The camp follows a generic programme initially, with training sessions on first aid, incident management, kit and equipment, food and nutrition, camp craft to name but a few. As the week progresses the programme disperses into three quite different disciplines: canoeing, hill walking and sea kayaking. Being based in a North Wales hostel, the group are well placed for all three activities.

The three teams had the perfect weather for training, from strong winds and heavy rain and hail, to bright cold crisp sunny days with freezing temperatures and heavy frosts.

The progression for all three groups culminates in an overnight trip. It was the perfect setting, made even more perfect after the boys collected a bag each of flotsam and jetsam, 'leave no trace' being our motto.

OLD SALOPIANS WELCOME THE NEW HEADMASTER

On a dry but cloudy day – fairly typical of the traditional Old Salopian Gathering day in October – over 130 Old Salopians came to Kingsland to add their welcome to the 27th Headmaster and his wife, Mark and Elizabeth Turner. With 20 ex-members of staff, and wives, partners and guests, over 230 visitors enjoyed a day full of activities, or memories, and of celebration.

We gathered first in Chapel – a very different Chapel to that remembered by most, painted in its striking claret and blue, adorned with icons and other works of art, but still that every special place. And we were meeting essentially to remember a very special schoolmaster, Arnold Ellis. The lovely singing of Anthea Ma (UVI) and the haunting oboe of Robert Collins (UVI) added greatly to a memorable service.

Then across to Oliver's Egg where, armed with pre-lunch drinks served in the Quod (known to most as the oldest school swimming pool, now floored over and housing the splendid Sixth Form Centre) we all gathered round the Art School for the official opening of the Old Salopian Art Exhibition. The President, Hugh Ramsbotham, in declaring the Exhibition open, pointed out that officially the event marked the 80th Birthday of Art Master John Alford; but in fact it honoured the inspiring teaching of Arthur Broadbent, John Alford and Philip Woolley and all the art teachers who had planted so many exciting creative seeds in the past 50 years. The Exhibition is described elsewhere – and meanwhile the growing crowd marched on to Kingsland House for the main event of the day...

Remarkably we found our places for lunch – designated as Artists, as Ellis family supporters, as Fives players or simply as members of Houses, and the Kingsland House staff then served a magnificent buffet lunch in the very short time allotted. Once again the President then addressed the troops, giving the official welcome of the Old Salopian community to Mark and Elizabeth Turner. He described the Old Salopian Community to the new Headmaster as a broad and strong one – made up not just of former pupils but also former members of both academic and non-academic staff, governors, former parents and others who had served the School in some way; and this whole community pledges itself to support the Headmaster in any way he planned to continue the growth and success of the School.

In his reply Mark Turner said how much he and his wife were thrilled with their arrival, how he had enjoyed reading about the history and traditions of the School, and how much they had been struck by this superb site. He promised to spend some time absorbing all the great things that went on in the School, and then to suggest how in the next decade the achievements of his predecessors could be carried on and added to. In coming to those suggestions he would meet and talk with Old Salopians of all interests – and he would learn to play Eton fives.

And so after lunch, on to the next engagement – the official opening of the refurbished fives courts. The Old Salopian Fives Club, led by Richard Barber (SH 1955-60 and Chairman of the Eton Fives Association) had spearheaded the drive to renovate the courts, with the crucial support of the Foundation, and he was delighted to ask Peter Worth (M 1965-70) who with his father and son had all played for the School, to open the new Worth Courts (also reported elsewhere in this edition).



And so the day drew to a close – as Old Salopians visited their old houses, watched the matches against Bradfield, visited the River and the Annual General Meeting of the Sabrina Club, or just wandered round the now sunlit site before a cup of tea, one last reminisce, and the journey home. The tireless and stalwarts crossed to the Ashton Theatre for the Annual General Meeting of the Old Salopian Club (the first attended by a Headmaster for very many years) where tributes were paid to the retiring Chairman, Hugh Raven, healthy accounts were presented by the Treasurer Johnny Arthur, new Committee members elected, and Richard Barber was hailed as the 2011 President.

Finally a dozen Salopians who had joined the school 50 years before gathered with their wives and a few old brushers for a delightful dinner. The rest drifted quietly away from Kingsland with the warmth of their welcome to the Turners resonant in their minds, and the warmth of their welcome from the School and the site resonant in their hearts. What a splendid day; we must come back again!

CCF: Fifth Form courses

Wednesday 24 November 2010

During the first part of the Fifth Form, so a cadet's second year of Service, the skills of leadership and command are more of a focus. The training starts with the Cadet Methods of Instruction and Leadership Cadre; 'Cadre' for short. The cadets start the course with lessons on Leadership and the opportunity to demonstrate their own qualities with a range of Leader 'led' and Leader 'less' problem solving activities like the one featured in the picture. Here cadets have 20 minutes, using all the equipment provided, to make a platform sufficiently strong to elevate all the cadets in the team at least 50cms off the ground.

