

Exchange visits of Sports Directors between Shrewsbury (UK) and Shrewsbury International, Bangkok

Monday 2 May 2011

Paul Greetham, our Director of Sport, travelled to Shrewsbury International School in Bangkok this Feburary to view and experience the teaching and playing of sport in an international environment; Nick Dunn came over to the UK for a return visit in March. Their accounts of the trips is below.

Paul Greetham's visit to Shrewsbury International School, Bangkok: A Diary and reflections

Day One

As usual, no sleep on planes – particularly 12 hour flights! This meant a tough morning ahead as I'd arrived at 6.30am. By 8am I was in my accommodation for the week – the delightful Chatrium Suites, opposite Shrewsbury International School. Three high rise buildings dominate the skyline in these parts – the end one and the 16th floor my abode for four nights.

After a little power nap, which was to do me no good at all, I ventured into the International School to meet my host for the week Nick Dunn, Director of Sport and Activities. Before leaving for a GCSE PE trip into Bangkok to the world famous Bodyworks exhibition, Nick kindly showed me around some of the fantastic facilities on the eight year old campus. Most impressive were the two outdoor swimming pools, triple size sports hall (9 badminton courts) and gymnastic training hall. Swimming, gymnastics, badminton, volleyball and basketball form a large part of the competitive sports on offer at Shrewsbury international. On the sports hall roof were three tennis courts, and recently installed around the perfectly manicured back playing fields was a brand new tartan running track. So good first impressions of the use of space in an urban setting, and also the impressions of the PE staff I soon met by wandering around with Nick and going on the PE trip. All appeared incredibly enthusiastic about their roles, and my first impressions were of a youthful, dedicated and committed staff. The Bodyworks exhibition only lasted an hour but was fascinating and brought human anatomy to life – excuse the pun. Real bodies form the basis of the exhibition and one cannot fail to learn a great deal, given these are not rat or frog dissections – they are the real deal!

On our return to school, the afternoon sport and activities programme got into full swing, and I observed swimming, gymnastics, football, and volleyball sessions going on with a variety of age groups. The gymnastics and swimming was of a very high standard indeed, and back in the UK, this would have been considered more of a club / representative standard. Nick explained that dependant on the term and age group, at the end of each term the school enters the FOBISSEA competitions. These are the focal point to each term for the pupils doing sports excellence, as well as the fairly regular fixtures against other international schools in the region.

I bumped into Stephen Holroyd this evening when going for supper. He was on good form and clearly Shrewsbury International is keeping him terrifically busy, perhaps more so than Severn Hill ever did (though Mr Vicars might contest this!).



Day Two

With jetlag still a slight issue (two hours sleep this time round), a long shower and a big breakfast was just what was required for the long day ahead – this time the Senior School Sports Day at the Thai Army stadium about 15 minutes drive from the school. The whole senior school was bussed there (à la ISFA Final to Milton Keynes) but for a House event of great magnitude and organisation. Every pupil had to take part in something whether it be the tug of war or the throwing of a softball to the more traditional athletic track and field events. Events commenced at 8.45am and carried on until 2.30pm and by mid-morning the grand stadium was somewhat of a sun trap, and the thermometer was well into the 30's. The discipline and support from the 700 pupils was superb. It also gave me the opportunity to speak to many members of staff about their experiences of the International School. Without hesitation, views were entirely positive – the School appears a happy one. The event motivated me even more to ensure we re-commence a Shrewsbury UK Sports Day from 2012 onwards. It has a huge whole-school benefit and I am sure would prove incredibly popular with the Houses.

On our return to School, Nick Dunn met with parents of pupils who had been selected for the FOBISSEA U13 tournament in two weeks in Malaysia. FOBISSEA has a membership of 37 international schools in South-East Asia that compete regularly against each other at tournaments annually at various age groups. Each tournament focuses on four sports, and schools are only allowed to select a team of eighteen boys and eighteen girls, so a team of all-rounders are inevitably selected.

Dinner was with Nick Dunn, and a whole host of topics was discussed included PE curriculum, excellence vs participation, timetabling, staffing and sporting priorities.

Day Three

An 8am meeting with Nick Dunn first up on the subject of a sports tour to Bangkok for Shrewsbury UK pupils, using Shrewsbury International as a base for training, fixtures and accommodation. A couple of good opportunities emerged for next academic year for a ten day trip incorporating football, basketball, badminton, golf and swimming. It should be a fantastic opportunity for establishing very firm relationships between both schools, and also a chance for academic and cultural exchange – attendance in lessons and sight-seeing would also feature on the tour schedule. This is building upon John Moore's links with the music department in Bangkok and his work as conductor at the annual Last Night of the Proms event in October.

The next meeting was with the Director of Studies Simon Power. One of our discussion topics was Physical Education as a subject on the curriculum, as a core subject and as an option / examined subject. Interestingly all pupils in Years 10 and 11 in Bangkok are entered into either the short or long GCSE course for Physical Education, whereas in the UK, it has only just become an option subject with 20 or so candidates.

