

Chemistry Olympiad success

Shrewsbury Sixth Form chemists amassed a total of six gold, seven silver and six bronze medals in the first round of the 2019 RSC Chemistry Olympiad.

This year, 24 of our students took part in Round 1 of the RSC Chemistry Olympiad, sitting a paper that was exceptionally challenging. The percentage of certificates they earned between them was significantly higher than the national average. Notably, Lower Sixth Former Peter Yang scored 46/80, which was the highest of our participants and placed him in the top 5% nationally, while Upper Sixth Former Adam Pattenden earned his second Gold certificate – a rare achievement.

This competition is designed to challenge and stimulate the most talented young chemists in the country and is open to all post-16 students in the UK. There are three rounds to the competition, at the end of which the UK team is selected to train for, and compete in, the International Chemistry Olympiad. The Round 1 paper itself is based on the core of the chemistry A-level specifications, so that students taking any of the different exam board A-levels can compete fairly. The exam lasts two hours and is composed of a series of structured questions designed to stretch able students by



making them apply the principles they have learnt to new and often more complex situations than they would meet in their A-level course. With credit generally available just for the answers (not for any of the usually lengthy working out), it is essential to have a very sound base of knowledge and understanding, meticulousness, and the ability to think and reason - often "outside the box" - at a high level.

It has been a busy and successful week for the Shrewsbury School Golf Team of captain Ted Williams (U6 R) playing off a handicap of 7, Sam Austen (L6 SH) off 2 and Rory McDonald-O'Brien (4 PH) off 1.



The ISGA National Final was played over the 27th -29th April at Prince's and Royal St George's Golf Clubs, in Sandwich, Kent. Twenty regional winning schools took part, including many of the best young golfers in the country. Against a good number of golf academy schools, we wanted to aim high and achieve a top ten finish - even if it was our first National Final.

We travelled to Prince's on the Saturday morning via a practice round at Rye Golf Club, where we were shown great hospitality by brothers Tim and Richard Austen. Richard had flown over specially to watch his son play in the final. Then onward to our digs at Prince's and a couple of games of competitive snooker before bedtime and dreams of course records and holes in one!

Storm Hannah was still very evident at tee-off time on the Sunday, so it was a high-scoring day for many on the Shore and Himalayas course at Prince's. Mr and Mrs Williams wrapped up well to follow Ted's progress and Mr Austen, with his four-week-old 'bionic' hip, followed Sam. Rory scored 5 over par and Ted a couple further back, with Sam struggling a little - even after scoring



an eagle into the wind! The best score by anyone on the day was 1 under par, which gives a sense of just how difficult it was.

In the evening we had a prizegiving dinner at Prince's Club House, where the boys received their Regional Winners trophy.



After more competitive snooker, we awoke to a lovely summer's day for the final round at Royal St George's - home to Darren Clarke's 2011 Open Championship win.

Serious game faces were in evidence on the driving range on the Monday morning, and any faint whispers of 'going low' were quickly hushed by those who knew the course's energy-sapping reputation. Rory shot level par, Sam was 3 over and Ted was disappointed not to have his best game on such an iconic golf course. Loretto edged out last year's winners Rossall, aided by the best round of the day of 3 under par. We were delighted to finish 6th out of the 20 participating schools: top of the non-golf academy schools and ahead of a good few golf academy schools to boot!

Rory received a gold medal for his top ten individual score, Sam got a silver and Ted a bronze. I was tremendously proud of the team's performance and thoroughly enjoyed their company over the three days. They were determined individually and there was great team camaraderie throughout. National Schools' Fives Championships 2019

"For every reason I can think of, this was the best Nationals I can remember" - report by Teacher in Charge of Fives, Seb Cooley.

The 2019 Nationals were hosted this year by Shrewsbury in the last week of the Lent Term. This made for a much more relaxed week for the Shrewsbury staff and for far fewer lessons missed by the students. This was very welcome from our point of view; rumours that a local minibus company and a hotel of a well-known chain in Slough went into administration have not been confirmed.

