

Classics master's book is published: 'Augustus, First Roman Emperor'

Matthew Clark's book 'Augustus, First Roman Emperor - Power, Propaganda and the Politics of Survival' has just been published by UEP.

Rome's first emperor, Augustus, the adopted son of Julius Caesar, has probably had the most lasting effect on history of all rulers of the classical world.

This book presents a fascinating analysis of the ways in which Augustus was able to manipulate the mechanisms of power during his long reign (27BC - 14AD). Augustus emerges as the classical world's true master of 'spin', demonstrating that political propaganda is far from just a modern phenomenon.

Matthew examines the importance of his chief political advisor Maecenas, the patron of Horace and Virgil; and of his military commander Agrippa. He also considers the contrasting fates of the main poets of Augustus' reign, Virgil and Ovid, and the public monuments that – as much as poetry – served to shape his reputation. He brings Augustus' political manoeuvring to life and helps us to understand just how he was able to rise to supremacy, maintain power throughout his reign and create a lasting legacy.

The book is the latest in a series that introduces key figures and aspects of the ancient world in order to demonstrate that the legacy of Greece and Rome has both relevance and resonance in our world today. Another book in this series, 'Reading Catullus', was written by our Head of Classics, John Godwin. Matthew is also the co-author of 'Measuring the Cosmos' and reviews regularly for the Journal of Classics Teaching.

Public Nose: Emma Darwin Hall - Progression or antagonism?

A mere two years after the first girls' house opened on Shrewsbury's hallowed ground, the second girls' residence, Emma Darwin Hall, is underway. This is a contentious issue, not only because of the rise in the numbers of girls attending the school, but also due to the difference between accommodation of boys and girls in the school. This comes to light with the finding that of the 35 places available in Mary Sidney this year only 31 places appear to have been filled. The question therefore needs to be asked: is spending £5m on a new girls' house a good use of school funds?

No one can be unaware of the difficult financial climate, so it might come as comfort to know that the building of the house has been financed by a long-term loan, rather than using funds that were already in place for other projects – therefore building Emma Darwin does not have a knock-on effect on other developments. The bursar indeed was determined to state the school's keenness to continue with the refurbishment of the boys' houses. Further to this, Emma Darwin Hall is planned to be completed for July 2011, just in time to be let for the summer holidays, as all the other houses currently are. This means that the new house will immediately bring in extra funds – so financially, at least, Emma Darwin will be a sound investment.

The bursar also appeared to dispel the common misconception that Mary Sidney is not full. It was built as a house for more or less 60 people, and currently houses 64; and as applications mount up, it is clear that the school will not struggle to fill the extra places. The new girls' house is perhaps not as frivolous as some think.

The most obvious complaint is the apparent inequality in living space. To this those at the top accounted for the issue: at the time of their construction, a typical house would have 45 boys and 12 or so domestic staff. Many of them are re-purposed private residences, dating from as early as 1900, and as such the bursar explained, "a bespoke modern building is inevitably going to be different from an adapted building, which is more than 100 years old". Though many around the school seem to feel that Mary Sidney is the 'land of milk and honey', with its own sauna, hot-tub and sunroom, in fact the bursar suggested that, "The furniture, fixtures and fittings of all refurbished houses are mostly identical to those in Mary Sidney, and the future Emma Darwin Hall." Though one wonders whether the refurbished houses will have ensuite showers in their bedrooms, one can assume that this is more based on higher rental income than merely creating a two-tier living condition situation.