Next to a meeting with Simone O'Connor, the Head of Curriculum PE. Nick Dunn's role is the establishing of an extra-curricular and activities programme throughout the whole school. Separate to this is Simone's role of co-ordinating all Physical Education (core and examined) at International. We compared schemes of work, methods of assessment, and the implementation of GCSE. This was a very useful meeting and reassured both of us, that although our timetables and time for extra-curricular are very different, we are both on the right lines! After a quick run, it was time to experience something other than sport, and the first ever Shrewsbury International House Music Competition. A far cry from the pre-half term UK equivalent, but nonetheless a great spectacle and well supported. Each of the six houses had to



sing and play one song of their own choice and a Beatles classic. Schwitzer House won hands down with their rendition of Poker Face (Gaga) and I Wanna Hold You hand (some guys called Lennon & McCartney). The sports day and music event demonstrated that even though the House system is in its infancy at International, very quickly pride, spirit and a sense of community and support for one's peers has established itself. Fantastic to see so many pupils enjoying time at their school.

Day Four

My final full day at International and first of all some more discussions on the tour provisionally planned for October / November this year, to include cultural and coastal visits, as well as time to study.

Then to the highlight of the day – an awards luncheon for members of Team Shrewsbury and their parents. Team Shrewsbury is the equivalent of our gifted and talented programme, whereby those deemed to be the very best are afforded additional support with regards to sport. I was asked to address pupils and parents and I hope to have encouraged with the few words I had to say. The pupils' main sports appeared to be gymnastics, swimming, basketball, golf and athletics – in contrast to Shrewsbury UK's rowing, football, cricket, etc. I was delighted to note so many girls involved in the programme and throughout the week I have spotted a healthy culture of girls' activity and sport – much more so than my experiences of the UK. I wonder if this is the same throughout Asia?

On my return to School campus, I was interested to see sixth form pupils taking part in timetabled PE – all year groups receive Physical Education as a core subject. Only third form (Year 9) at Shrewsbury receive compulsory Phys. Ed. To finish the day, some more time with Simone O'Connor, Head of Curriculum PE. A very organised woman – she took me through the specifics of how the department assess across all year groups, reporting and the detail of the Analysis of Performance component of the GCSE.

The department have been very kind and hospitable all week, not least on the final evening with them. They were kind enough to take me to a local restaurant (battling through an evening torrential storm!) to wrap up an extremely worthwhile stay.

Day Five

Following final goodbyes at Shrewsbury early morning, I made the hour or so journey to Bromsgrove International School, which is a little distance out of Bangkok. Shrewsbury has the advantage of having a central location, and right on the Chao Praya River – many pupils take the boat into school. However Bromsgrove has just built a brand new (five star standard!) boarding house and concentrates more on the Thai boarding and overseas (mainly Korean) boarding market. On arrival I met a former colleague from Bromsgrove UK Jon Wingfield, who is Acting Headmaster until July. Jon has steadied the ship brilliantly there since September as a couple of Heads have come and gone in recent times. In general, one thing that has been evident all week is the high level of staff turnover at International schools – most staff are on two year contracts. I guess there are a few reasons for this. Some staff are looking for a change of scene and experience if in the UK for a short time; some Headmasters see the turnover as healthy with fresh ideas coming into any school constantly, and due to a change in environment and culture, very quickly some staff may find that the lifestyle and school is not for them, in which case there is a quick exit route! Turnover is low at both Shrewsbury and Bromsgrove this time round, which has pleased both Headmasters.



Scheduled into my visit to Bromsgrove International was some quality time with the Director of Sport Dean Barrick, a former professional footballer. He took me through the curriculum, examined PE and Bromsgrove's extra-curricular strengths. Bromsgrove attracts some of the top junior golfers in Asia and in the world. It is set in the Windsor Park Golf Club, and pupils have access to some superb facilities and coaching. There are many pupils off scratch, and once again a strong contingent of female participants. Other facilities included tennis courts, two football pitches, six lane outdoor swimming pool, outdoor covered basketball court, fitness suite and air conditioned sports hall. Dean and I exchanged ideas, particularly on ideas for recruitment of pupils through scholarship programmes.

Nick Dunn's account of his visit to Shrewsbury (UK) in March:

In February 2011, Paul Greetham, Director of Sport at Shrewsbury School, UK, travelled to Bangkok to visit Shrewsbury International School and view the teaching and playing of sport in our international environment. He was extremely impressed with what he saw of our school and students. I was invited to make a return visit to Shrewsbury in the UK to further the links with our sister school. I have been working at Shrewsbury International School since it opened eight years ago so this visit was overdue and one I was extremely excited about.

When I arrived at the school I was met by the familiar face of Mr Chris Conway, who has been to Thailand many times in his role as Bangkok Liaison Officer. My first impressions were of amazement at the vast size of the school campus which is steeped in history and tradition. The focus is very much on traditional British sports such as Rugby, Football, Cricket and rowing. This is a little different to our school which is contemporary in look and set in the centre of bustling Bangkok. Our sports are focused on the international system - basketball, football, swimming, gymnastics and softball.