The entry into the tournament was nonetheless strong and overall the week ran as smoothly and as well as any I can remember; several teachers-in-charge from other schools have been in touch to commend the way the week was run. This was doubtless helped by some glorious conditions (in both 2013 and 2016 we have hosted in snow) which meant everyone was happy around the courts between games and spectating was comfortable.

The **U15s** kicked off proceedings on 24th March, with 11 Salopian pairs entered, seven of these qualifying from their pool. Credit is due to Harry Cooke who with Henry McGowan ran fourth seeds St Olave's very close in the first game, narrowly missing out on a place in quarter-finals. Another week playing together might have done it. As it was we had two pairs in quarters, where Nick Argyle & Jago Ainslie drew the top seeds, Harrow. They didn't have the firepower to win that encounter.

Rory McDonald-O'Brien & Digby Taylor-West reached the final and played Harrow in a repeat of last year's beginners final with, sadly for us, the same result, though this year Harrow won 3-0, not 3-1. The Harrow pair have selected this as their main sport for the first two terms and we know that if we are to catch up with them next year, our boys will have to commit fully during the Lent Term.

The **U16s** were up next and here we knew that, having committed their Fourth Form Lent Term to football and got onto the fives courts around their football commitments this year too, Finn Sansom, Guy Gowar and Ted Davis would need to get as much court time as possible during the tournament and some close matches early on to fire them into action.

APM had put a lot of thought and juggling into finding the most effective pairings. At the last 16 stage we had two pairs left in the competition. The second pair had got past Harrow 2 to get to this stage, but came up against a strong first seed in Eton and didn't score a point. Our first pair had had a tussle (12-8, 12-8) against Highgate 3 and drew Harrow 1 (7th seeds) in the last 16. It was just the match we needed but it took just too long to get into it: we lost 13-12 in the third.





U14 Beginners

It is always difficult to predict how the **U14 Beginner** tournament will go: all players are on such a steep trajectory that their response to the competitive fives during the tournament is what makes the difference in the later stages. We have three strong pairs in this year group; the pairings had been shuffling in the fortnight before to find the best combination. All three of these pairs reached quarter-finals, but some tough draws and strong opposition meant that only one (Alex Clark & George Hughes) went through to semis: something for this group to work on in future years.

Alex and George were looking strong: they got through semis despite not playing their best fives: George's cut, devastating when it works well, was inconsistent and Alex was trying to emulate it without much success. Nonetheless, during rallies in the semi-final against Eton 2 they were manoeuvring the play competently onto their terms (promisingly these terms being the corner of the court around the buttress) and winning it here. This premise they retained in the final against a strong Eton 1. With the Open final in the nextdoor court, they did well to retain concentration. Again, they won the match in and around the buttress to claim the tournament victory.

In the **Ladies'** competition we had strong pairs: our first and second pairs were a shuffling of last year's finalists, with Sophia Breese this year playing with Emma Graham in pair 1 and Katie Oswald with Lizzie Ware in pair 2. Our third pair of Issy Wong (L6) and Fourth Former Izzy Morris knew they were dangerous, both having exceptionally strong cuts. Indeed such is our dominance at the senior ladies' level that (perhaps helped by the home championships) we had eight pars in the last 16.



Sadly only our top three pairs named above pressed through into the quarters, but they each won their quarter, setting up a Shrewsbury 1 vs Shrewsbury 3 semi-final. This became a five-set epic finishing around 7:30 in the evening, with the younger girls eventually winning out in the decider, having lost a 2-0 lead.

Katie and Lizzie went through their semi-final more comfortably, setting up another all-Shrewsbury final, this year pair 2 against pair 3. The final, too, was a long battle. Issy and Izzy won the first game 14-13; Katie and Lizzie drew level; the youngsters roared away in the third, winning 12-3, but the Upper Sixth Formers showed fight and stamina (and possibly the previous evening's sets were causing some fatigue). The match levelled at 2-2 and it was Katie and Lizzie who held their nerve and consistency in the 5th to take the title. Katie has thus won back-toback Open titles and the future looks promising with the other two finalists both still with us next year.