Whilst the bursar is at pains to identify the common quality of the furnishings across all homes, he also neatly highlights the differences in living spaces between modern bespoke houses and repurposed private houses of the 1900s. Mary Sidney was initially conceived as a new boys' boarding house, which Moser's was due to move into. When it was re-purposed to become a girls' house, there was understandably some resentment among the boys; yet the change in plan was in fact due to opposition from Moserites, former and current, who sought to preserve the old buildings and the traditions embedded in it. This highlights one of the key issues of this debate: the school must achieve the right balance between modern accommodation and maintaining the traditions of each individual house. Similarly, in building new houses for the girls, rather than moving them into an old boys' house, we are giving them a chance to imprint



their own identity onto the building. This will become an increasingly important issue over the next few years, as more girls are introduced into the school. Of course, this will always create objections from the boys, who see brand new buildings being created for the girls – but do they really want to leave behind the history of their own houses for the benefits of short-term jealousy? Obviously it is impractical to build several new girls' houses from scratch, so it will be interesting to see how the new headmaster plans to resolve this – especially with the plans to extend girls throughout the entire school.

Overall though, there is one thing I feel we can all agree on: the new house will mean more girls. The current girls of Mary Sidney may not feel quite so outnumbered, but more importantly, we will all be getting a more accurate representation of the social make-up of the world outside the school gates, leading up to a life ahead as more rounded individuals.

Public Nose: Doc Gee: The Man, the Legend ... and 50 years teaching at Shrewsbury School!

Over the years at Shrewsbury there have been several teachers who have endured longer than the average human could cope. Amongst those there have been Mr Fanning, Colonel Jenkins and our previous Headmaster Mr Goulding. However none of these can compare to the legendary Doctor Gee, more affectionately known as Doc. Now famous for his stories and charm, he first arrived here at Shrewsbury back in January 1958 as a student-teacher. He then returned back to Oxford where he was at university for a term before the Headmaster at that time Mr Peterson offered him a permanent post to teach 6th Form History. So why did he decide to take up the offer and return to Shrewsbury? As a young man the Doc went to school in the south, yet being a Yorkshireman at heart, he wanted to work at a school further north. He also rowed with Salopians at Oxford and claims to have "thoroughly enjoyed" his time as a student teacher. Now, 53 years and 50 years of teaching later, Doc Gee agreed to shed some light on his time at Shrewsbury for us.

Of course many things will have changed over time at Shrewsbury, but only a few of these have stood out to the Doc. There have been the obvious changes like the fact that there is now a much wider choice of subjects than in 1958 and back then most of the intelligent boys did classics. "Also nowadays", the Doc says, "there's an even greater variety of extra-curricular activities and much more opportunities to get away from the school site."

Some of the key changes that Doc has noticed are on the pastoral side of the school, whilst keeping control has changed dramatically with senior boys no longer in charge of discipline and without corporal punishment. On the other hand there are many things that fundamentally haven't changed according to the Doc, "In their manners and attitudes the Salopians are recognisably the same, as are the exceptionally positive relationships between staff and pupils. Shrewsbury is, and in my memory always has been, a very friendly place."

The Doc also chose to share with me two random memories of his time at Shrewsbury that stood out in his mind. Once when coaching on the river when it was in flood he got a school eight jammed at 90° to the current flow on two pillars under the Station Bridge. Another year he bet the History Upper 6th a target of a certain number of places (awards as they were known in those days) at Oxford. If they managed it, he promised to grow a moustache. He lost.

Anyone clever will have figured out by now that from 1958 to 2010 does not add up to 50. Since the Doc retired from full-time staff he is only asked to teach when he is needed and between 2004 and 2007 the teaching was fully staffed. However he returned to bat out half-century at Shrewsbury and still appears to be going strong – especially when it is noted that he has run 50 tucks races!

Finally when asked if he felt different at Shrewsbury now after 53 years he gave me this reply: "I feel just the same in class and enjoy it just as much, but of course I wouldn't now want to teach a full timetable. I get special pleasure in teaching the children of former Salopians. There are many of those now and in a couple of cases their grandchildren have been in the school."



So congratulations to the famous Doc and thank you for all your time and continued efforts to Shrewsbury School. We at the Public Nose stand and salute your contributions to Salopian life.

There was also a bucket collection and thank you to everyone for their generosity in terms of time and dosh.