During my visit I stayed at Ridgemount boarding house which had a beautiful setting overlooking the River Severn. This houses 65 boys under the leadership of the House Master Mr Will Hughes. Shrewsbury School has 10 houses which, as well as being where the boys aged over 13 and girls aged over 16 live, also form the focal point for competitions and other and other house events. This was similar to our house programme and there were clear comparisons of passion, enthusiasm and loyalty that each of our students have for their house. During my tour I met many members of staff who were highly involved in sport at Shrewsbury School. All of the Masters in Charge of sports made me feel exceptionally welcome and I enjoyed discussing comparisons and contrasts between our two schools.

We also discussed the possibility of making further links with the two schools in sporting events and virtual fixtures.

I learnt a lot about the school during my brief visit which I am delighted to share with the Shrewsbury community here in Bangkok. I came away from the campus feeling that Shrewsbury School has an exceptional high calibre of staff who are committed to the students' learning and development both in the classroom and in the sporting arenas. I also felt that the students were exceptionally receptive and focused and had very good values. This was clearly a huge comparison with Shrewsbury International School and one where the Shrewsbury School ethos and work ethic is mirrored in Thailand.

Many thanks to Paul Greetham who set up my schedule and made me feel very welcome. He is a busy member of staff at Shrewsbury School and a great role model for any Director of Sport.



As I made my way back to sunny Thailand I was already planning the Shrewsbury School tour of 60 boys who will visit Bangkok to compete against Shrewsbury International School and some local schools in October.

Old Salopian Lord Rees, Astronomer Royal and a former president of the Royal Society, awarded the 2011 Templeton Prize

Old Salopian Lord Rees, Astronomer Royal and a former president of the Royal Society, was awarded the 2011 Templeton Prize on 8th April 2011.

The Templeton Prize honours a living person who has made an exceptional contribution to affirming life's spiritual dimension, whether through insight, discovery, or practical works.

Lord Rees is an acclaimed astrophysicist. The remit of his work includes authoring and coauthoring more than 500 research papers and books. His investigations into cosmology and issues in scientific epistemology have redefined the ambit of our knowledge. He is currently Master of Trinity College, Cambridge.

Lord Rees said: "Some people might surmise that intellectual immersion in vast expanses of space and time would render cosmologists serene and uncaring about what happens next year, next week, or tomorrow. But, for me, the opposite is the case.

"My concerns are deepened by the realisation that, even in a perspective extending billions of years into the future, as well as into the past, this century may be a defining moment."

HRH Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, will award the prize to Lord Rees in a private ceremony on Wednesday 1st June 2011 at Buckingham Palace.

The Templeton Prize for Progress Toward Research or Discoveries about Spiritual Realities, is awarded annually to an individual who promotes and advances understanding of spiritual matters. The prize itself was created by the philanthropist and investor, Sir John Templeton in 1972.

Previous recipients include Professor John Barrow, of the Department of Applied Mathematics and Theoretical Physics at Cambridge University

French study trip to Montpellier over the Easter holidays

Greenpower Racing: Season Opener 'Allcomers Race' at Silverstone

Wednesday 4 May 2011

The Young Engineers group of Third and Fourth Form boys spend their Wednesday afternoons building a race car. The car has to be built to Formula 24 Regulations to take part in the National Greenpower Electric Car Racing competition, competing against over 160 teams of 11 to 16 year olds from across the country.

As the term began "Evolution" our car was complete, but with the new Specifications and new batteries it was untried. Shrewsbury Town Football Club allowed us to use part of their Car Park for an initial test before we set off to Silverstone on Sunday 1st May.

With the 3rd Form involved in a D of E practice expedition, it was 4th Formers Andrew Humpish and Will Minshall who drove the car at the Season Opener at Silverstone. Over 60 teams attended the event 45 schools teams and 21 Corporate teams. The car passed scruniteering without a hitch, but due to delays we missed the grid call for our race so we started from the Pit Lane. The weather was fine and conditions were ideal as the cars soon became spread out around Silverstone's International Circuit, some driving as fast as possible, others maintained a steady speed so as to last the full race time. As the race progressed, pit stops were made and the drivers changed, "Evolution" continued with a steady lap time of around 4 minutes.

As the race came to an end "Evolution" was still going, but slowing down. As this was an endurance race we had to wait for the final results. When published we were satisfied with our position of 22nd, but a closer look at the results gave the boys a real sense of achievement as "Zebedee" last year's top car was in 23rd place.







New Director of Old Salopian Club at the helm

Alex Baxter took up the position of Director of the Old Salopian Club on May 3rd 2011.

Alex has lived in Shrewsbury for the past seven years with his wife Carol, who was born in Shrewsbury.

Born into an Army family, Alex likens his childhood to a whistle stop tour various locations in the UK and overseas (including a three year stint in Hong Kong) before settling down in Oxfordshire, where he attended Magdalen College School, Brackley. On leaving, he decided on a military career, initially enlisting in the Royal Navy as a Radio Operator in 1978. While in the Navy he met his future wife Carol (who was serving in the Wrens). In 1985 Alex was commissioned into the Royal Air Force as a flying officer, in the logistics branch. On Sunday morning, the group all came into chapel, where the chaplain of Shrewsbury House church, Henry Corbett, and the Youth Leader Dave Brereton, spoke to everyone about the Shewsy. Following brunch they all went on tours of the boarding houses, being hosted by our pupils who had been to the Shewsy earlier this year on social studies courses. Cricket in the cricket school with Ross Stephen, our Australian Cricket Professional and Coach, was then followed by a gripping football match: Shewsy v Shrewsbury School. At full time, the score was 5-5, but The Shewsy scored the wining Golden Goal. This was quite an achievement, as they had been subbing players of all ages and standards, and were up against our team of mainly Sixth Form boys.

