found their best for the knockouts.



The final knockout round for the day saw two pairs undefeated: Shrewsbury 1 had taken St Olave's position in the top seeding spot and played Eton, while Olave's 2 now faced St Olave's 1. Eton, after their comeback in a long match against Harrow, played Shrewsbury 1, who had beaten them in the group stages. Eton had been gaining on confidence and consistency and the first game proved a real battle, Shrewsbury eventually edging it 14-12. At this stage, Eton's hard work to this point started to catch up with them and they were visibly less able to chase down retrieves and change direction. The rallies therefore increasingly fell in Shrewsbury's favour: after long battles for any points at the start of game 2, Shrewsbury put together some dominant phases of play and took the second and third games by margins which looked more comfortable on paper than the battle for them had seemed, watching it live. In the other match, St Olave's 1 came through (less comfortably) against their 2nd pair, meaning that Digby and Rory were the only pair unbeaten on the day.

If the 2021 Schools' Open had been delayed, the 2020 had been in a back corner of the freezer for a few months. But if ever there was a day to defrost it quickly, Tuesday 1st of June was it: surpassing even Monday's heat, the forecast was for 25 degrees, cloudless and sunny and at 10am the courts were already in full sunshine. So idyllic was the day, the railway system had got a train away five minutes early.




Five pairs (two from St Olave's and one each from Shrewsbury, Ipswich and Highgate) were due to play in this qualifying day, with two strong pairs (one Eton, one St Olave's) unavailable. One group was planned with each pair playing every other in a best of 3 game. With two pairs delayed by the railway shenanigans, play started a little later than planned with the on-court temperature rising. And the competition ignited straight away: both first-round games were well contested, went to 1-1 and became protracted battles. Highgate came through against Ipswich having started first of the two matches; St Olave's 2, in touch having been on court the previous day in

the 2021 tournament, pushed Shrewsbury all the way in the first two games before the Salopians (Peter Clark and Arthur Garrett) found their stride, coming through 12-11, 9-12, 12-2. It was 1pm by the time the second round started so the danger of a late finish looked quite real.

In the group it was St Olave's, Highgate and Shrewsbury who came through their battles and looked to be the pairs to fight it out for the top spot. The first meeting between these came in round 3, when Highgate took on St Olave's 1. After the inevitable exchange of the first two games, it was the lower unforced error count of St Olave's that won out in the decider. In the next round, Highgate faced Shrewsbury. The match stood out for unorthodox positionings with three left-handers on court (indeed when the schools had met in the Lent term of 2019 all four players were southpaws). Shrewsbury took a close first game; in the second Highgate went to an 8-0 lead and held most of the lead to win 12-6. In the decider it was Shrewsbury, cutting and returning well, who pressed on and won conclusively: in one phase when Peter seemed unable to miss the pepperpot, Arthur's call was that it was simply exhibition fives from his partner.

In the last match of the day, then, well after 6pm with the temperature starting to approach bearable, the two undefeated pairs from St Olave's and Shrewsbury met each other. Again, there were three left-handers on court and all were now well into their groove intercepting around the buttress and finding sharp volleys into it. Both Peter and Arthur for Shrewsbury retrieved stubbornly and Peter's accuracy counter-punching in the buttress was telling. St Olave's took the first game 12-6 but Shrewsbury responded with grit to take the second 12-7, so yet again we were in for a decider. This time Shrewsbury dug in to make a few consecutive returns of cut and maybe the two days in the heat started to take their toll on the Olavians' legs as the Salopians ran away with the decider, finishing the day on top of the pile.



It had been a long day and a test of match fitness as well as skill, which saw excellent fight from all pairs throughout the day. All had some good, close games and hopefully enjoyed their day. The timing of finals day is yet to be confirmed but an oddity remains possible: that the winners of this competition might be holders for a negative amount of time, since there's every chance the 2021 competition will be completed before the 2020 one!

While these were two good and successful days for Shrewsbury, it was a great shame not to be able to offer participation, particularly to our departing Upper 6th formers: usually their last Nationals would be something of a rite of passage, forming memories to tie together all of their away weekends over their years at the school. We hope we will see them back in Shrewsbury sometime next season to give them the send-off they've deserved.

Hopefully this course can be continued in the future as it is really quite fun!"



Though not an academic course, I cannot emphasise how helpful I believe this award could prove for our students in the future. The Institute of Leadership and Management is a global brand and many of our students will go on to gain further accreditation with this awarding body up to as high as level seven. Having this award, even at level two, will offer a point of difference



Phoebe's essay on 'Is Democracy Experiencing a Setback Worldwide?' explored vital contemporary issues such as the democratic 'deficit', contemporary American politics and the impact of COVID-19 on global ideologies.

Head of Academic Enrichment, Harry Mackridge, said: "Phoebe selected this title from a range of intellectually stimulating questions and was able to critically engage with a number of sources to reach her powerful conclusion. I hope you enjoy reading a snippet of Phoebe's essay as much as the judges evidently did!"



IS DEMOCRACY EXPERIENCING A SETBACK WORLDWIDE?

This essay will explore whether democracy, defined as a system of government in which the people have the ultimate authority through elections, has suffered a worldwide setback in recent years. Possible explanations for the argument of a decline in democracy include recent events in America and the impact of corona virus, as well as the development in technology in the last few years. The 'Economist Intelligence Unit's' 'Democracy Index' [1] assesses the level of democracy all over the world, based upon five categories: electoral processes and pluralism, civil liberties, the functioning of government, political participation and political culture, and has been doing so

since 2006. In 2019, this index found that, based upon these categories, the average level of global democracy has fallen to the lowest that has ever been recorded by the EIU, to a level of 5.44. This index clearly demonstrates that democracy has definitely experienced an overall setback worldwide.

Throughout all of this however, the resilience of democracy has in some ways been shown to be stronger than ever. Despite all the accusations against him, Joe Biden's victory was approved by Congress the day after the violence, and his inauguration on the 20th of December does go to prove that, despite the assault by the president, democratic processes are strong and have been carried out successfully. Despite this positive result, events in America must be viewed as a setback in democracy, as such an extent of protest was seen against the result of a completely lawful process. As well as this, it should be viewed as a setback because, no matter the result of the election, events of 2020 highlighted how there are millions of people living in America who feel as though they do not experience the same opportunities or treatment as others, and this is a problem which has in no way been solved.

Friday 25 June 2021


28 pupils attend the Shropshire Schools Athletics Championships held at Telford, Oakengates.