They were playing with the top two boys, Dan Humes and Will Sissons respectively. Of our nine pairs in the last 16, these two pulled through to semis.

The boys had had their own four-hour five-setter the previous day (more on which below), and Will in particular looked mentally drained from that battle. Nonetheless these pairs reached semifinals: both came through against tough opposition from Highgate, thus setting up a repeat of last year's final. This was the last match of the entire week and now, playing against friends, the



pressure came off Will and Dan who were able to relax a little and play more freely. This, combined with astonishing retrieving from both girls, turned the match into a real exhibition of first-class mixed fives; some of the shots being hit by all four players would have stood out positively in an adult mixed final. Sophia and Will came through winners in the end, though of course this match too went to a deciding game!

The **Boys' Open** competition had been billed as a good, open tournament all season, with most of 2018 semi-finalists having been Upper Sixth Formers. Will Sissons and Dan Humes were always our stand-out pair in the year, Will having come to us from Rydal as a Sixth Form entrant and Dan having always been well ahead of others in the year. Much depended on Dan's fitness though: he had been struggling with back problems through the Sixth Form and had missed much of the last season with a stress fracture. After his return to sport he had still struggled with muscular pain: though it didn't hamper his athleticism, it was a worry. Through the term it had become clear that games on consecutive days caused him discomfort; the two weeks before the Championships were given over entirely to physio work, stretching and core strength and it needed huge discipline from Dan to make sure he was fit for potentially difficult quarters, semis and, hopefully, final. The pair had done enough in the season to be seeded 2nd, though their games against 3rd seeds St Olave's had been close and had often swung in the Olavians' favour.

In the rest of the Open competition we had a further 14 pairs, composed of U16 pairs gaining invaluable experience, Lower Sixth entrants new to the game and Upper Sixth Formers who have come back to the game having realised they've missed it while out running with the Hunt or playing football. These played alongside our usual top six pairs. We even had the return to the game of Peter Clark, off for the season with his own stress fracture, back on court for the first time in the Nationals week. It was deemed most sensible to play him in a lower pair with an entrant rather than put him in a more pressurised second pair where competitive instincts might override caution with regards to his back.

Three of these pairs made it through to the last 16, our second pair missing out on quarter-finals by the narrowest of margins, losing 3-2 to seeded Highgate 2 at 7:30 on Tuesday evening. Arthur Garrett will look forward to resuming his partnership with Peter Clark next year: while they had flashes of brilliance, the unsettled nature of his partnership with Joe Kynaston meant that they were not consistent enough to dismantle a strong opponent.

Will and Dan, meanwhile, cruised through their last-16 match against Highgate 3, allowing Dan to recover and do his stretches in advance of Wednesday morning's quarter. In this they played Eton 3, a competent pair and potential banana-skin, but an assured performance sent the Shrewsbury pair through 12-7, 12-0, 12-6, again without too much strain on bodies.

The semi-final was to be a key match against St Olave's who, as mentioned, had sometimes been on top through the season. Will and Dan put in a strong performance on Thursday morning and, though they held with the game, the Olavians were always under pressure and chasing. Again, Shrewsbury won 3-0 and were starting to look like they were peaking at the right time.

After their semi-finals, the four finalists came together to agree a start time for the final of 9:30 on Friday morning. As is the nature of fives, this was negotiated and agreed entirely by the players themselves. What followed through that afternoon and evening was one of the strongest endorsements of Schoolboy sport I have experienced.

Eton coach, George Thomason (an Old Salopian and himself a former winner of this tournament), had unfortunately been in hospital for much of the week and had a chance of being discharged around midday on Friday. He got in touch with the Eton pair and their staff, who



asked whether the final might be delayed so that he could watch. The immediate response from Will, as he tried to get in touch with Dan through the aftermath of the Ingram's House play, was "I assume Dan will agree with me to play at 2pm - I'm sure the Eton boys would do the same if we had a coach wanting to watch". And so it was: the final was moved to 2:30pm, which also allowed our Upper Sixth to organise an army of home supporters, since it didn't clash with the School Assembly.