The course continues with lessons on problem solving, problem appreciation skills and how to teach. The cadets are taught the basic skills of planning a lesson and its delivery, and then all have the opportunity to demonstrate the skills they have learnt by delivering a lesson to other cadets in the contingent.

The course closes some five weeks later with a series of problem solving tasks which are assessed by our own instructors, and a NITEX where each cadets is given a command appointment. It's a great course with many useful lifeskills learnt, developed and refined.

School Musical: What You Will

Monday 29 November 2010

Wednesday 24th November to Saturday 27th November 2010, 8pm in the Ashton Theatre Monday 15th August to Saturday 20th August 2011 at the Edinburgh Festival, C Venue

A journey, a storm and a shipwreck. A loving sister and brother separated on a hostile shore. A dead father - a melancholy Duke - lost love, unrequited love - ambitious servants - lost illusions - joy and hope restored. Shakespeare's most romantic comedy 'Twelfth Night' or 'What You Will' is transformed into a new piece of music theatre by John Moore, in this adaptation by Peter Fanning.

Shrewsbury School's home-grown musicals have been a highlight in the Ashton Theatre for two decades, during which time the school as gained a reputation for shows of professionalism, variety and colour both in London and at the Edinburgh Fringe. Please see Peter Fanning's 'Director's note' below that was included in the back of the programme for What You Will, to get a bit of an insight into the making of a School Musical.

The unanimous view of those who saw the show was that this has been the best one yet!

Director's note - What You Will

Peter Fanning included the following note in the programme for What You Will. It gives such a wonderful insight into the makings of School musicals, that it seemed worth reproducing here. It was obviously written before either he or John Moore were quite aware that their show would be such a tremendous success.

Twenty Years On - Music Theatre at Shrewsbury

Just twenty years ago, this month, the eighteen year old Salopian Anthony Merryweather saw his opera 'Troy' through its first performance in the Ashton Theatre – a show, which in the words of its youthful director Robin Case, was 'a cross between Lloyd Webber and the Ring Cycle.'

But it was in 1993, on the back of a five-star trip to the Edinburgh Fringe with Guys and Dolls, that Alex Went, John Moore and I hit on the idea of creating our own original musicals, with a show based on Stevenson's 'Jekyll and Hyde'. 'Jekyll', to our amazement, won a coveted Fringe First when it was staged in Edinburgh. Since then, John Moore and I, along with a host of loyal Salopians, (of whom Sara Hankin, Richard Hudson, Christine Samworth, Dympna Nightingale, Dimitri Porter and Toby Percival all feature as survivors) have travelled the dangerous highway of creating new productions roughly every other year.

Old Salopians (and girls), many of whom are married now, will treasure particular memories. The spectacular set of the 'The Time Machine', innocent youth in 'The Lost Domain'; the coruscating energy of 'The Bubble', the gothic thunder of 'Frankenstein' or the zany zip and nightmare of 'Harry'; every one of these pieces has presented different challenges.

Creating these shows is a daunting experience for any wannabe actor or singer; and our rehearsals follow a curious pattern. We usually cast before much of the music is written, so that John can write music specially suited to the voice of every soloist.

Nor does the director always know what the music sounds like much before the first rehearsal. John will often arrive armed with a manuscript warm from the photocopier, then proceed to drill



the cast for twenty glorious minutes, before turning to me with a charming smile and the encouraging words: 'Well, enough of that. Let's stage it.'

We tend to rehearse at breakneck speed. The cast learn lines and notes and the improvised moves in one fell swoop. It's an interesting educational experience. And it's very scary. We have to trust each other – and hope that our judgement doesn't let us down. And it isn't until a show is almost ready for performance that one has any clear idea about its quality. I'm afraid that What You Will is no exception.

Over the years, we have encountered the heartache and hazard which comes post paid with every brand new show. But though we have the scars to prove it, I do not think we could have wished for a more exhilarating way to spend our time away from class. The talent of our musical director, matched with the exuberance of an eternally youthful cast makes for a heady recipe. What writer or director could ever wish for more?

Donation to Shrewsbury School: Grecian Urn from Third Century BC

Tuesday 30 November 2010

The school has recently been donated a Greek pottery urn and cover from the Third Century BC. It was bought in 2007 by an anonymous benefactor who has presented it to the school in appreciation of Professor Colin Leach, formerly of Pembroke College, Oxford (O.S. 1945-51). It was acquired in 1809 – quite how is uncertain – by Sir Francis Sacheverel Darwin (1786-1859), uncle of Charles, and continued in the Darwin family until 2007. Inside the urn is a contemporary label: 'Grecian Urn with bones and ashes etc. Taken by Sir F. Darwin from a Tomb at the Temple of Bacchus near Athens.'

It is a most handsome object, painted with a meandering vine motif, and at the moment rests in its splendour in the Ancient Library.