WILL YOU, WON'T YOU JOIN THE DANCE?

"Will you, won't you join the dance" is the title of the gourmet feast of tasty, terpsichorean titbits served up by The King's Singers' glorious concert in the chapel at Shrewsbury School. It was a superbly planned programme ranging from many traditional pieces via the 15th century right up to a Michael Buble song for their final encore. The six members of the group have a history of performing across the world and a repertoire of staggering width, all delivered with an infectious enthusiasm which delighted their audience.

The first half of the evening included compositions by early musicians such as Byrd, Morley and Hilton; more recent works were provided by Schubert, Poulenc, Saint-Saens, Ligetti and Benjamin Britten. "Zum Rundtanz" by Shubert showed the unfailing subtlety of the King's Singers. This simple work has, like many of Schubert's compositions, an underlying darkness which they voiced beautifully. Benjamin Britten's Choral Dances from "Gloriana", written for the coronation of our present Queen, were similarly treated to a fine performance.

Perhaps one of the most remarkable characteristics of this group is their ability to use their voices to create instrumental and orchestral sounds. Jacques Brel's "La valse a mille temps" was an example of this skill; Brel's beautiful song really seemed to have an orchestral backing as did Poulenc's "Clic, clic dansez sabots" with its martial feeling.

The second half included several loved folk songs including "Dance to your Daddy", "She moved through the fair" and "Phil the fluter's ball". All were delivered at speed, with breathtaking accuracy and finely controlled dynamics. Perhaps the finest example of this was "The lobster quadrille", from "Alice in wonderland" set to music by Gyorgy Ligetti. It is described as the most challenging work in the King's Singers' repertoire. It was an exquisite example of the relentlessly high standard of their work.

Royal Society of Chemistry Schools' Analyst Competition 2011

Shrewsbury achieved a credible 4th place in the Midlands heat of the RSC Schools' Analyst Competition held at Keele University on Thursday 28 April.

The team of three L6 chemists, Kiran Mojaria (I), Emerald Storey (MSH) and Howard Stringer (PH) represented the school in this tough competition. The competition involved pupils conducting team based research using sophisticated analytical techniques used by university research scientists.

This year saw students analysing polluted water. Pupils measured the naphthalene content by HPLC (high performance liquid chromatography), the concentration of the Al3+ ions in the water by a back-titration and the PO43- ion concentration using UV-Visible Spectroscopy.

Jeremy Goulding: guest of honour at Shrewsbury International School's Speech Day

Jeremy Goulding was the guest of honour at Shrewsbury International School's Speech Day, held on Friday 6th May. As Headmaster of Shrewsbury School from 2001 to 2010, Mr Goulding was one of the driving forces behind the creation of Shrewsbury International School in Bangkok. Mr Goulding has said of his time as Headmaster of Shrewsbury:

"Looking back, there have been many highlights, but undoubtedly one of the most important was the opportunity, in 2002, to collaborate in the founding of Shrewsbury International School.

"The relationship between the two schools becomes increasingly significant and better understood, year by year. The link between Shrewsbury International School, one of the finest international schools in Thailand, and Shrewsbury School, one of the most distinguished schools in England, is characterised by our shared pursuit of excellence – and nothing less than excellence – in education in its fullest and richest sense."

Speech Day at Shrewsbury International School Bangkok is an important event for everyone in the school community and, as such, was a fitting event for Mr Goulding to say his final farewell to students, staff and parents – many of whom he has met during his visits to Bangkok over the years.

Both the Prep School and Senior School were treated to an address by Mr Goulding and Mr Holroyd, School Principal. Mr Holroyd delighted the students with stories from his trip to the Eastern Seaboard with Chris Conway earlier this year, where they visited a number of prestigious American universities, including Yale, Brown, Harvard and MIT.

Mr Goulding drew on his years of teaching Classics to recount the story of Midas and his 'golden touch' and demonstrate to the Junior School the importance of trying to make the right choices.

At the Senior School Speech Day, Mr Goulding recounted his own experiences of Shrewsbury International School Bangkok from its inception and highlighted the many examples of international partnership that exist between the two schools 6,000 miles apart. Mr Goulding invited the students to share in the history of the school that was founded in the same name 450 years ago in England, with this he chose to make the focus of his speech one of the most famous Old Salopians, Charles Darwin.

He concluded by asking the students to study by the principles that Darwin imparted to his children: love your subject; be patient in accumulating knowledge; work hard in observing and collecting facts and use your common sense, with a touch of imagination, in making connections.

Jeremy and Isobel Goulding travelled out to Bangkok together, and for once were able to have a bit of time to relax and take in some of the sights of this fascinating city. During his tenure as Headmaster here, his visits to Bangkok rarely lasted longer than 24 hours!