The final began to form, with both pairs scoring from the start and the first game remaining close until Shrewsbury conceded a number of points in quick succession – one of their trademarks through the term and something we had worked to correct. They didn't recover and lost the game 9-12, then went behind 2-8 in the second. At this stage things didn't look too positive, but rarely does a pair win this tournament without a bit of a fight, and Will and Dan were determined.

Roared on by a large home crowd, they found their returns of cut and put together some runs of points of their own, pulling back into the game to level 10-10. The final stages seemed critical and unsurprisingly, perhaps, the game reached sudden death at 12-12. It was Shrewsbury who clinched the game, perhaps crucially, as a 2-0 lead would have presented an enormous challenge.

Buoyed by this and some more outstanding returning of the cut, Shrewsbury raced to win the third 12-6. By this time the coach was live tweeting the scores, primarily to give himself something to do that didn't involve biting his nails or indeed gnawing his fingers down to the knuckle. It seemed Shrewsbury should have the momentum into the 4th, but Eton threw everything at the game which, again, went to 10-10 and this time was set to 15. Eton raced to 14 in one hand, but Shrewsbury saved game points and pulled back to 11, 12 and 13. Just as it appeared Shrewbury might pull through, Eton found the winner they needed and levelled the match at 2-2. It was to be decided by a fifth game.

By now they were on their third ball of the match and all four players were regularly returning cut from under the front wall: unusual, but such was the level of retrieving that few cuts – and indeed few shots into the buttress – went unreturned. Will and Dan were putting into practice – as they had been throughout the match – much of the work they had done through the season on taking the pace off their approach shots into the buttress, thereby setting up more attacking chances at the front of court. Dan's astonishing athleticism and Will's apparently effortless movement around the court (he has been described as appearing weightless in strength and conditioning sessions by other students) kept them in points that Eton might justifiably have thought they had earned.

The fifth game, to script, also reached 10-10 after long rallies and unbelievable retrieving all round. It, too, was set to 15. This time Shrewsbury worked their way to match points and, though Eton saved one, Will and Dan converted the second to close out 15-12 and the match. It had taken four hours.





Coaches learn a lot about their players in these competitive moments and matches. And sometimes the players about their coach! But what stood out for me and for many spectators was the atmosphere on court. The four players dealt with refereeing their game to the highest of standards and showed throughout it a mutual respect that transcended even the quality of their play. Dan, in particular, had shown this in the semi-final too, insisting a let be played although the Olavian coach had overruled his pair to let them know a shot was in, since the players should decide the matter on court. The ability of the players to call objectively on their shots when there is so much at stake and they are so invested in the result marks this game apart from all their other sporting endeavours, and it gives certainly this coach an even greater pride in the players and the result that it was won so emphatically in the right spirit.

I must thank the Shrewsbury School events staff and coaches who put in so much time and care into making sure that everything was ready for hosting the tournament and helping make the week such a resounding success: it really was, for every reason I can think of, the best Nationals I can remember.






Classical Society lecture: 'Cicero and his Enemies'


Sixth Form Classicists enjoyed a fascinating and entertaining talk given by Dr Kathryn Tempest, Senior Lecturer in Classics at Roehampton University, author and broadcaster.



The 1st century BC in Rome was the age of change. It was the age of the Dictator Julius Caesar, of his Master of Horse Mark Antony, and his nemesis, the great republican politician Marcus Tullius Cicero. The 70s through to the 40s and beyond was an era which saw such political turbulence, such heights of oratory, and such lows of bloody violence that it is arguably the most engaging of periods in Roman history to study.

Pupils taking A level Latin and/or Classical Civilisation (who are studying Cicero for their exams) were fortunate on Monday to hear Dr Kathryn Tempest from the University of Roehampton in London talk about the methods Cicero employed to verbally attack his political enemies. Dr Tempest's research focuses on Cicero, Roman Oratory and Roman Republican history, and she has written a number of academic books, as well as appearing on the Netflix series 'Roman Empire'!





In our modern age in which we are culturally sensitive - some would say hypersensitive - to causing offence, and in which whoever controls the language controls the argument, Cicero's wholesale use of invective which aimed below-the-belt sucker punches at his opponents' dress sense, facial appearance, sexual tastes and even their excessive love of cosmetics and toiletries might seem shocking in the extreme; Dr Tempest told the audience that nothing was off limits; make your opponent a laughing stock, and you had him on the ropes.

Cicero's wit, bile and acidic tongue bought him enemies, and would eventually cost him his life; after his assassination, his head and hands were nailed on the Speaker's Platform in the Roman Forum; a mute but eloquent message from Mark Antony to all who considered speaking out against him.

Many thanks to Dr Tempest for travelling up from Surrey to deliver such a punchy, passionate and thought-provoking talk.

Included below are tributes to each of the winners from their coaches. Tony Barker Award for All-Round Sporting Excellence: Dan Humes


Dan has been an exceptional 1st XI footballer throughout the last three years. He was a key player in both his Lower and Upper Sixth years and was a major contributor in the 1st XI's run to the ISFA Boodles Quarter-Finals and County Cup Final this season. He scored a couple of key goals during both these cup runs and he can be proud of his time as a 1st XI Shrewsbury footballer.

In cricket, he is the most aggressive stroke player we have had at Shrewsbury since Edward Pollock (2010-12, now playing for Warwickshire CCC). He has scored a weight of runs equivalent to our very best batters over the past two decades and has taken to captaining the 1st XI this year with growing maturity and assurance.

In December, given the possibility of a National title, Dan committed to make fives his priority in the Lent Term. The realisation over a weekend of London fixtures against Highgate and Eton that his back would struggle with consecutive days of high-intensity matches led to a change of approach. No-one is ever happy to be told to compete and train less in order to improve: it is testament to his commitment and development as a sportsman, and to his focus on the goal, that he took this seriously.

In the National Fives Championships in March, all of the work done through the season came together. What was not perhaps apparent in the National Open Final to those who don't know the sport well, was the grace and ease with which the players made often difficult decisions on the refereeing of the game. Dan, as he had been in the semi-final, was a paragon of this, calling objectively and earning the respect from his opposition that he also showed for them.



This year's event saw many enthusiastic newcomers taking to the stage, many of whom had not experienced dance until arriving at Shrewsbury. One of the highlights of the evening, for me, was seeing the Wednesday afternoon dance group explode onto the stage with a high-octane jive routine, set to Benny Goodman's 'Sing Sing'. Their enjoyment and excitement was palpable, and an utter delight to watch.

The theme for the evening was 'A Dance to the Music of Time', and the dances had each been inspired by a particular period of popular music, beginning with a beautiful ballet solo by Georgina Cooper (G). George Gershwin has inspired choreographers from Wheeldon to Balanchine; his mix of the upbeat and the lyrical allows dancers to explore the whole spectrum of emotion, and Georgina's dance showed off both the poise and elegance of her attitudes as well as the dexterity of her footwork.





We were then transported to the 1960s, by Saffron Milner's (M) impassioned contemporary routine, set to John Lennon's 'Imagine'. Consulting the programme in the foyer, a lady remarked that "It's Saffron with the amazing voice" – but her performance showed that she is able to communicate emotion with her feet as well as her F sharp belt.

Kate Woodman (M) brought us bang up to date with a dazzling tap piece, known to the audience as the 'Cup Song' from Pitch Perfect. Kate's irrepressible charm and energy shone through a challenging and beautifully delivered routine.



The programme was brought to a close by Anya Tonks (MSH) – who appeared to be in every number and whose stamina is an impressive testament to the RSSBC's fitness programme! She



performed her EPQ piece, which she had choreographed herself in response to Rupi Kaur's poem, 'Selfish'.



Having been fortunate enough to see Anya perform this piece for her EPQ assessment last term, it was fascinating to see how she had developed and refined her ideas over time, and her performance had real emotional depth and complexity.


Scottish Islands Peaks Race

Friday 24 May 2019

A thrilling debut for the Hunt in an epic two-day race across fells and water - and a gripping account of their adventures by Mr Griffiths.