House Quiz Finals: A great evening's entertainment, followed by a tremendous win by School House

The third series of the House Challenge quiz took place during the first two weeks of term, culminating in the semi-finals and final in the Ashton Theatre on Friday evening. The tournament, played under the rules of University Challenge (of which our own quiz guru, Dr Charles Oakley, is a former winner and current question-setter), tests not only general knowledge, but also nerve and a degree of teamwork. Having conducted the earlier rounds single-handed, Dr Oakley withdrew to the "technical area", keeping the score and providing the occasional ruling on the acceptability of an answer. In the chair was Toby Percival of the Classics Department, a more genial host than the acerbic Paxman, but no less rigorous in requiring prompt and precise replies. He struck the right balance between fun and firmness. Every now and again it was necessary for him to repeat something which had been delivered to him in a sotto voce aside, and it would be worth reminding contestants to address the audience, and not only the Chair. For the most part, however, they did speak out confidently and appeared to be enjoying themselves. So did the audience, though classroom habits die hard, and hands frequently shot up in a bid for recognition. Fortunately, supporters refrained from spoiling the game by prompting.

In the first semi-final, Severn Hill saw off the challenge of a competitive Rigg's quartet, and in the second, School House defeated an Oldham's team which had impressed in a closely-fought quarter-final. The margins of victory raised hopes of an exciting climax, but it was not to be. School House, with enthusiastic backing from their peers, had the wind in their sails from the start, and Severn Hill were for long periods reduced to the role of spectators while their opponents racked up the points. It was not as if they didn't know any answers; they had registered the highest score in the semi-finals, and they could be seen to wince as they listened to bonus questions they had missed out on, all because of the hair-trigger response of the School House team. Time after time the latter got in first, eventually reaching the spectacular total of 310 points in just twenty-two minutes. They were worthy winners and on this showing will take some stopping next year.

Headmaster's consultation with OS Club

Friday 13 May 2011

As part of a wide consultation programme, the Headmaster, Mark Turner, recently briefed Old Salopian audiences on the future plans for the School, referred to as Shrewsbury's "2020 Vision". The first briefing took place in the distinguished surroundings of the Royal Automobile Club in London on 9 May. This was followed by a second event on 11 May at Gawsworth Hall in Cheshire, the delightful 13th century home of Tim and Elizabeth Richards.

On both occasions the Headmaster was eloquently introduced by the OS President, Richard Barber, who also took the opportunity to inform Old Salopians of the ongoing governance review within the Club.

Mark Turner's presentations covered a wide range of topics. He described the broad engagement strategy he had embarked upon and the need to reflect on his findings before considering any changes. The School was rated as "outstanding" in all respects, following two high profile inspections. An extensive survey had been carried out incorporating the views of parents, pupils, staff and Old Salopians. Some of the headline banners were as follows:

- 56% of parents have attended boarding school.
- The 3 most popular words to describe Shrewsbury are: "Rounded, Welcoming and Sporting".
- The 3 least popular words to describe the School are: "Pompous, Unapproachable and Unresponsive".
- 95% of pupils are well-disposed to the School.
- 90% of parents feel that the School had met or exceeded their expectations.
- Areas for improvement included academic achievement, the quality of food and improvement of the facilities within some of the boarding houses.

The Head highlighted that there was now overwhelming support for the co-educational Sixth Form at Shrewsbury. The School's governors had taken the decision to opt out of league tables, as these did not represent a true measure of a first-class, all round education. This was very much in line with leading academic schools including Winchester, Eton and St Paul's. The School continued to achieve huge success in the fields of sport, drama, music and art. He viewed the OS Club as resurgent and that the current review provided a great opportunity for positive changes.

The School was keen that Old Salopians continued to recommend a Shrewsbury education to others, based on their knowledge and affection for the School. The "2020 vision" is a "road-map" setting out the type of School Shrewsbury will strive to be over the next decade. Mark Turner concluded his presentation by stating that in all of the feedback to date, the one thing that must definitely not be changed about the School is the "Spirit of Shrewsbury" - that indefinable mix of history, geography, culture and comradeship that binds Old Salopians, staff, parents and pupils to Shrewsbury School.

At each of the events the Headmaster threw the floor open for questions - Old Salopians were not backwards in coming forwards! Questions covered assistance to those unable to afford full fees, league tables, opening entry up to girls in all age groups, adoption of the International Baccalaureate and international, national and regional links. A fuller description of the Headmaster's presentation and the questions and answers from both events are available from the OS Club.

Tuesday 17 May 2011

The built-in flexibility of the Maidment Building came to the rescue on Sunday evening. Forced indoors by inclement weather, the organisers were able to use the hall in conference mode for the reception, before a quick restoration of the seating made it ready for the concert. A large audience was soon in place for first item, "Now is the month of Maying", given by a quintet of singers under the direction of John Moore. This was ensemble singing of the highest order, the several voices blending as if they had been together for years. Their shared understanding of the spirit of the period was a delight.

That the Music Department has an exceptional crop of flautists was apparent in an arrangement of the Andante from Mendelssohn's "Italian" symphony, a novel idea which came off after a tentative start. There was a further woodwind contribution from a quartet of experts familiar to regular concert-goers, and in between we had two numbers from the Chamber Choir. Not for the first time, there was evidence that this group is heard to greater advantage in early music, though both pieces were delivered with the clarity which is the hallmark of Dympna Nightingale's elite group.

It is always a pleasure to see David Joyce's name in the programme, and on this occasion his breezy manner as he set up the stage promised something special. So it proved, for I have never heard David play better than he did in this Schumann Sonata. Rich in tone and inspired in identification with the music, his performance was a personal triumph, enhanced by his rapport with John Moore at the piano. This is a good moment to mention what a fine accompanist we have in our Director. However little the chance to rehearse and whatever the style required, week after week he provides responsive and idiomatic support for pupils and colleagues. This particular instance of collaboration was a gem.

So, too, was Laurence Jeffcoate's flamboyant rendition of "Luck be a Lady Tonight". Here is a singer who is developing his baritone voice at an astonishing pace. Earlier in the year, I thought the transition might take a couple of years, yet only months later we find him secure and resonant - and completely at home on stage. We know he has done it before, but it is encouraging to see that he has a future as well.

Rob Collins is further on in his career, on his way to a prestigious academy in America, and his performance on saxophone showed us why he gained acceptance.

Younger, but already making his mark professionally, is Ali Webb, who sings to his own accompaniment. Even as he got ready the sound system, one could detect the poise of an experienced artist, an impression confirmed by his relaxed and flexible delivery. So assured is he that it can escape notice that he is also playing the piano very well indeed.

Before him at the microphone, Paul Greetham, Director of Sport, had demonstrated that he, too, was no stranger to the platform, though he admitted to being nervous about appearing before members of the School. If he was, it didn't show. Power and panache were there in plenty and he was equally in control of an impressive upper register.



These virtues of Paul's and Ali's singing survived the layer of distortion introduced by excessive amplification. "Too loud" appears to be a minimum setting for the technician, but to my ears, it only puts up a barrier between audience and artist.

It is another of the excellent Maidment Building's party tricks that the accoustic can be adjusted to suit the occasion, and the promoters of this concert had got it just right.

At the end of the concert, JFM made a short(ish) speech, thanking Friends for their continued support. He stressed the importance of private generosity at a time of diminishing state funding, and re-affirmed the School's commitment to providing quality live music in Shropshire.

On paper, this was one of the strongest Barber team's that we've for some time. It demonstrates our potential, but also shows that to win top competitions we need to get players playing more regularly to achieve results. It's a shame that our top players are by and large located outside the London playing centre. We now have the players to win the Barber, but we need to be playing consistently throughout the season in the League and major competitions if we are to stand a chance of beating the Olavians. Ed Taylor and Tom Cox deserved their win at 1st pair. At second pair, Rich Nichols and Tom Gerrard faced arguably the strongest pair on the day. Their score doesn't quite reflect how close the game was and with Seb Cooley going on to win the Kinnaird Cup later in the season their performance against him was encouraging. In 3rd, Rory Griffiths and Matt McKeever, who have only recently left Shrewsbury fought well against multiple Kinnaird winner Matt Wiseman but didn't have the experience to quite pull it off.

In the EFA Trophy, the Club was pipped at the post by Bekhamsted in a nail biting final. The scores were:

Grant Williams and Dave Blowfield fought hard to share the first two games 9-12, 12-4 but the morning's efforts caught up with them in the end and Theodossi and Joyce won 3-1 in four hard-fought games. Second pair saw Welti and Thomason in fine form, recording their second win of the day with a comfortable 3-0 victory over Smith and Fagan. The early signs at third pair were good for the Club with Marc Quinn and Craig Webster establishing a 2-0 lead. The third game was the turning point, however, as O'Neill began to take control of the contest and with solid support from Rattan won it 12-6. Once the momentum had turned there was little Marc and Craig could do, and the Berkhamstedians went on to win in five games. In the League, the Club came second to last in both Divisions. A change in strategy next season with the Club entering just one team in Division II should help improve our performance next year.



In other tournaments, the South won the inter-club Harding Trophy at Shrewsbury on the day of the formal opening of the refurbished Fives courts at The Schools. The season also saw a strong Salopian presence in the Aberconway "Father and Sons" Cup. After an essentially all Salopian semi final, the final saw current holders Peter and Rex Worth beaten by Mike and Chris Hughes. In what was a closely fought game throughout, Mike's fine form on the day just gave them the edge, and prevented Rex from dominating the court. Mike and Chris carved out a good victory in what was a fantastic final to watch.

A new competition this season saw Old Salopians pairing up with current pupils from Shrewsbury in the Oldboy/School boy competition. A fantastic day of Fives saw the Shrewsbury team just miss out on the cup, loosing to St Olaves in the final. The scores were:

By far the greatest event of the season was the October day opening of the newly refurbished Fives courts at Shrewsbury; now known as 'The Worth Courts'. Richard Barber's speech from that day was published in the November 2010 edition of the Salopian magazine. Attempting to summarise this momentous project in just a few words here would not do it justice. I would however like to personally thank all those involved in the project. It was a fantastic achievement and you have successfully secured the future of Fives at Shrewsbury.

With the newly refurbished courts in place, it was great to see such an outstanding performance from the Shrewsbury School team in the National Schools Championships this season. You'll be able to read the account of this competition in the School News section. On behalf of the OSEFC, I'd like to congratulate all the players and coaching staff on their almost total domination of the competition across most age groups. In particular, congratulations to Jack Hudson-Williams and George Thomason who won the Open Competition, without dropping a single game – a feat almost unique in the annuls of Eton Fives.