'Runners!' went the cry. Lamlash, on the Isle of Arran at first light on a Sunday morning is a fairly inauspicious little hamlet. Yet it would soon welcome the remainder of the 40 boats that had silently crept in to the bay having sailed through the night round the Mull of Kintyre.


Now the sailors waited anxiously for their runners to return from the 19-mile round trip up Goat Fell; the sails were impatiently waiting to fill, the dinghies, ready to transport the runners out, were bobbing in anticipation.



And there they are, the stumbling figures of Tom Jackson, Sam Western and Simon Adney (OS) shuffle, for that is all they can manage, the last few hundred metres in a stunning 3hrs 47mins. I hand them their lifejackets which they fumble on, collapsing in the dinghy only to writhe in an agony of cramp and exhaustive disinterest. A frantic row out to Brown Bear followed by a shaky scramble aboard ensure we have a crucial 17-minute lead over our nearest rivals, Fettes College on La Giraffe. There was now just the small matter of a 15-mile sail across the Firth of Chyde to Troon and the finish. Surely nothing could stop us winning the Youth Section now...?








First held in 1983, the Scottish Islands Peak Race is a somewhat original adventure race for teams of sailors and fell runners. Since 1992 there has been a hotly contested Youth Section that has attracted mainly Scottish schools, but also ones from England and even Aiglon College from Switzerland. The race is non-stop and starts in Oban with a short 4-mile hill run. You then sail to Mull, run 18 miles over Ben Talaidh, sail to Jura, run 14 miles over some of the Paps, sail to Arran, run 19 miles up and down Goat Fell (often in the dark!), and then sail to Troon.

Youth teams consist of six pupils who run in pairs with an adult, each pair doing one island with the fastest pair running the Oban section. Each team carries a tracker for safety; this also provides an addictive way of following their position on a mobile if you download the free app!



Indeed, it was wonderful to feel the support of the school community via the tracker; some must have even woken in the night to check it as I received a message at 3am on Sunday asking why we were not moving!




The most difficult task is finding someone who wants to offer their yacht to a team of ten unwashed souls! The famous explorer, Bill Tilman, used to advertise in the Times for crew by stating 'No pay, no prospects, not much pleasure' and it was in a similar vein that I appealed to my Ingram's parents in the summer of 2017. Yet low and behold, who should come forward but Hugh Clay, round-the-world yachtsman, Arctic sailor and veteran of the Australian and British versions of what is affectionally known as 'Peaks Racing'. He very generously offered to skipper his Pocock 45 with David Russell, another man with vast experience of the sea.

A year of 'due diligence' ensued before we committed to taking Shrewsbury's famous Hunt running club north to create another chapter in its illustrious history. Having been kindly driven the nine hours to Oban on Thursday afternoon in the speed-restricted (62mph!) minibus by parent Shaun Western (who would then take it to Troon), we spent the morning at the Race Briefing, got vaguely familiar with Brown Bear and then brought her round to the start line.





The famous 'Huntsman's Cry' of 'All hounds who wish to run, run hard, run well and may the devil take the hindmost' was on our breaths at midday on Friday 17 May. The evocative sound of the bagpipes filled the air as Tom and Sam charged en masse around the undulating course in Oban. Forty boats vied for pole position near the pier, the holiday sunshine belying an atmosphere of pent-up energy and competitive spirit, ready for the Le Mans-style start. Two by two the runners sprinted down the road and leapt in to their rubber dinghies, rowed to the eager yacht (doing their best not be hit and drowned) before heading up the Sound of Mull.



There were only light airs, but the magic carpet of the flooding tide soon swept us up to Salen, where at 5.50pm, Paddy Barlow, James Weir and Simon Adney were rowed ashore to face the first of three rigorous five-minute kit checks. With no marshals on the route, the rucksacks had to be emptied: waterproof bottoms and top, thermals, hat, gloves, emergency shelter, map, compass and emergency rations were all accounted for; no costly return to the yacht was necessary.



For the waiting crew there was little rest to be had; Brown Bear had to be anchored, sails stowed and supper cooked. The sailors then rested while the remaining four boys played cards in the sun, no doubt contemplating their own upcoming running leg with increasing anxiety.



Despite setting off behind Fettes A and Windermere, it was clear to see from the tracker app that Shrewsbury's runners had overtaken them, but as this was only updated every half an hour, I rowed ashore early to await them.



Led by the indomitable Paddy, all three piled aboard after their hugely pleasing 3hrs 37mins, including Ben Talaidh, while the rest of the crew fumbled with the spinnaker. Windermere School soon ghosted past us in the fading light, their 35ft monohull making the most of the



almost non-existent breeze. Soon the oars were put to use up in the bow, but at 45ft and 14 tonnes, it was almost possible to hear Brown Bear laugh at our feeble efforts.



As darkness descended we reached the Firth of Lorne just as the tide started to flood against us at Duart Castle, but the breeze remained from the north-west, enabling us to nudge south. At this point, Hugh and David, a veritable Davies and Carruthers of the 21st century, made the inspired choice to sail wide and west of Fladda and its powerful tidal gate, before ducking in through the potentially treacherous Corryvreckan at slack water.

By first light the rain had really set in, but the tracker confirmed that we had moved up in to third place overall and first in the Youth Class; a stunning piece of sailing. But now the lighter boats behind soon caught back up to us as we all took advantage of the ebbing tide to eventually arrive in Craighouse at 9am on Saturday.

Jura was the island home of George Orwell when he wrote *1984*, so it seemed appropriate that the oppressive presence of Fettes A on La Giraffe and Windermere on Kittiwake, eventually hunted down Max Green, Sam Watts and myself on our 14-mile wilderness run over some of the famous Paps. An awe-inspiring landscape of Mordor-like proportions gave us a misty embrace, the ephemeral tracts enticing one onwards through a landscape of heather, bogs, fleas and ticks. Even the hundreds of deer questioned our presence in this untamed wasteland, nonchalantly looking up as we came within touching distance.

Off the final Pap, all three youth teams charged down the scree and boulders, through legcutting bracken, before a 'Death March' back along the road to the dinghies. The wind rose, the



sails filled, copious amounts of pasta were hungrily devoured and midnight became the new estimated time of arrival for the final run; the stage was set for an unheard-of finale on Arran.

But sailing can be a fickle business, and just as we were congratulating ourselves on going around 'the Mull' with no seasickness and keeping the Youth Teams just behind us, the wind, like four of our six runners, seemed to clamber into its bunk.

A long slumber ensued; that is apart from James Weir and Max Green who, in a Herculean effort, took it in turns to row Brown Bear forward, close in to the shore, taking every short-cut possible. At long last a slight breeze edged us past Holy Isle and at 5.10am we rowed ashore, a minute behind our rivals, and watched heart in mouth as our team set off one last time.



Rowing back to Brown Bear, I found the entire crew asleep, seemingly dead to the world. The tranquil, sleepy delights of Lamlash were soon extinguished as the first four adult yachts got ready to receive their runners. Like whippets on a leash, the moment the painter from the dinghy was thrown up, the oars of the yachts dug in as they looked for any small advantage on the final leg.

It was very quickly our turn; as we crept out of the bay, our tacks seemed to mock us as we made little headway east. Sam Watts on the binoculars spotted Fettes shougle (as the Scots say) along the road and in what seemed like only seconds, La Giraffe was behind us. It was now decision time for Hugh and David, but they stuck to the rhumb line, leaving the others to risk going north or south to find better wind.





At no point could we relax; after 48 hours on the boat, the now suffocating smell of ten muddy and sweaty males exuding from the cabin become ever more invasive as we wished Troon harbour closer. But at just after 1pm on Sunday, the exhausted crew of Brown Bear could finally celebrate. All that remained was a dinghy paddle to the nearest pier and a triumphant run up to the Harbourmaster's office and the finish.

Warm smiles from the wonderfully supportive and superbly organised Race Committee greeted us and a bottle of champagne was thrust in to our hands. Shrewsbury School on Brown Bear, at the first time of asking, had become Youth Champions of the Scottish Islands Peaks Race!