On a final note, I am passing on the secretarial baton for the Old Salopian Eton Fives Club to Peter Nichols from the end of this season. I've enjoyed my 9 years as Hon.Sec of the Club and I'd like to thank all those who have helped out during my tenure. In Peter I'm pleased to be passing on the management of the Club to such a dedicated Old Salopian and committed Fives player.

A Week in the Life of Kait Weston

Thursday 26 May 2011

Breaking with tradition, we asked a member of the Common Room to write our 'Week in the Life of' article this week; we thought an insight into the frantic life of an Assistant Housemaster, Housemistress-in-waiting (house still being built) and full time Biology teacher might be interesting. I don't think any of us realised quite how frantic that life was...



All the members of the Shrewsbury School Common Room have a number of metaphorical hats – the guises and responsibilities that we have in our day-today lives at school. My personal hat collection consists of one "Biology teacher" hat- green and leafy with goggles perched on top; "Assistant housemaster of Port Hill" hat – eye poppingly bright in the red and gold stripes of the mighty Port Hill; one "Listening team" hat – warm and cosy with ear flaps permanently propped up; a "J14 Rowing coach" hat weatherproof; the "RSSH hat" aerodynamic in regulation navy blue and a new hat which I added to my collection last March - "Housemistress-in-waiting of Emma Darwin Hall", the second VI form girls' house in Shrewsbury School. This is a bright yellow construction helmet lined in the Wedgewood blue and apple green of EDH. A typical week at Shrewsbury involves a lot of dressing up!

Friday 20th May

Friday morning starts off in Port Hill, a relatively quick cycle from home made even faster without the drag effect of a 2-child trailer towed behind the trusty bike. I check any notes left for me by Struan, PH Housemaster, look at emails and phone messages and walk around the house chatting to the boys to find out how exams are going. The third form have chapel on a Friday so I see them as a group to talk about items that affect them and send them on their way – can't be late for Rev. Dobbie. Callover is a rather minimal affair, all the lower Sixth are on study leave, so we whiz through that and I make my way to chapel.

I teach 3 upper sixth lessons in the morning, all with the same set – we go through exam questions, topic revision and a few quick-fire questions. This is a necessary evil as they are starting exam leave in a week's time and need to be fully prepared even though they won't sit their paper until June 22nd. With several potential medics and top biologists/ biochemists in the group it is important that they are in the best possible position to attain As and A*s in this increasingly competitive university market. Between lessons, on the way back home from the supermarket shop, my dear husband drops off a coffee and some flapjacks (drink for me, cakes for upper sixth).



After lunch, a light spot of marking, lesson planning and emailing local parents about the Day Parent's Association Jazz Evening on June 9th (get in touch with me if you would like tickets)! I see the fifth form for a revision lesson, for some it is their last Biology lesson ever. With goodbyes and "Good Lucks" I move across to a marketing meeting to discuss girl numbers for 2012. A very productive meeting was made even better by delicious scones baked by Mrs. Llewelyn-Jones. I then spend the next hour or so researching material – snooping on other independent school's sixth form admissions processes – and write more fifth form tutor reports. Two of the MSH Lower Sixth girls who are transferring across to EDH next term have been selected to apply for Praepostorship, I must remember to send them my best wishes.

At 6.45pm I pop over to Port Hill to report for duty. A few third formers are knocking a cricket ball about outside and one fourth former is in the house tonight. At this stage of the exam season it can feel a little like the Marie Celeste, but at least the quiet house allowed some solid revision to be completed. At half past eight I clamber aboard the trusty stead and cycle home – 'tis rather chilly now. I arrive home to my husband who is delighted to see me, he can now hand over the babysitting reins and watch Shrewsbury Town (lose).

Saturday 21st May

A genetics and ecology revision lesson with the Upper Sixth followed by an AS revision session with a couple of my Lower Sixth students, they sat trial exams at the end of last term and have vastly improved upon their previous grades. I hope that all goes according to plan when they sit their papers on Thursday. After a bit more report writing and a couple of letters to families that have visited recently I return home for a bite to eat. Later on my younger son and I walk/ scoot back to school to watch the cricket and rowing – aged two and a half he shamelessly makes new friends, particularly with the sixth form girls!

Sunday 22nd May

My husbands' birthday, we spend the morning getting buffeted by gales in Nantwich whilst watching him compete in the Cheshire Triathlon - I wonder to myself if we can get some of the VI form competing in this event next year? Port Hill has had a number of talented triathletes in recent years and did brilliantly in the first School Triathlon last summer. We pop back to School in the afternoon as I have a few more reports to write and have a look at the EDH site through the private side windows. My sons hope that the diggers in the courtyard will still be there when we move in, I don't.

Monday 23rd May

The fourth form sat one of their Biology GCSE modules last week, and have been in revision mode for several weeks now. Today they started learning about the nervous system, they were certainly a little nervous when I asked them to do a blind-folded taste test with dried fruit! A quick meeting with the Director of Studies followed, talking about timetables and schedules for next year, followed by another revision session with a lower sixth former. Mick the tiler interrupts the session to ask me about tile choices and borders for bathrooms. During a 6 mile run later we stop in the curtain shop to catch our breath and find out how the curtains are coming along for EDH and the private side.

Tuesday 24th May

The day started with a tutorial with my fifth form tutor group, discussing exams and recent reports. They are right in the middle of an incredibly hectic exam season so it is important to keep up the momentum in revision whilst allowing them a little down-time too. Exam invigilation next, I must remember to wear softer soled shoes in the future, followed by a quick PR meeting and a discussion with my newly appointed Assistant, Clare Wilson, about sporting events next term. Another invigilation session, then a revision lesson and then over to MSH to



meet a girl who is thinking about joining us in September 2012. Over a lovely platter of sandwiches, fresh fruit and cakes our conversation evolves from discussing the layout of EDH to evaluating the merits of chickens, mediaeval house renovation, summer trips to Russia and Greece and dinner parties in the South-East. Spending time with prospective students and their families is a lovely part of the job.

Later in the afternoon we meet to discuss the official opening of EDH in September. Esteemed poet and author, Ruth Padel who is Emma and Charles Darwin's great – great – granddaughter will be cutting the ribbon and addressing the guests. The discussion revolves around food, drink and music – it looks set to be a lovely afternoon – now if only someone can ensure that the weather is kind to us....

Wednesday 25th May

A typically busy day starts with teaching, another revision tutorial and a quick trip to the building site to see how things are progressing there (very well, by the way). Lesson planning, marking test scripts, writing a letter to the family I met yesterday follow. I then take a call from a prospective relief matron and move off to lunch. The girls' Hunt (cross-country running) photo follows, more EDH and PH admin and then 75 minutes of GCSE CDT invigilation.

Thursday 26th May

Up early to bake chocolate buns for an Upper Sixth set, we have our last lesson today and some students are also retaking their AS biology this afternoon. I drop off the boys at nursery, walk up to School, discuss with Ellie, one of our lovely Biology technicians, the acid rain practical I will be doing with the third form later this morning. Head of department has had news on the external moderation of GCSE practicals, I have 3 papers to send away so need to double check the admin. During my one "free" period this morning I have a meeting with the architects, builders and project manager, a few finishing touches to discuss. At lunch a small group of us meet to discuss Medic Malawi, a new charity project that the School is planning to get involved with. With 2 small children and a full time job, I can't see myself getting to Malawi in the near future, but I would love to be involved in raising awareness and funds for a community in this devastatingly poor country. When rushing from one meeting to another and fretting about reports, it is sobering to consider those whose very existence is a daily struggle. Now, I need to rush off to join members of SMT to talk about the EDH opening....one more day until half term, when I dispense with my hats and ... put on my war paint for a wedding and armour for a week of fun with the family!

Despite rather cloudy and blustery weather conditions, the Rigg's House 150th Birthday celebrations went with a real swing. Up to 170 Old Salopians of vintages ranging from the 1940s to the "noughties" dropped in during the day. The event began with a service in the School chapel followed by drinks on the Kingsland House lawns. A magnificent luncheon ensued and for the vast majority this was the centrepiece of their day. The meal provided the platform for several keynote speeches.

- Adrian Kemp delivered an entertaining oration in which he described the souls of "Riggites" being akin "to the guardians of the school gates, a bit like The Lifeguards, but without the horses...". He also commented that the girth of some of his schoolboy colleagues reflected the proximity of Riggs to the School tuck shop. Finally Adrian lamented the unfortunate colours of the House (Chocolate and Gold) which were often referred to as something unprintable (coloured yellow and brown) when playing football against Oldham's boys!
- Mark Turner's speech paid tribute to Rigg's housemasters past and present. In remembering the great "Brookie" (housemaster from 1947 to 62) held in such great affection by generations of Rigg's men, he was able to thank the former housemaster's 2 daughters for honouring the occasion with their presence. He thanked Matthew Mostyn the current Rigg's housemaster for his sterling efforts in organising an excellent event. (Matthew steps down at the end of this term, after a 10-year spell at the helm).
- Charles Foster responded to the Headmaster's address. Charles is a former Cambridge graduate with a background in veterinary medicine and now a barrister specialising in medical law. His thoughts centred on how Rigg's men were encouraged to do the things they wanted to do, rather on what others felt they should. His toast of "Happy Anarchy" rounded off a memorable meal.

Afterwards "Riggites" were given the freedom of the site and many took the opportunity to explore some of the new buildings as well as visiting their old House. Those who congregated in Rigg's Hall were able to appreciate the extensive collection of old school photographs and reports that had been gathered and exhibited for perusal. Later that evening, a black tie dinner took place in Kingsland House - 33 Riggs men attended, rounding off a most successful and memorable day.

Mark Lascelles, SH 1982-87 and Staff 1992-2009, has been appointed Headmaster of Dauntseys, Wiltshire. Mark and Amber (staff 2000-2009) will move with their three daughters to Wiltshire in 2012.

Mark returned to Shrewsbury to teach Geography, after University at Durham. In his time on the staff, Mark was Master in Charge of Cricket, Football and Fives and Housemaster of The Grove.
